#### REPORT OF THE BOARD OF SELECTMEN

To the Citizens of Acushnet:

The Board of Selectmen respectfully submit the following report to the Citizens of the Town of Acushnet, for the year just ended 1967.

Following the Elections in March, the Board met for the purposes of organizing for the year. At this initial meeting, Elton A. Ashley was elected Chairman of the Board and Wilfred Fortin was re-appointed Clerk.

The Board met every Monday evening during the year, for the purposes of administering the affairs of the Town and to hear petitioners. In addition to this, they also met at frequent intervals otherwise to take care of the many problems encountered throughout the year.

1967 was a year of many controversial issues, particularly as they concerned the problems of Solid Wastes Disposal and the Inspector of Wires. In the Dumping problems, nothing to date has been resolved as yet. The Board of Selectmen, however, will host a general meeting of area Towns and the City of New Bedford for the purposes of hearing discussion on the possibility of Regionalization of the Incineration problems and the ultimate construction of an incinerator to be paid for and used jointly by the several Towns involved. Invitations have been issued and commitments have been received from the Office of Solid Wastes Disposal, District No. 1 Office in Boston, indicating that the administrator of that office will be here that evening to show films and to advise the Town on the best approaches to filing an application for Federal money.

The Wire Inspector issues have boiled hot during the year, and as a result we were forced to appoint a Deputy Inspector for the

purposes of inspecting the work of the Wire Inspector, and to otherwise resolve the question revolving around the controversial issue. The Board of Selectmen have also seen to it, that an article is included for the Annual Town Meeting establishing legal fees for Wire Inspections. Discussions have also been held on the possible or advisability of initiating a Department of Public Works, and a Building Department whose primary control would be that of the Building Inspector. Additional work on this, however, is necessary, and a later date has been set for final disposition. In this connection and at the recommendation of the Building Inspector, a new set of Building By-Laws are included in the warrant this year for action by the Town Meeting.

Work on the Chapter 90 Middle Road project has been put aside until this year, even after the Board tried desperately to certify their own Engineers with the State D.P.W., to complete the final design portion of this project. We have been assured, however, that the contract should be let early in 1968 for th's project.

The Board has also continued the program initiated some years ago of the installation of curbings and sidewalks throughout the town, constructed under the Betterment Acts of the General Laws. Four streets were completed this year, including Wamsutta Ave., Wilbur Ave., Budano Drive, and Prouteau Street. Resurfacing has also been accomplished on these same streets with the exception of Wilbur Ave. It is planned to do several more streets this year.

1967 also found a very busy year in the general highway department activities. A number of streets were oiled with penetration and several were resealed. Several culverts were constructed and drains were installed in some areas to eliminate surface water hazzards. Several areas in the Town are now under study for the purposes of determining the best solution to getting rid of surface water. Cattley & Richards Engineering have just completed a study of the Bardsley, Club Ave.. Coloumbe St., Michael Way, Garfield Street areas. The Town Meeting Warrant this year asks money to install drains to eliminate some of these water problem areas.

Action by the Board of Selectmen, recommends to the Town, a

new By-Law that will restrain dogs during certain times of the year. With the numerous complaints of wayward dogs, this should prove a valuable tool for the elimination of some of these complaints. The By-Law, as such, is designed after one used in other Towns with a great deal of success. It is hoped that we will get the necessary support to put this order across.

During the year, at the request of the Police and Fire Chiefs, quarters in Town Hall were again shifted. These moves were initiated in an endeavor to utilize our present facility to its fullest, to negate the necessary of capital outlay construction that we should avoid at the present time, in the light of the several other projects of primary importance to the Town. The Board of Selectmen are now located in what was the Public Welfare section, while Police and Fire offices are located in the old Selectmen quarters. Public Welfare is located in the old Police and Fire offices and generally speaking, the plan has proven very good from a working standpoint.

Expenditures and budgets for the new year are somewhat extended. A tax increase, at this time, seems almost inevitable, however, the Board of Selectmen are attempting to pare expenses to a minimum so as to keep any increase minimal.

Again we would like to acknowledge the help and assistance of the various Town Offices and Officials, and we look forward to guiding the destinys of the Town of Acushnet with sound judgement and wisdom, and within the capability of the Town to afford any new improvements.

## REPORT OF THE ACUSHNET CONSERVATION COMMISSION

Acushnet, Mass., January 29, 1968

To the Officers and Residents of the Town of Acushnet:

The Conservation Commission respectfully submits the following report for the year 1967:

The Conservation Commission re-elected Mr. Peter Murphy as its chairman at its first regular meeting. Meetings were held regularly during the year, with special meetings held from time to time as required. The Commission attended several regional conservation meetings and also met with the New Bedford Water Board concerning the Town Beach property.

One of the foremost goals of any conservation commission is the acquisition of property within the Town to be set aside for conservation purposes for the public use. To this end the commission has been building the Conservation Fund by means of annual appropriations. The Fund, which is invested and drawing interest, at present stands at \$4,517.21.

The Town Beach, which is under commission care, had another successful year. More work was done at the beach site, and to maintain the pine grove as a picnic area, barriers were installed to restrict vehicular traffic in the grove. As a precaution against fire a fire-lane was created and widened. A number of trees and shrubs were planted to establish a small nursery for future use by the commission. A seasonal life-guard was hired and was on duty during the regular swimming season. The commission is vitally interested in anything that will preserve the resources of nature within the Town, and welcomes help from anyone toward this end.

## REPORT OF THE BRISTOL COUNTY MOSQUITO CONTROL PROJECT

On June 30, 1968, the Bristol County Mosquito Control Project will have completed nine years of service to the residents of Acushnet.

During the past year all of the regular programs were carried out as usual and a normal season was anticipated. This did not materialize, as in late April a storm deposited  $5\frac{1}{2}$  inches of rain on the area. This was to set the pattern for the remainder of the season, ending on September 1, totaling 38 days on which rain fell. This resulted in a sizeable increase of area breeding space as well as untold numbers of new breeding areas. The floodwater mosquito then became a most serious problem and weather conditions throughout the summer were ideal for them to become a day and night nuisance.

Our pre-hatch treatment was underway in late winter and a total of  $13\frac{1}{4}$  acres were treated. The insecticide used was applied to known breeding areas by knapsack dusters.

During March, April and until late in May our larvaciding program was undertaken and a total of 10 acres were treated with #2fuel oil applied with compressed air spray cans.

Beginning June 5 our spray program began and despite the exceptionally heavy number of calls for service, all were answered as quickly as possible. The response to many calls being delayed was directly due to the weather conditions that prevailed.

Immediately after the spraying season had ended our crews

began removing accumulated debris from ditches, brooks and streams. A total of 5,070 feet of brush was removed and 7,200 feet of ditching reclaimed. This operation continued until the prehatch program was put into effect.

This project is guided by the State Reclamation Board in Boston, a division of the Department of Agriculture and advised in its use of pesticides by the Pesticide Board.

My thanks to all residents for their patience and understanding during the past year, and with your co-operation, look to a successful season to come.

#### **REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS**

To the Acushnet School Committee:

I have the honor of submitting my third annual report as Superintendent of the Acushnet Public Schools.

The Acushnet School Committee, Mr. Robert E. Honohan, Chairman; Mr. Norman LaBelle; and Mr. Benjamin T. Briggs, Jr., has met thirty times during the past year, beginning on January 3, 1967 and ending on December 18, 1967.

The Committee has devoted many hours to the formation of school policy, implementation of federal projects, budget, administration, collective bargaining and curriculum considerations.

The results, of their many hours, are an improved school program and wise expenditure of the educational dollar.

#### Education: A Year of Decision

We must provide quality education for our young people, if they are to remain competitive with their counter-parts, in other communities, states and nations.

The change that is influencing educational methods, materials and curriculum now, will continue at a more rapid pace in the years to come.

Quality education and equal educational opportunities are most necessary but not always present. The Acushnet Schools have continued to study, evaluate and adopt the best elements of the chang-

ing patterns in education to maintain this quality education.

However, a necessary ingredient in quality education, is modern school facilities or housing. The facilities are necessary to keep pace with the new ideas, programs and methodology, which requires space, equipment and freedom of movement to give flexibility to the program. We cannot now offer this flexibility or wide range of programs because our school housing limits our offerings. We are limited in adopting new programs because they cannot function in our school buildings. How long will we be able to provide equal opportunity in education? New approaches to science, foreign languages, team teaching or ungraded classes, to give a few examples, are common place practices which we cannot now offer.

The answer to our problem that is most educationally sound and economically wise is to regionalize our schools.

Combine our resources with other communities. This will broaden our educational efficiency and the economic tax base. The bases that will allow your youngsters — Quality Education.

A plan for regionalization is being formulated with the towns of Lakeville and Freetown. Together, you can expand your educational tax dollar for this quality program. Therefore, I recommend your approval of this plan as the only solution to our common problems. Current and future generations of our youngsters will be greatly affected by your decision.

The efforts of the school department, to provide quality education, this past year and next year are many and varied.

The first summer school program was offered to help elementary students with reading problems. The program was made possible by a federal grant and was under the direction of Mrs. Frances Duff. Six weeks of intensive work resulted in a half year

gain in reading comprehension and rate skills for the average enrollee. The program was most successful and is a tribute to all staff members participating.

The establishment of an in-service training for our elementary staff to prepare them for teaching the new mathematics.

A seminar, for interested parents, to give them an insight into the new mathematics and its terminology.

A major adoption of new elementary science textbooks. This curriculum area was greatly advanced to keep pace with the volume of knowledge necessary in a scientific and technological society.

The welcome addition of five student teachers from the State College at Bridgewater. They were provided with the helpful skills and direction of the master teachers and at the same time brought new ideas and skills from the college campus to our students.

Organization of a formal physical education program which will enhance this area of our total curriculum.

A part-time librarian working to establish a central school resource center in the junior high school.

A part-time remedial reading teacher to work with and follow up on the students in the summer reading program and any student in need of remedial help in the junior high school.

An after school shop program, under the direction of Mr. John Souza, introduced 12 boys to the need of a formal education, in the world of work. This was illustrated by field trips, guest speakers and actual work in the field of the students' choice. All shop work was related to the school curriculum. The offerings of a foreign language to all seventh and eighth graders as part of their course of study.

A continued and expanded program of adoption and coordination of our textbooks throughout the system.

Creation of a new sixth grade to accommodate the large number of enrollees at this grade level. This now brings all grade levels in town to four divisions each.

Transfers of youngsters out of assigned school districts to create smaller and more equitable classes. This enhances the learning opportunities of all of the youngsters.

While progress has been made new plans are being formulated for the coming year.

An evening program, the first in Acushnet, is being arranged for adults. Education is a never ending process and this year a contribution will be made by the school department to this end. If the limited program proves successful, it will be expanded next year.

Understanding the commitments of working parents and the conflict with school hours, the Acushnet Schools will introduce an evening guidance program. Any parent wishing to discuss their child's progress or educational or vocational goals may speak to a guidance person by scheduling an evening appointment. This person will be pleased to discuss the child, in privacy and confidence, and advise you on the matter.

An increase in audio-visual and library materials will make available classroom libraries in the elementary schools and further expansion of the central junior high school library. If a youngster is to read, good books must be made available to him.

A plan to adopt new social studies textbooks that will include the latest multi-discipline approach of sociology, anthropology, civics, history and geography together with economics.

A study with possible adoption of new language arts textbooks with consideration for the "new" language of linguistics.

The Acushnet Schools will continue to field test science experiments for a leading textbook and equipment distributor. Acushnet Schools have been selected as a sample community to carry on this work. The equipment is then retained by the school department to enrich the curriculum.

The establishment of two long awaited positions, those of an Art Coordinator and a Music Coordinator. This will formalize the programs in these areas and give our students a new avenue to expand their talents and background.

Created a new honors science program to meet the needs of students showing outstanding ability and achievement in this discipline.

Budget allowances to increase and update the secondary science equipment. This will allow for the new experimental approaches to the science curriculum.

Partnership and membership in the regional federal grant for Project "Cod." Some 40 communities including Acushnet, will utilize the service of a regional planning center. The grant of some \$95,000 will provide in-service training for the staff members, bring the latest programs and innovations to our fingertips and study and project our future needs and suggest methods of meeting these needs.

A cooperative project with the Fairhaven Public Schools for a speech and hearing lab that is mobile, will provide much needed

help to these handicapped children in a most modern facility. This will be funded by the federal government at a cost of \$33,000.00.

#### The Future

Previously, we mentioned the fact that we shall soon outdistance our school facilities in our efforts to provide quality education. You will find listed below a series of new implementations by the Board of Education for the Commonwealth which will illustrate the changes that will be forthcomig.

1. Mandated kindergartens by 1973. We do not have rooms available.

2. Daily Physical Education in all grades (k-12). We do not have these facilities.

3. Meeting the needs of physical, emotional and mentally handicapped children. We do not have the facilities to do so.

4. Implementation of forced unified school districts for any district that does not contain 2,000 students. We do not approach this figure.

5: Pupil-teacher ratios and class size. We could not meet the requirements, as they are written for it will call for additional classroom and office space.

6. Curriculum guides from the department of education. This will insure quality education in our and other programs.

These and other factors will influence our concerns for the coming year. The challenge is presented and we must meet it and if possible exceed it. Concrete, positive steps forward have been taken but many remain. Your school committee, administrators and teachers will continue to provide quality education for the Acushnet school children.

You are asked to study the Financial Report for the Schools. Note should be taken of the Chapter 70 Aid (Sales Tax). Note the amounts Acushnet is entitled to receive and the actual amount Acushnet did receive. This is caused because 20% of this sales tax has been diverted to finance state government that is not part of education. You are asked to write to your representatives and urge them to restore all yields of the sales tax to finance education.

#### **Maintenance and Repairs**

The future plans for certain elementary schools is in doubt at this time. The School Committee will not invest in large scale renovations to these schools. All investments will be evaluated in the light of the projected life of the school.

The Parting Ways School received much needed repairs to the roof. One side of the roof was reshingled.

The Mason W. Burt School had new toilet facilities installed. The fourth grade room was paneled and has provided a more cheerful and well lighted learning atmosphere.

The parking lot at the junior high school was resealed by the custodian during the summer months.

Roof repairs were made at the Marie S. Howard School and a skylight was installed.

Three rooms at the junior high school were repainted.

Mr. Matthew Niziolek retired during the past year and with him goes a part of our school system. Mr. Niziolek had worked as the custodian of the Parting Ways School from 1928 to the present.

This retirement caused the re-assignment of some custodial help. Mr. Kuthan moved from the junior high school to Parting Ways School and Mr. Norman Choquette joined the custodial staff at the junior high school.

All of the custodial staff has worked diligently during the past year and maintain their buildings in excellent condition.

The school lunch program has enjoyed success for still another year The staff has worked hard to provide nourishing Type "A" lunches for the junior high school students. The average meal count per day is 400 hot lunches. Rising costs of food and labor will influence the future success of the program. To this date, this program has been self supporting. If inflation continues it will be necessary to seek additional town appropriation to finance the program.

The high participation by the students is a tribute to the quality of the meals served by a fine cafeteria staff.

### REPORT OF THE SCHOOL PHYSICIAN AND NURSES

Acushnet, Massachusetts January 27, 1968

To the Members of the School Committee, The Superintendent, Teachers, and The Residents of the Town of Acushnet:

Another year has passed and we (the School Physician and Nurses) respectfully submit for your consideration a report on important data concerning our accomplishments during the year 1967.

School health examinations were given to all children entering the first grade, as well as to students in the 4th, 6th, and 9th grades, and to aspirants for the baseball and basketball teams. 511 students were examined: 136 with parents present, 369 without parents present; and 6 examinations by their own physician. Of these 511 examinations the following conditions or defects were noted:

Parents were informed of these conditions which required further care and of 60 families so informed, 57 completed medical corrective care.

The Massachusetts Vision Examination was administered during the months of October and November to 1402 pupils. Of these, 125 failed the test and 102 of the 125 completed medical examination and care.

The Massachusetts Pure-Tone Audiometer Test for Hearing was given to 1375 pupils in February and March. Of the 35 who failed the test, 33 completed remedial care.

Sponsored by our Board of Health and the Bristol County Health Association, the Heaf Test for Tuberculosis was performed on 414 pupils in Kindergarten, the 1st, the 4th and 8th grades. Of these 414 pupils tested, 23 reacted positively and were thus followed with Mantoux Tests and Pulmonary X-rays with the result that 21 pupils were eliminated, and only two positive tuberculin reactors were found. These two pupils are now receiving medical treatment.

During September and October, 1413 children were measured for height and weight recorded.

In March, inoculations of Diphtheria, Pertussis and Tetanus Toxoid or Diphtheria and Tetanus Toxoid were offered to preprimary classes, Grades 5 and 1. Through this procedure, 98 students received D-P-T inoculations and 95 students received D-T inoculations.

The clinic which is held at 2 P.M. on the first Wednesday of each month and which has been held for over 20 years in the Russell Memorial Library, is now being held in the Assembly Hall on the second floor of the Town Hall. The reason for moving being because of the additional conveniences of a telephone and the proximity to the Board of Health and Nurses Office.

At this clinic, we have given a total of 1218 immunization procedures:

- 69 children immunized against Measles.
- 50 Small-pox vaccinations.
- 136 children received Tri-Valent Oral Polio Vaccine.
  - 26 children completed the series of three inoculations required for Diphtheria, Pertussis and Tetanus. (Diphtheria, Whooping Cough and Lockjaw.)
- 145 children received booster inoculations of Diphtheria, Pertussis and Tetanus Toxoid.
- 102 children received booster inoculations of Diphtheria-Tetanus Toxoid.
  - 2 adults received Tetanus Toxoid inoculations.

668 people received inoculations of Influenza Vaccine.

Thus, it can be seen that a worthy cause has been well served. We enjoyed the companionship and co-operation of all who have co-operated in making a success of our programs and efforts. We especially thank and appreciate the co-operation of the students, their parents, the school committee, the superintendent and teachers, our co-workers, and our board of health and selectmen. We hope that the Russell Memorial Library Association does not miss us too much; we certainly appreciated the use of their facilities for so many years.

### REPORT OF ACUSHNET BOARD OF HEALTH FOR 1967

To the Officers and Residents of the Town of Acushnet:

The Board of Health respectfully submits the following report for the year 1967:

Immediately following the election, the newly elected member, Mr. Joseph H. LePage, was sworn into office by the Town Clerk. At the first regular meeting the Board of Health was organized as follows:

Chairman—Emile R. Houle Clerk—Edward W. Church, Jr. Inspector—Joseph H. LePage

The Board of Health was very pleased with the results of the report received from the Massachusetts Committee on Children and Youth. This committee visited the town and conducted an independent investigation of the health services that are offered the children and youth of Acushnet. They stated that the efforts made by the Town of Acushnet, through the Board of Health, to provide public and school health services for children are commendable. The provision of services in town follows the patterns of sound public health planning and operation. The report has made some recommendations for improvement of services which the Board of Health is taking under consideration.

The Board of Health has been very active this year in trying to solve the Town Dump problem. Many meetings have been attended and much time and thought has been given this problem. The final decision has not been received and this problem will have to be carried on into next year.

Medicare has been in its first full year and the town has received a great increase in revenue for the nursing service provided under this program. A total of 16 patients received care under this program.

There were a total of 10 premature births in the Town of Acushnet for the year 1967 and of this total one case was aided by the Board of Health.

A total of 19 deaths, 10 male and 9 female, were reported for this year.

Board of Health Dental Clinics were held during the year. Fourteen clinics with a total charge of \$1,348.00 for the clinics. The children paid \$198.00 and the balance of \$1,150.00 was paid by the Board of Health. Dental Clinic is available to the first four grades due to the limited amount of money that we have to use for Dental Clinic.

The following services were rendered:

42 examinations	1 porc. filling
108 treatments	11 extractions
8 treatment fillings	2 X-ray
112 fillings	42 prophylasis

Two hundred and four visits were made to the clinic and 82 children were completed and 41 new children were seen by the dentist.

School Heaf Testing Program in conjunction with the Bristol County Health Association was held in December. A total of 414 children were tested and there were 23 positive reactors. Positive reactors and contacts are being tested and X-rayed and some reactors have been placed on medication.



The Mobile X-ray Unit was here on June 15, 1967 and 553 people were X-rayed.

Monthly Well-Baby Clinics were held at the Russell Memorial Library on the first Wednesday of each month from 2-4 P.M. No clinic is held during July and August.

Three active cases of Pulmonary TB were reported during the year. Two of these cases are now hospitalized at Norfolk County Sanitarium. A large increase has been made in the Board of Health budget due to these cases.

This year we sponsored two Flu Clinics in October and November.

# REPORT OF TRUSTEES OF RUSSELL MEMORIAL LIBRARY

To the Townspeople of Acushnet:

Of course, the one thing that is always gratifying to report is being able to stay within our modest budget. As the town grows, we, naturally, hope the library facilities will also grow—and so will the budget. For the present, we feel we are getting the most for the expenditures in service to the Town. The experiment of opening one more evening—Tuesday from 6 to 8 P.M.—has proven very successful, and this will continue as part of the program.

Our main project for 1967 was the tiling of the lower hall floor. We also put in two extra bookcases in the main library for reference works and children's books.

Our staff's efforts on the summer story hour continues to be very well received, and serves to awaken the young children's interest in the library. Mrs. Gifford, our librarian, continues to offer books to the various teachers who request a loan during the school year. More and more teachers are taking advantage of this program.

The Massachusetts Art Week arts and crafts exhibit was one of the best we have had—both in display and attendance. We wish more of our townspeople would take advantage of this once-a-year art exhibit to see what nice work is being done in our town. We will continue to provide as much library service as we can in the future and are always glad to hear from our people who have suggestions as to how we can improve within our structure.

A beautiful watercolor of the Head of the River Bridge was donated to our library in memory of Anna Wing White by her daughters. The painting was done by Arthur Cumming in the 1880's. At one time Mr. Cumming was supervisor of drawing in the New Bedford Public Schools. Later he taught art at the Swain School of Design. Mr. Cumming was a noted watercolorist, and won recognition for both his watercolors and pen and ink sketches. His painting of the Head of the River is quite different from the wellknown painting of Clement Swift, and makes a wonderful addition to the library collection.

The Trustees are very appreciative of this gift, and we invite our people to come in during library hours to see this painting.

The Board of Trustees and the library staff were saddened during the year by the death of Mrs. Frances E. Gifford who had served on the board for many years, and contributed much to bettering library service in the town. Her passing was a great loss not only to the library department, but to the whole town.
