REPORT OF THE BOARD OF SELECTMEN

To the Citizens of Acushnet:

We submit herewith our report for the year ending December 31, 1966.

At the initial meeting of the board following the Annual Town Election re-organization took place. At this time, by unanimous assent, Clement St. Amand, Jr. was elected Chairman of the Board and Wilfred C. Fortin clerk for 1966.

The board, as in the past, met every Monday night at 7:00 P.M. in their offices at the Town Hall. Here they heard weekly reports of the Department heads and petitioners from throughout the Town. In addition to these weekly meetings, it was often necessary to meet on other evenings during the year to attend to special considerations and requirements.

The various projects on sewerage and water studies have been completed as far as preliminary plans are concerned. The money from the Federal Government has been received, \$38,000.00 for the sewerage study was paid to Robert Charles Associates and \$21,884.09 was paid to Whitman & Howard for the Water Study. On the sewerage the town is now waiting for word from New Bedford if they can tie in with the city system

on the sewerage treatment plant. This would save the town considerable money of building their own sewerage plant. On the water project the board has applied for a construction grant from the Federal Government to tie in from the city water system at Peckham Road and proceed down Middle Road to the existing main and across Leonard Street to Main Street to tie in with the existing main and go north to Robinson Road.

The board has completed several projects during the year 1966. Curbing has been laid on Prouteau Street and Wamsutta Avenue and money is in this year's warrant to regrade and resurface these two streets in the amount of \$13,000.00.

The Main Street sidewalk has been completed as far as Hamlin Street on the North Side and retainer walls have been built. Two culverts were replaced on Leonard Street and one was replaced on Main Street. Another culvert on Main Street will be replaced this spring as the pipe has already been bought to alleviate a flooded condition especially after a heavy rainstorm.

Several streets were oiled during the year and more are to be done this coming year. Nye's Lane is going to be layed out this coming year as there is an article for laying out this street in the warrant. The money approprieted last year for reconstruction of Nye's Lane was not used as the board felt the street should be layed out before it is reconstructed.

The financial condition of the town is a little less than was anticipated as the sales tax did not bring in the money that the state thought it would bring in the year 1966. This year's warrant reflexes the growth of the town as the departments need more money to run their departments and the increase services that a growing community need to keep up with the demands of the citizens.

REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the Acushnet School Committee:

I have the honor of submitting my second annual report as Superintendent of the Acushnet Public Schools.

The Acushnet School Committee, Mr. Norman LaBelle, Chairman; Mr. Benjamin T. Briggs, Jr., and Mr. Robert E. Honohan, has met twenty-seven times during the past year, beginning on January 10, 1966, and ending on December 12, 1966.

The school committee, with recommendations of the professional staff, has devoted a great deal of time to the formulation of sound educational and financial policies and programs. Recognizing the changing educational environment and looking ahead, to provide a sound educational system, they have planned, evaluated and adopted the most significant and far-reaching programs for our schools.

The school committee has met informally to draw up a long range plan for our curriculum, staff and school facilities that will be both economically and educationally advantageous to our community.

Education: A Year of Change

Education continues to change in its methods and materials. Acushnet Public Schools have kept pace with this change while at the same time maintaining its basic offerings. 1966 was a year of change for our schools. Educational television has been introduced into the elementary schools and these classrooms are utiliz-

ing the advantages of science, literature and social studies programs, as presented by experts in these disciplines. Each elementary school has been equipped with a new television receiver to take full advantage of these offerings.

To provide a greater offering on the secondary level, a new course of study was introduced to ninth graders this year. A general course, with industrial arts, has been incorporated into the school program. It is hoped we may retain more students in school through our more diversified offerings.

Federal monies have been applied to our school needs to offer new learning materials to our curriculum.

Matching grants of federal and local monies have introduced much needed classroom libraries into our schools along with individualized reading materials. Professional periodicals were provided to staff members to further provide current information on pertinent educational issues.

A long needed addition to the secondary program was the inception of a school library. With the help of federal monies, a grant under Title II of the Elementary and Secondary Act provided \$1200 for the purchase of library books for our resource unit. This grant will be continued next year and further develop our instructional materials center.

A \$15,000 federal grant will offer us the opportunity to present our fifth and sixth graders with a summer (1967) reading program. The program will increase their skills and proficiency in reading and promise more success in their future education.

An increase in the length of school day this year was one of the effects of the recently enacted Willis-Harrington Report. Future implementations of this law will advocate an increased school year, the establishment of kindergartens and the expansion in the years of mandatory school attendance. All of these and other changes should become a reality within the next two to five years. This law will have far-reaching effects on our educational planning for the future.

Collective bargaining brought an increased work load to the School Committee and also influenced our budget considerations. The impact of this law has yet to be measured.

Elementary Education

Having implemented a basal reading system for our schools, we will launch an intensive in-service training session for our teaching staff in the area of modern mathematics. Specific training for the personnel will allow us a complete Grade 1 through 6 adoption next fall.

Currently, studies are being conducted, with implementation to follow, of a new course of study in elementary social studies and science.

The well established testing program is helping us to identify specific strengths and weaknesses in our system and individual youngsters. Analysis of the results will prove an asset to our total school program and the individuals in it.

A new fifth grade was created at the Parting Ways School bringing the total of four fifth grade divisions. We are currently entertaining four class levels per grade with the exception of Grade 6 which has three. However, to cope with the large influx next year, a fourth division will be added to this grade level in September.

The Opportunity Class at the Junior High School has been re-

organized into an elementary program with secondary youngsters being enrolled in an appropriate program in New Bedford. This has allowed the program to function more productively for the children enrolled in both sections.

Secondary Education

The addition of two staff members adds strength to our science and physical education and mathematics programs. It has helped these programs to improve and be formalized. Much direction has been offered in these areas to provide a strong and organized approach to these disciplines.

The ninth grade now has five divisions on the grade level to provide a varied program to meet the needs of all of the youngsters.

The added staff has also allowed us to provide a part-time librarian who is doing an excellent job in the establishment of the much needed library unit. With the help of more federal funds, we will be able to offer a library unit to all members of the student body. The co-ordination with New Bedford High School has been carried on in the area of science, mathematics and the social sciences as well as language curriculum and texts.

Next year our foreign language offerings will be extended to encompass more groups in this academic discipline.

An additional English instructor will provide much needed help in remedial reading and also allow more time for the librarian to formalize her program. The latest in audio-visual instruction is being made available on a long range implementation purchase plan. Monies for this growth has been budgeted to carry out our planned implementations.

A Look To the Future

While many positive steps have been taken to strengthen our

schools, many steps still remain.

The music program of our schools must be formalized, organized and supervised. The value of this program, while not material, has long lasting value and provides another opportunity for our youngsters to express their talents and ambitions. It is hoped that progress will be made within the next few years to complete our goal in this area.

School housing facilities on the elementary level immediately, and the high school level in the future, need attention. Inadequate lighting, lack of assembly, lunch and recreational facilities are always present. Modern approaches in science and other disciplines will suffer because of the inability to provide proper facilities for their instruction. While others will progress in these areas, we will be hampered because of our inability to offer these programs.

Kindergartens, which offer many educational advantages, should be projected into our immediate future needs. The value of this program is recognized by the administration, school committee and staff. However, our current facilities are inadequate to house these programs.

A Building Needs Committee was authorized at a special town meeting in July to study our buildings and make recommendations to the town. These men have devoted long hours to this task and are making every sincere effort to present recommendations that are both educationally sound and at the same time economically possible. A formal report will be made after all avenues of solution have been investigated.

A guidance program should be formalized from the existing program now operating.

A study of implementation of this program will be conducted

this year to offer proper suggestions toward the best program to be given to our school children.

A formal physical education and art program will be studied with anticipated increase in services to the elementary school levels when facilities and staff will be provided. This will be given study and implemented within a few years.

In summary, the progress made this year and planned for the new school year, is monumental. Positive concrete steps have been taken that will insure wise educational programs for our children. Continued progress of this calibre will up-grade our curriculum, staff and school facilities and will provide and maintain a school system of the highest quality.

A great deal still remains but it can be achieved with the continued support of the School Committee, a committee dedicated to a fine education for Acushnet youth.

Maintenance and Repairs

In formulating a long range plan for education, the question arose: "How long will the present facilities continue in existence?"

Therefore, the School Committee has agreed to maintain the school facilities properly but large investments are being evaluated in the light of a pro-rated return for the expected life of the building itself.

The roof at the Long Plain School received much needed repair. A new anchor fence isolating the Parting Ways School playground was erected. Roof and gutter repairs and additional blacktopping have also been done at this school.

The Mason W. Burt School has had new insulated doors and

steam pipe repairs have been made. Grade 1 has been brightened with new paneling.

The driveway at the Junior High School has been sealed and the building has been weather-proofed by the custodial staff.

All custodians have continued to maintain their buildings in fine condition.

School Lunch Program

The school lunch program has enjoyed success for still another year.

From September 1965 to June 1966, they have served a total of 67,800 lunches. This represents an increase of some 20,000 lunches over the previous school year.

This is definitely a tribute to the quality of the meals served by a fine cafeteria staff.

REPORT OF THE SCHOOL PHYSICIAN AND NURSE

January 24, 1967 Acushnet, Massachusetts

To the Members of the School Committee, The Superintendent, Teachers, and Residents of the Town of Acushnet:

We respectfully submit for your consideration a report of our activities during the year 1966.

School health physical examinations were done by us on 480 children; 11 others turned in reports by their own physicians. Of these, 121 exams were given in the presence of their parents. During these physical exams, the following conditions were noted:

Other miscellaneous defects	3

Notices were sent to 64 families concerning correctable defects, with the result that 60 children completed corrective care.

Under sponsorship of our Board of Health and the Bristol County Health Association, the Heaf Test for Tuberculosis was performed on 425 pupils, 3 of whom revealed positive reactions. All contacts were requested to have chest X-rays.

A Measles Vaccine Program offered in the schools to all students in the first five grades resulted in 204 immunizations in this age group (5 to 9 years). An additional 156 inoculations were given in our Clinic Sessions at the Library.

The Massachusetts Pure-Tone Audiometer Test for Hearing was given to 1,116 pupils during 1966. All pupils who failed the test were referred to their family doctor for corrective care.

The Massachusetts Vision Test was administered to 1,358 pupils, and the 116 who failed were referred to their physicians for treatment.

Clinic Sessions held in Russell Memorial Library and in the Town Hall resulted in our seeing 640 people, 281 at the Well-Baby Clinic; and the following inoculations given:

- 312 Flu Shots
- 172 Oral Polio
 - 92 Adults completed Tetanus and Diphtheria series
 - 57 Children given Diphtheria, Tetanus, and Pertussis series
 - 21 Children given booster shots of Diphtheria, Tetanus, and Pertussis.
 - 57 People were vaccinated against Small-Pox.

We were happy to include in our School Health Program, the new private Kindergarten School which opened at Long Plain.

Thus, we briefly outline a busy, eventful year of progress, and we give our thanks and appreciation for the gracious co-operation of the Students, their Parents, the School Committee, the Superintendent and Teachers, our co-workers, and to our Board of Health whose financial aid has helped to make some of these things possible.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF HEALTH FOR THE YEAR 1966

To the Officers and Residents of the Town of Acushnet:

The Board of Health respectfully submits the following report for the year 1966.

Immediately following the election the newly elected member, Mr. Edwin W. Church, Jr., was sworn into office by the Town Clerk. The Board of Health organized at the first regular meeting as follows:

Chairman—Joseph H. LePage Clerk—Emile R. Houle Inspector—Edwin W. Church, Jr.

This year marked a very active year for the Board of Health. A totally new program came into being with the passage of the Medicare Act by the Federal government. Many meetings were held with the State and Federal supervisors of the Medicare program and the Board of Health was certified for a two-year period as the Home Health Agency for Health Insurance under Social Security. It was necessary to offer an additional service to this program and the Board of Health now has a contract with the Homemaker Service of Greater New Bedford, Inc. This will make all Medicare services available to all residents of Acushnet who qualify for this service. The new program went into

effect July 1, 1966, and 11 persons have been aided under this program.

There was a total of 10 premature births to residents of Acushnet. There were two premature deaths and one case was aided by the Board of Health.

A total of 24 deaths, 14 male and 10 female, were reported during the year.

Board of Health Dental Clinics were held during the year. Twenty-one clinics with a total charge of \$1,503.00 for the clinics. The children paid \$304.00 and the balance of \$1,199.00 was paid by the Board of Health. The following services were rendered:

School Heaf testing program in conjunction with the Bristol County Health Association was held in December. A total of 425 children were tested and there were three positive reactors. Contacts and positive reactors are being X-rayed and some reactors have been placed on medication.

REPORT OF TRUSTEES OF RUSSELL MEMORIAL LIBRARY

To the Townspeople of Acushnet:

The Board of Trustees of the Russell Memorial Library has only a short report to make for the past year's operations. We stayed within our budget—as usual—and accomplished what was hoped for the year.

Our repair money was spent on the outside of the building to preserve it. Our librarian judiciously spent our book and periodical fund so that in spite of withdrawing volumes as deemed necessary, we show an increase of 219 volumes over the previous year. We also had donations of 51 volumes, and for these we are very grateful. Our total volumes now stand at 11,136—which is gratifying for our size of library, but not the ultimate desired. Due to the improvements in the heating facilities put into effect over the past few years, we have been able to cut down somewhat on our fuel expenditure. This saving in 1967 is being applied to the book fund in order to further increase research and new fiction volumes.

Our proposed projects for the coming year include tiling the lower hall floor, and possibly redecorating the walls. We also keep in mind various small projects which are always necessary in order to keep a building in good operation.

The story hour this past summer was very well received and the librarians again look forward to this program during the summer of 1967. Throughout the year, exhibits of art work and special projects from the various schools have been displayed in the main reading room. We hope to continue much of this in the coming year. Our annual arts and crafts exhibit in observance of Massachusetts Art Week was well attended. This coming year

will mark our eighth annual show for this event. It is held each year the last full week in May.

In the past we have been asked to open the library one extra evening a week. This we propose to put into effect beginning January, 1967. In addition to being open Thursday evenings from 6 to 8 P.M., we will be open Tuesdays 6 to 8 P.M. This is on a trial basis for 1967. We desire to give the maximum service to our townspeople without adding unduly to the cost of operations.

We have to include a statement as part of this report we wish was unnecessary. The children continue to use the front—back and sides, also—of the library grounds as playgrounds. As a result, the new plate glass door to the lower hall was cracked diagonally. This is a very heavy duty plate glass. Apparently a rock or other hard object was thrown against it. Cost of replacement? Minimum \$40!

The Board is pleased to report an increase of circulation of 5,516 over that of 1965. We know it is at present impossible to satisfy all inquiries for books, but each year we add more volumes of general interest—particularly books needed by our young people in their pursuit of higher learning. Catering to the majority is in the best interest of all.

REPORT OF WIRE INSPECTOR

To the Citizens of Acushnet:

The Wire Department has completed a very active year. Electrical installations of residential, commercial and industrial capacities contributed to this. Electric heat is also becoming popular.

There were 116 "Type A" electrical permits issued. "Type A" permits are for new homes and for new services being installed in existing buildings. "Type A" permits usually require at least three inspections, if everything goes well. One for rough wiring; another for service; and third after the wiring has been completed.

"Type B" permits are for additional wiring and repairs, both gas and oil fired heating systems. "Type B" permits usually require one inspection, although sometimes two or three.

Other duties of the Wire Inspector, in addition to on-the-job inspection, have been as follows: Preparing reports, telephone conversations, related clerical work, studying to keep abreast of new requirements and new electrical equipment; and also at times in the advisory capacity.

The Town's cost for the Wire Inspector's salary was \$97.00, due to \$728.00 received from wiring permits. This is a slight increase in cost over last year, which was \$18.00.

A meeting was held a week after the annual election, and the board was organized. Voted as its officers were:

Bids were sent out for a new tractor-mower and for a new fence around the tennis court. Awarded the bids were Walter Tripp Tractor Co., of Acushnet, low bidder, and New Bedford Wire & Iron Works got the contract on the fence. He also was the low bidder.

This summer saw the advent of the "Arts & Crafts" program for the youngsters, and it was a complete success, thanks to the hard work of Ed Church, who did all the groundwork, leg work, and organizing of this project. And a special thanks goes to the Mothers Club of Acushnet, who did all the instructing and supervising of over 200 children. It is a tribute to the women who gave of their time to lend a helping hand to these children.

The baseball fields were again used to full capacity. Acushnet can be proud to say that they have one of the best little league ball diamonds in this area. And, if money is made available, we will also have one of the best full size diamonds in this district. The Acushnet Youth Athletic Association again made a good showing in the tournaments this summer. Few people probably realize the amount of time and effort that is spent in preparing for these

tournaments; and the women's auxiliary does a good job of having a very good variety of food at these events.

The July 4th Celebration was again well attended and it had an accent on youth. We'll long remember the rock and roll bands during that warm holiday weekend.

The town is growing every year and it is our desire to see that the recreational facilities grow along with it. So, any suggestions from you as to what might be done to improve the park will be welcomed by the Park Department. There are some projects that are in the planning stages and as funds become available, we will strive to carry them out.

We all mourn the loss of one of the most active and ambitious members of the A.Y.A.A., Mr. John Greene, who passed away last spring. We would also like to pay tribute to a man who was as valuable to the New Bedford Colt League as John was to the A.Y.A.A. Ed Brown certainly will be missed by all who knew him. When our man at the park, Stan Stopka, had a job that was just too big for one man, these other two gentlemen were always around to give Stan a helping hand. Stan himself has worked many hours at the park on his own, helping someone, or some organization, whether it be at night, Sundays, holidays, or whatever.

A survey of the recreational needs is being conducted in Greater New Bedford by the New Bedford Planning Department, with the financial assistance of the federal government and their findings will aid us here in Acushnet in determining our projected future needs as far as recreational sites and facilities are concerned. This is being done at no cost to Acushnet.

But Ed felt that his duties with the Board of Health did not leave him enough time to do the job he would like to do with the Park Board. He is a tireless, devoted worker.

In conclusion, we want to remind you that we are always open to suggestions and constructive criticism. Please make use of the facilities at Pope Park and we hope to see you there this spring and summer.
