#### REPORT OF THE BOARD OF SELECTMEN

#### To the Citizens of Acushnet:

We submit herewith our report for the year ending December 31, 1972.

At the organizational meeting of the Board following the annual town election, Elton A. Ashley was elected Chairman for the year. This year saw the reelection of Gerard Charest for a three (3) year term, being his fifth (5th) term.

The Board met every Monday night at 7 PM, in their offices at Town Hall. The usual reports were discussed with department heads, and many appointments were scheduled with the town residents and varying government agencies. Inasmuch as our town is on the grow, it has been necessary to meet with our neighboring towns, City of New Bedford, also many government agencies in Boston.

This year was a most ambitious one, much was done in remedying various ills throughout town. Our Highway Department, in cooperation with Tibbetts Engineering Corp. of New Bedford pursued a most vigorous schedule, which saw much roadwork accomplished, drainage and reconstruction.

This was the first year our town qualified for Commonwealth funds under the Chapter 81 program, thus receiving the sum of \$12,416.00, which was put to good use in various road projects.

Our town continued to be involved in the Emergency Employment Act (EEA) program, and reaped many benefits, having a Business Manager in the School Department, also we had three (3) full time laborers in the Highway Department, also one (1) laborer

for a 7 month period in the Park Department, also four (4) young men of high school age worked 26 hours weekly for the nine week summer vacation, all at no expense to the town.

Legalized BEANO came into being, as did the Lottery, thus providing additional revenue to our town.

CABLE TV will come to fruition in our town sometime in 1973-74, as your Board awarded a license to International Telemeter of Bristol County, Inc. (subsidiary of Gulf & Western). This will provide another service to our residents, also will produce additional revenue for the town coffers.

The former Parting Ways School Building was turned over to this office and a Special Town Meeting vote authorized the expenditure of \$60,000 to refurbish this, which will be used for much needed office space for our Police Department, Council on Aging, Board of Health, also Boy and Girl Scouts. We might add this committee spent many long hours on a volunteer basis in refurbishing this building.

In September we forwarded a preliminary application to HUD for a water line for the north and northeast parts of town, which would provide much needed water services to this growing area.

Many new committees were formed during 1972, most notably the Industrial Development Commission, Soil Conservation Board, Board of Appeals and Historical Commission. In time these boards should prove a boon to our town government.

We are continuing to be a member of the Regional Solid Waste Committee, comprising New Bedford, Fairhaven, Dartmouth and many hours have been devoted to solve this ever increasing problem.

The Board of Selectmen would like to thank the several town

departments for their cooperation, assistance, and sincere dedication towards solving the difficulties for our residents.

It has been a pleasure working with you and we look forward to continued harmony in the coming year, and it is our sincere wish that we continue to progress for the betterment of all the people.

## ANNUAL REPORT OF THE OLD COLONY REGIONAL VOCATIONAL-TECHNICAL HIGH SCHOOL DISTRICT COMMITTEE

To the Officers and Residents of the Towns of Acushnet, Carver, Mattapoisett and Rochester:

This report is offered with the intention of summarizing the activities of the Old Colony District Committee for 1972 and our plans for the future.

The initial six town committee (Acushnet, Carver, Freetown, Lakeville, Mattapoisett and Rochester) met for the first time as a reorganized body on March 2, 1972. Sub-committees were assigned to the tasks of developing curriculum, site, school name, seal design and philosophy recommendations. Architectural interviews were conducted simultaneously with the search for an acceptable school site, the location of which was to be in keeping with the terms of the District agreement.

On April 12, 1972, the first proposed district operational and capital budget was voted. In May the official district and school name was adopted — Old Colony Regional Vocational-Technical High School District. The Boston architectural firm of Campbell, Aldrich, and Nulty was selected to design the vocational-technical facility.

In a series of special town meetings, during which the district's operating and capital budgets were presented for consideration, the towns of Freetown and Lakeville indicated their unwillingness to continue membership in the Old Colony District. The decision of Freetown and Lakeville caused a delay in the District's plans but this action did not deter the four remaining towns from quick-

ly adopting a withdrawal amendment; at the same time, the services of Dr. George Collins, an educational consultant, were obtained to help develop educational specifications for the facility.

On October 26, 1972, the rebirth of the District again took place. Freetown and Lakeville were formally withdrawn from the Old Colony District, and in the second meeting of that memorable day, the people of Acushnet, Carver, Mattapoisett and Rochester, authorized the construction of a vocational-technical high school.

In quick succession, the school site, a parcel of land located in South Middleborough Road in North Rochester and adjoining the Rochester Town Forest, received approval by various state, health, conservation and educational agencies. The school seal was adopted and the now completed educational specifications were approved by School Building Assistance Bureau. The architects began to enter into the details of designing the total project.

As the year approached its' end, your District Committee continued to meet on a weekly schedule in order to reach their September, 1974 student occupancy date.

There can be no question that significant progress has been made in 1972. But, if we measure our accomplishments in terms of what still needs to be done, there can be little room for complacency. Our district indicated by its' vote on October 26, 1972 that it could no longer afford a piecemeal approach to vocational education for its young people and adults. Stopgap measures and token efforts were to be no longer tolerated. It became clear that Acushnet, Carver, Mattapoisett and Rochester demanded to have a permanent, universal, continuing program of occupational education, readily available to all persons of all age groups and level of ability.

The Old Colony program promises to be a dramatic challenge to

all of us. It will require human resources far beyond the commitments that have been made thus far, but if we are truly to serve all the people in the four member communities, it is certain that progress can be made only with the fullest measure of local involvement and participation. Your District Committee has great faith in vocational education and in the Citizens of our communities. We have no doubt that the towns will continue to provide the encouragement needed to have Old Colony materialize from what is now a collection of ideas to an operating building. Each Committee member will continue to give that "extra effort" in order to realize our goal of a permanent, universal program of vocational education. To that end, we pledge our time, our talent, our resources and ourselves.

This report would not be complete without a public expression of thanks for the cooperation given the District Committee by area school superintendents: Mr. F. Edward Nicolas, Plymouth-Carver District; Dr. Joseph C. Kunces, Old Rochester District, and Mr. John Souza, Jr., Acushnet. Special thanks go to the elected officials and townspeople of our District, for their confidence in us, during the past year.

# REPORT OF TRUSTEES OF RUSSELL MEMORIAL LIBRARY

To the Officers and the Residents of the Town of Acushnet:

Library services during 1972 continued as usual. Our librarians are always ready to be of service to everyone coming to the library. They stand ready to helpfully explain our library services available to all — from the youngest to the oldest cardholder and to interested newcomers. We continue as a member of the Regional Library system which enables our townspeople to hold cards without charge in the New Bedford library system — and take advantage of other extended privileges.

The "Summer-Read-In" program was well received, and certificates were awarded to those who completed the list. The number of total registered borrowers increased by 176 to 2,256, of whom 102 were juveniles or younger. Total volumes were increased by 670 to a total of 14,438 — an excellent figure for a small library. Mrs. Olive M. Gifford, Librarian, reports that total circulation for the year was 26,722 — up again over the previous year.

We are very grateful for the books and periodicals donated by our townspeople and others during the year.

Again, the last full week in May, we participated in the observance of Massachusetts Art Week — this being our 13th Annual Art Show. We try to have an interesting show each year, and we invite all those who may never have dropped in to see these exhibits to please be our guests. You don't have to be an artist to enjoy it — and we are sure you'll be proud to see how much talent we have in our town.

We were able to cover the large leaded windows with an unbreakable covering this year, and certainly hope this will solve the problem of vandalism suffered over the years concerning these expensive windows.

Gutters and conductor pipes with their dry wells had to be repaired — another expensive item, but necessary to the upkeep of our building.

The program for 1973 includes, among other things, the painting of the outside trim and some interior work.

While giving the townspeople the services needed, the Board of Trustees strives to keep the cost of operations down in these inflationary times, and to this end we have 100% cooperation from our devoted personnel.

# SOUTHEASTERN REGIONAL PLANNING AND ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT DISTRICT COMMISSION

To the Officers and the Residents of the Town of Acushnet:

Acushnet's representatives on the Southeastern Regional Planning and Economic Development District Commission are Alfred E. Portway, on behalf of the Selectmen, and Henry L. Guilbeault from the Planning Board.

The role of SRPEDD, one of the twelve regional planning agencies covering all of Massachusetts, is (1) to develop regional plans, particularly for issues of more than local concern, (such as transportation) thereby making member municipalities eligible for certain types of federal financial assistance; (2) to provide assistance to member communities in the areas of zoning, development planning, environmental protection, governmental structure and services; (3) review local plans and proposals for compatibility with regional plans and to ensure that a municipality does not create problems for its neighbors; (4) serve as a forum for the discussion of issues touching more than one municipality and as a liaison with some State and federal offices.

The SRPEDD's operating budget is derived from two major sources. Each member community provides funds at a rate of 15 cents per capita. Other funds come from federal and State grants. During 1972, over \$475,000 was spent on projects benefiting District communities.

Membership in the SRPEDD has greatly benefited the town in several ways. The District maintains certification of the member communities in such areas as land use, water and sewer, open space and recreation and economic development. Without such certification, communities would not be eligible for the federal funding of projects in these fields. The town's participation in an economic development district also increases in some cases the federal funding portion of a public works or technical assistance project from 67% - 75% of the total project cost.

The District is also carrying out solid waste management and transportation planning programs which are designed to alleviate some of the critical problems in these areas.

The District has provided specific services to Acushnet. For example, the District staff assisted the town in filing for a water improvement application to the Department of Housing and Urban Development, which could result in a \$976,500 grant for the town.

SRPEDD itself does not have the legal mandate to effect any of its plans. Each town itself, or in concert with others, or by direction of the General Court must make that "Let's Do It" decision. Through Acushnet's membership and our representation, this town has a voice in matters of regional concern and is thus able to let Acushnet's opinion be considered equally with the other 29 communities in SRPEDD.

The Commission meets monthly to discuss and vote on solutions to the area's problems. The staff and Commission have been immeasurably aided by the part-time (usually evening) efforts of citizen groups concerned with such topics as industrial development, housing, conservation, etc. These groups are open to all and we hope some of you will join with us in furthering orderly progress.

#### ACUSHNET HISTORICAL COMMISSION

To the Officers and the Residents of the Town of Acushnet:

Organization: The Acushnet Historical Commission came into existence in October 1972, following a directive issued by the Massachusetts Historical Commission and a formal vote of the Acushnet Town Meeting. The seven members of the AHC, appointed by selectmen are: Mrs. Josephine Allen, 16 Westland Street; Richard Driscoll, 7 Earle Street; Harold Crapo, Jr., 35 Oliveira Avenue; Leo Jackson, 1122 Main Street; Mrs. Bertha Holt, 22 Wing Road; Mrs. Janet Martin, 49 Porter Street; and Mrs. Madeleine Kaduboski, 44 Lantern Lane. On November 28, 1972, the Commission met and elected the following officers; Chairman — Leo Jackson; Vice-Chairman — Richard Driscoll; Secretary — Madeleine Kaduboski.

The primary objective of the Acushnet Historical Commission will be the identification, preservation and restoration of historic sites and buildings within town borders. The following proposals have been suggested for future action by the AHC in conjunction with interested Acushnet residents:

- 1. Researching colonial and American Revolutionary period sites in 1973 to insure Acushnet participation in the *BICEN-TENNIAL* on both state and national levels
- 2. Purchasing historic plaques and/or site markers for historic sites and edifices.
- 3. Possible acquisition of the Long Plain School.
- 4. Probable development of this school into a permanent his-

toric museum, housing artifacts and documents of regional and town history.

- 5. Introduction of local history units and special research projects within town schools.
- 6. Establishment of liaison between Massachusetts Historical Commission and the Acushnet Historical Commission.
- 7. Investigation of historically valuable properties that AHC could save from deterioration and destruction.
- 8. Gradual drafting of historic brochures and maps describing Acushnet landmarks.
- 9. Development of Acushnet historic awareness by encouraging compilation and preservation of all historic primary source material directly related to the town.

To augment and complete the preceding plans, the Acushnet Historical Commission will actively solicit loans and donations of historic documents and books which will illustrate Acushnet Social, political and economic history.

### REPORT OF THE ACUSHNET BOARD OF HEALTH

To the Officers and Residents of the Town of Acushnet:

The Board of Health respectfully submits the following report:

Immediately following the election, the newly elected member, Girard R. St. Amand, was sworn into office by the Town Clerk. At the next regular meeting of the Board of Health it was voted to organize as follows:

Chairman – Joseph H. Lepage Clerk – Emile R. Houle Inspector – Girard R. St. Amand

This year we served 22 patients under the Medicare program, 11 patients under the stroke program and 24 patients under other programs. We are still working with St. Luke's Hospital in providing care for all discharged stroke patients. We have a contract with St. Luke's Hospital for Home Health Aides and Homemakers to Acushnet residents who need this kind of service.

We also have a contract with Easter Seal Society to provide speech and physical therapy for any residents who may need this type of service. We currently have 2 persons receiving physical therapy and 1 person receiving occupational therapy.

This past year ended our contract with the State Dept. for the Vaccination Assistance Program, but we plan to continue the practice of visiting all newborn babies so we will have contact with all children in town from birth on, wherever possible. We visited 67 newborn babies.

There were a total of 5 premature births in Acushnet. We gave aid to 1 and there were no premi deaths.

A total of 15 deaths were reported, 7 male and 8 female.

We will no longer have the Mobile X-ray Unit in town as a new plan has been instituted where people will be skin tested before they are x-rayed for Food Handlers. We issued 144 Food Handler Cards.

We skin tested 551 children and 37 adults under the Heaf Testing Program in December. There were 3 children and 2 adult positive reactors, and follow-ups will be made on these people. This program was sponsored by the Bristol County Health Association and the Board of Health.

Monthly Well Baby Clinics were held upstairs in the Town Hall the first Wednesday of each month, except July and August. These clinics were well attended and we appreciate the cooperation and the support of the parents of Acushnet. The nurses of this Dept. keep careful records of all our children, and all families are notified if any children are found to need any type of immunization. Follow-ups are always made on our childrens records and by the alertness of our nurses the children of our town are better off for it. The following immunizations were completed at the clinics:

This year the Board of Health again offered Flu Vaccine to the residents of Acushnet. We held 2 night clinics in October and Nov-

ember. 663 residents took advantage of this program.

The Board of Health feels that a good health program should be based on preventing disease, so we continue to carry on immunization and education in the Public Health field.

With the opening of our new Elementary School we have been able to keep a nurse in the school area almost full-time. We currently have 2 full-time and 1 part-time nurse working in our Public Health Program.

We held a drug program this year and we had moderate success with it. The parents who attended were very interested. We hope that we may again be able to offer the ones who are interested another program in 1973. The use of drugs is a problem in our town the same as it is in other towns and we should not turn our backs on it.

In the early part of the new year the Board of Health expects to move its office to their new quarters in the Parting Ways School. We will have much larger quarters which we badly need. The building is being refurbished and should be a great asset to the town.

We have high hopes of working with the Selectmen towards getting sewage started in our town. The sewage problem grows with each succeeding year. We also have a serious surface water problem. Much water is being pumped and it is running into our

streets. We have no answer to the surface water problem until we have some type of drainage in town and a sewage system seems to be the only answer.

# REPORT OF THE INDUSTRIAL & DEVELOPMENT COMMISSION

To the Officers and the Residents of the Town of Acushnet:

In accordance with the vote of the townspeople at the last annual town meeting the Board of Selectmen appointed the following 5 members:

- 1. Norman A. Alley 1 year
- 2. Rudolph H. Coles 2 years
- 3. Robert J. Martin 3 years
- 4. Charles A. Mayo 4 years, Chairman
- 5. Peter M. Vercellene 5 years, Secretary

Officers were elected at the second meeting and a tentative goal was set - lets get something done.

After meetings with other local area I.D.C. members, representatives of the State Dept. of Commerce & Development, and businessmen engaged in the building and promotion of industrial parks, it was decided that:

- 1. A financial authorizing unit was necessary (Economic Development & Industrial Corporation E.D.I.C.) in order to qualify the town for State & Federal funds.
- 2. A comprehensive series of maps must be developed in order to clarify and indicate developments in the town which can be used to encourage employers to move to this town.
- 3. A Recreational Complex, including a golf course, ice skating rink, tennis court, riding trails, picnic area, playing fields for

baseball, football and soccer, and an area for the recreational interests of the elderly, should be developed first since it could be expected to show a profit in the shortest length of time. In 3 years it would offer immediate benefits to the townspeople, and would be a further inducement to industry to move into this area.

4. That an Industrial Park should be developed as a long range program to shift the towns major revenue source from the taxation of single family dwellings to the taxation of business without allowing the businesses to develop in a helter-skelter manner all over the town but restricted to two areas.

An informal opinion survey held during a special town meeting in October, indicated that of those people answering the questions asked, 88.2% favor the formation of an E.D.I.C., but that more information regarding such a set-up must be made available, 73.3% favor the development of a Recreation Complex, and 82.4% favor the development of an Industrial Park.

Several phases of the map making project have been completed but formation of the financial unit and qualification for State and Federal funding has been delayed. Part of this delay was caused by the shakeup of the departments due to administrative changes. Preliminary land cost and construction cost estimates have been made for the Recreational Complex & Industrial Park projects. Numerous sub-committees are being formed to examine all phases of these projects and anyone wishing to help out is asked to contact any Industrial Development Committee members. People interested in a particular sport are especially needed.

A note of thanks must be given to the many town employees and other committee members for the help they have been to us. # REPORT OF THE HOUSING AUTHORITY

To the Officers and the Residents of the Town of Acushnet:

The Acushnet Housing Authority is proud to announce that some time in January 1973 we will enter into a contract with the Cumberland Construction Corp., Inc., So. Bellingham, Mass., the lowest responsible bidder, to construct a sixty (60) unit complex for the Elderly in the amount of \$1,075,000 (one million seventy-five thousand dollars).

The housing complex will contain a total of nine (9) separate buildings. Seven (7) two (2) story buildings each containing eight (8) units making a total of fifty six (56) units.

One (1) story building consisting of four (4) units which will be known as the handicapped building.

One (1) Community building.

The Housing complex will be located on the north side of Main St., approximately six hundred (600) feet east of Mill Rd.

As of this date we have received a total of thirty-one (31) requests for admission. Anyone interested in obtaining admission is urged to write a letter to the Acushnet Housing Authority, Town Hall, Acushnet, 02734.

Applications for eligibility will be mailed on June 12, 1973. Eligibility requirements are briefly as follows:

- a. American citizen
- b. a disabled person (regardless of age) not a minor

- c. a person 65 years or older
- d. maximum income of \$3,500 for single person
- e. maximum income of \$4,200 for married couple

The maximum rent to be charged is 25% of monthly income.

The sixty (60) apartments will each consist of a living room, bedroom, kitchen and bath. Each unit will be equipped with a cooking stove, refrigerator, kitchen cabinets and window drapes.

The Authority wants to thank all persons who have helped in some way to make this dream possible including the Selectmen and Dept. of Community Affairs.
