

The committee, in submitting its annual report for the year ending with the Winter term of '87, calls your attention first to the condition of the school buildings, which, we are pleased to say, are in good condition at present. The care of the buildings, grounds and school property in general has been especially impressed upon the minds of the children, with, we trust, the result of less destruction and waste than usual. We would suggest, in regard to the care of the school yards, that the day set apart as "Arbor Day" be more generally observed. A few elm, maple or ash trees on the south, and a few evergreens on the north would afford the necessary shade, and, in many cases, protection. A tree set out by those leaving school would serve to remind each of "Our Class Tree," and, in many instances, have an influence upon the appearance of the yard. Also, as regards the school room, we would leave the "jack-knife carved initial" to old times and the day of pine desks.

The town has not been visited by sickness to any extent, the village grammar and primary schools alone having suffered any interruption in this line. This winter's uncertain weather has caused many names to be enrolled among the absent which otherwise would have been found on the record of honor.

While the schools have not all attained the degree of perfection desired we hope the pupils, with the hearty cooperation of the parents, will endeavor to improve and make the most of their opportunities.

With the remunerations we are able to offer we think we have obtained efficient teachers who have manifested an interest in the welfare and advancement of the schools under their charge.

The law regarding text-books and supplies has called for an appropriation nearly equal to that of last year, which should be repaid by a corresponding advancement by the children.

The attention of a few parents is called to Chapter 47, Sections 1 and 2, of the General Statutes of 1882, concerning the attendance of the pupils in the various schools. We would particularly call the children's attention to the tardy marks and absences which are too numerous, and should be considered by the parents with a greater degree of diligence, thus making less work for the Truant Officer and insuring better and more harmonious schools. The law making physiology and hygiene required studies in the public schools has met with gratifying results, which may be observed by spending a few moments during the recitation in any of our schools, and noticing the snap and enthusiasm displayed by even the smallest children, in this the proper study of mankind.

The various amounts paid to Mrs. Church of the Long Plain school for care of fires, sweeping and cleaning, have been used by that school for the purchase of books and sundry articles not furnished by the town.
