

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF SELECTMEN

The Board of Selectmen organized in April with Gerard Charest being elected Chairman for the fifth time in his illustrious career which spans 23 years in our town government.

Much has been accomplished this past year. Much needs to be done, however the economy situation may curb our progress. We have become acutely aware that regionalization is the only answer to most of our major problems.

In the area of sewerage, refuse disposal, transportation, vocational training, all steps taken have been done with the joint cooperation of the City of New Bedford, Fairhaven & Dartmouth. We are also involved with these communities and others in the UHF Police radio system that is to be a reality in the summer of 1975. This is the most modern communications system in which our town is to receive an approximate value of \$30,000 for \$1,800 due to this federal funding program. We are taking every advantage in obtaining federal/state funds where practicable.

We can no longer "go it alone". The problems are not unique to Acushnet. They are everyone's problems. More and more does the government recognize that monies must be spent to accomplish these projects, and that money will be saved by regionalization.

Some of the major accomplishments are listed herewith:

Nye's Lane Drainage and Reconstruction completed to New Bedford line. Middle Road Drainage and Reconstruction. Lisa Ave. Reconstruction and Curbing.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF SELECTMEN

Northwest Master Drainage and Road Reconstruction (off Nye's Lane) this was a mammoth project nearly completed in December which was an outstanding accomplishment by our Highway Department. The town undoubtedly realized a savings of over \$100,000 by our own forces completing this project.

Drainage system installed in parts of Mattapoisett Rd. Student Government Day was held again.

The town took advantage of more Federal funding thru the Neighborhood Youth Corps (NYC) program having utilized the services of our youth who accomplished a great deal throughout the town this past summer. Also our town was unique in having sent some 35 children ages 8-15 to Lincoln Park for a days outing at no cost to our townspeople.

We also took advantage of the CETA program, having hired a Clerk-Typist in the Police Dept. also several laborers in the Highway Department, also several teacher aides in the School Department.

Civil Service has dictated the termination of all our Provisional Police Officers who for so many years performed a valuable service. We thank these men and their families and wish them well.

We were also saddened by the sudden death of veteran Selectman Clement St. Amand, Jr. on February 20.

We also welcomed our new addition Ted Cioper who was elected on April 22 to replace Mr. St. Amand.

The cooperation of all town Boards has once more given Acushnet a "big year". We have had "big" growth, "big" problems, but most of all continue with "BIG" hopes for the future.

REPORT OF THE HIGHWAY DEPARTMENT

To the Officers and Residents of the Town of Acushnet:

The year started out very good since Mother Nature blessed us with a mild winter. The months of January, February & March saw the Department doing the normal chores of the season, such as cutting brush, filling sand barrels, patching pot holes and on occassion sanding icy streets.

April, however, brought a change of pace which stayed with us right through the last day of the year. This all started when we undertook the reconstruction of the following streets in the Northwest Drainage Area:

Randall Street (1060 ft.)St. Lawrence Street (305 ft.)Lawton Street (220 ft.)Lussier Street (980 ft.)Lague Street (780 ft.)Lambert Street (450 ft.)Cox Street (1700 ft.)Park Drive (1664 ft.)Besse Street (160 ft.)Park Drive (1664 ft.)

Never before had the Highway Department attempted such a large project. There were 7000 linear feet to be excavated, filled with gravel, graded, compacted and surfaced. When this work was completed, the task of landscaping almost three miles of edges had to be done, but the weather got cold and the landscaping on Park Drive and part of Lussier Street was postponed until spring.

It was now late in October and the Department transferred their efforts to the reconstruction of Lisa Avenue. This was another street that required the removal of large quantities of bad material and

replacing it with good gravel. The surface was placed on Lisa Avenue just two weeks before the asphalt plant closed for the winter, and again the landscaping was postponed until spring.

From Lisa Avenue we moved to Mattapoisett Road where we started to construct a drainage system containing 926 feet of concrete pipe and five manholes. We left this job for one day to build a leaching basin on Anthony Street and again for one week to put in one catch basin and 120 feet of concrete pipe on Peckham Road. The end of the year found us still on Mattapoisett Road with about half of the drainage system in the ground.

In addition to the various projects mentioned, the normal functions of the Department were also carried out. Duties such as rubbish collection, brush cutting, sign replacement, sand barrels snow fencing, patches and many other chores too numerous to mention.

We sincerely hope to continue the type of road reconstruction that we did this year and hopefully we can shorten the long list of poor streets that we now have.

The number of borrowers increased during the past year--both adults, young adults, and juveniles. This is very gratifying to those who are committed to the operations of your library - personnel and Board of Trustees.

REPORT OF THE ACUSHNET FIRE DEPARTMENT

To the Officers and Residents of the Town of Acushnet:

The following is a report of activities by the Acushnet Fire Department for the year ending 31, December 1974.

The Fire Department is made up of three (3) permanent full time firefighters and a full time Chief. We also have a complement of twelve (12) Call Fire Officers and thirty-two (32) Call Firefighters. We maintain two (2) Fire Stations, Station # 1 located in the Town Hall and Fire Station # 2 located on Main Street in the North end of Town. The Station in the North end of Town is manned strictly by Volunteer Call Fire Officers and Call Firefighters. We keep two trucks in that station.

Our fire fighting equipment consists of four combination fire trucks, *ie.* pumper, ladder, hose and water carriers; one (1) rescue truck; and one (1) Rescue Boat and trailer. The age of our trucks vary from twenty-six (26) years old to eight (8) years old. (1949 to 1967) Our activities consisted of 342 actual truck responses to incidents listed below:

To the Officers and Residents of the Town of Acushnet:

We are pleased to report that Acushnet continued during 1974 to benefit from its membership in the Southeastern Regional Planning and Economic Development District (SRPEDD).

SRPEDD is one of the State's 13 regional planning agencies and Acushnet is one of the District's 30 municipalities. Formed in accordance with Chapter 40B of the Massachusetts General Laws, the District enables Acushnet to plan jointly with its neighbors for the purpose of promoting with the greatest efficiency and economy the coordinated and orderly development of the area and the general welfare and prosperity of our citizens.

This planning is done by a full-time staff with policy guidance being provided by a Commission composed of two representatives from each community. Acushnet's delegates are Robert Honohan on behalf of the Board of Selectmen and Henry Guilbeault from the Planning Board.

Acushnet provided \$1,165.05 of the District's 1973 budget of \$515,000. In return we received 172 manhours of direct assistance,

thus saving the town over \$ 1,700.00. The principal project was zoning by-law draft. In addition the town benefited from the District's areawide work on such topics as transportation, housing, and economic development.

Acushnet will be similarly benefited in 1975. SRPEDD will continue to provide technical assistance to the municipalities within its boundaries as well as be conducting valuable regional planning efforts such as transportation and water resource protection.

ACUSHNET HISTORICAL COMMISSION

To the Officers and Residents of the Town of Acushnet:

This Commission was established by a Town Meeting to preserve anything of historical value, research historical events and plan a Bicentennial Celebration for the Town. The first year, we researched and planned that which we thought would be something of lasting importance to our community. This year was spent with the carrying out of some of these plans.

We were the first in Southeastern Massachusetts to fly the Bicentennial Flag over our Town Hall. This flag is given to us with a certificate, as a Historical Community, by the Secretary of State. A plaque was placed at the Head of the River, to mark the site of the battle with the British on September 8, 1778. This battle was reenacted in September of 1974 and will become a yearly event.

A bicycle trail has been marked out and signs are being placed connecting this trail with that of Fairhaven, New Bedford, Westport and Dartmouth. This bikeway will be recorded with the State Department and become a tourist attraction. Maps with local places of interest and their history will be printed and made available to tourists.

We wish to thank Ronald Gaudette for the making of the stocks that have been placed on the lawn of the Parting Ways Building. They were made to simulate the original ones that were located at the Rivers End, where the last whipping took place in 1779 for stealing.

ACUSHNET HISTORICAL COMMISSION

The plans for the museum in the Long Plain School are in the near future, with hopes that they will be realized in the fall of 1975.

We have researched and put plaques on fifty homes dating before 1860 and are still looking for more. The oldest house now standing in Acushnet was built in 1720. These homes have been accepted by the Secretary of the Commonwealth, John Davoren, as Historical Sites.

This commission would welcome any ideas as to ways to celebrate our 200th birthday and if anyone knows of anything of historical interest, please contact us. Our meetings are held the second Tuesday of each month at 7:30 P.M. in the Town Hall and are open to the public.

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The Board of Health respectfully submits the following report for the year 1974.

Immediately following the election, the newly elected member, Emile R. Houle, was sworn into office by the Town Clerk.

At the next regular meeting the Board organized as follows:

Chairman	Girard R. St. Amand
Clerk	Joseph H. Lepage
Inspector	Emile R. Houle

This year has been a very eventful year in the health care program of the Board of Health. After many attempts, we have been able to contract with St. Luke's Hospital for supervision which will start as of January 1, 1975. Also as of this date Mrs. Church was appointed Chief Nurse-Director of the Nursing Division of the Board of Health.

We contract with Easter Seal Society for Physical Therapy, Speech Therapy, Occupational Therapy, and Medical Social Work. These services are provided at the rate of \$17.00 per visit.

We contract with St. Luke's Hospital for Homemaker-Home Health Aide's which they supply. The rates for this service were increased to \$4.00 per hour as of November 1, 1974.

With the coming of the new Special Needs Law, Chapter 766, we have been active in helping the School Department implement this law. The Nursing Department is responsible for home visits and Dr. Jeffrey has been responsible for the physical examinations for all children who are up for Core evaluation. This has added a new dimension to our work and it is especially rewarding to help any child or their parents with a special education need.

Nursing visits are increasing with the early discharge of patients from the hospital and we have found it necessary to use part-time help in the Nursing Department as the work load increases. We have a school nurse on duty 8:00 A. M. to 3:00 P. M. every day with extra coverage as the programs warrant. 8,121 Nursing Services were rendered during 1974.

As of October 25, 1974 the State Department of Public Health, Division of Health Care Standards and Regulations did a survey of the Nursing Division of the Acushnet Board of Health. Miss Ann M. McCabe, the Home Health Agency Surveyor spent the day in Acushnet and met with Dr. Jeffrey and Mrs. Church. Her recommendations were followed and we were certified as of this date for a year with no deficiencies.

We have set up a new Professional Advisory Committee with Dr. Jeffrey, Mrs. Jeanne O'Leary R.N., Mrs. Christina Gaudette, Social Worker. This Committee had their first meeting on November 6th. To complete this committee we are planning to add a consumer representative in 1975. This was at the request of Miss McCabe, our Agency Surveyor.

Senior Citizen Counselling sessions were held with a good response. We are planning to continue these on a monthly basis in 1975.

In 1975 we are planning a screening program for lead poisoning for all children 6 years old and under.

At the present time St. Luke's Hospital is notifying this Board directly of all new births who we visit.

We had a total of two premature births this year.

All residents who need Food Handler Cards are skin tested at 100 Brock Ave., New Bedford. We issued 76 Food Handler Cards this year.

In January we Heaf tested 534 children with 14 positive reactors. Mantoux program was conducted for these reactors.

We hold Well Baby Clinics the first Wednesday of each month except July and August. We keep careful check of school health records and parents are notified so that any children who may need immunizations can either go to their own Doctor or attend our clinic.

REPORT OF THE TREE WARDEN

ANNUAL REPORT 1974 - 75:

An annual survey has been made of trees on town roads to continue the practice of removing weak and dead trees.

The Tree Warden, Selectmen Office, Building Inspector and Planning Board are working together with a Community Resource Development Specialist of the Extension Service and the Bristol County Tree Wardens Association to formulate guidelines to be used by home builders and others who of necessity must dig or fill or travel around trees. This was brought to mind since some of the street trees removed recently were dead after the building of homes along the street.

The Police Department has been most cooperative in notifying the Tree Warden of dangerous situations involving hanging branches or breaking up of trees during storms and high winds. This has happened twice on Sundays in recent months when the Highway Department was not readily available, so we were able to, in a short time, correct this emergency situation.

The Shade Tree Nursery is a reality in the area of the Elementary School and Jr. High School with the help of school officials. Students are taking an active part in the growing of these trees.

REPORT OF THE CONSERVATION COMMISSION

To the Officers and Residents of the Town of Acushnet:

The year 1974 saw a 400% increase in the activities of the Acushnet Conservation Commission due to the sudden impact of the wet-lands protection act.

We held 7 Commission meetings, 3 public hearings for wet-land alteration permits, 25 on-site inspections concerning violations or determination of wet-lands, sent out 3 letters of warning threatening court action if violation did not desist, and referred 2 cases to the Board of Health for illegal dumping. We also attended meetings of the Buzzards Bay River Basin Commission and worked with a developer to establish a green belt in his sub-division to prevent a drainage problem in the future.

Work has been progressing in Davis Park, our 10 acre holding in the northeast part of Town. The parking lot has been graded and we have contracted to have trails cut and points of interest to be marked. With the funds requested for next year we hope to have signs made and this should enable us to open the park to the public.

We were greatly pleased when the sewerage flowing out of the New Bedford storm drain culvert under the Acushnet Saw Mill was finally stopped this year. We filed the first complaint in 1966 and have continued to do so every year since.

In 1975 we are going to ask the Town Meeting to approve a local wet-lands protection law. This will give control of wet-lands to the Town and the State cannot over-ride our decision unless the Court determines we were in error. At the present time Court action is not necessary because we have no zoning.

REPORT OF THE SAFETY COMMITTEE

To the Officers and Residents of the Town of Acushnet:

Recommendations have been made to the State to alter catch basins throughout the Town so as to help prevent one form of bicycle rider injury. This legislation is now pending and while waiting for a decision the Town will have the Highway Department paint the ground around each catch basin as a warning to bicyclists.

There has been a problem with open water holes and condemned buildings and many complaints have been made. As a remedy the property owners were asked to post warning signs regarding these water holes and 4 unsafe buildings were torn down and removed by the owners upon request of this Committee.

Also brush has been cut and removed on Middle, Hathaway, Mendall and Mattapoisett Roads to provide better visibility for traffic.

The New Bedford Traffic Commission has installed a No Parking sign on Mill Road near Tarkiln Hill Road upon our request. This was done to make negotiation of this corner by Fire apparatus and school buses safer.

The Safety Committee is made up of the Fire and Police Chiefs and one member from each precinct. If there exists any unsafe conditions in your area, please feel free to call either Chief for action.

REPORT OF THE STREET NAME COMMITTEE

The Street Name Committee held 10 meetings during the year 1974. The following is a summary of business conducted during the year:

Held meeting with developer of proposed Maplewood Estates off Middle Rd. to discuss the naming of 6 new streets for that development.

Changed the name of Berard St. to Dalton St. by unanimous vote of the residents of that street.

Discussed changing the name of Park Drive. Reviewed petition on the matter and residents voted unanimously to oppose any name change.

By vote of the 1974 annual Town Meeting the Street Name Committee was given the task to review the conditions of all town streets and report at the 1975 annual Town Meeting. After much hard work and long hours of getting the report together it is now ready.

The Street Name Committee also conducted a survey of needed street signs in town and gave this report to the Massachusetts Street Name Sign Program. The survey taken shows that approximately 330 street signs will be needed.

The Street Name Committee requested a special article be placed on the Town Warrant for the 1975 annual Town Meeting to purchase a Street Name Making Machine and related material to start a street sign replacement program in town. The machine would be used by the Highway Department.

REPORT OF THE STREET NAME COMMITTEE

In summation, the Street Name Committee feels a street sign replacement program should be started in Acushnet. The replacement of the already decayed wood street signs and in some cases non existing street signs with larger and reflective street signs would be a safety factor and also beautify the Town as well.

I submit herewith my report of an audit of the books and accounts of the Town of Acushnet for the period from January 1, 1972 to August 11, 1973, made in accordance with the provisions of Chapter 44, General Laws. This is in the form of a report made to me by Mr. Robert M. Crosby, Assistant Chief of Bureau.

Sir:

In accordance with your instructions, I have made an audit of the books and accounts of the Town of Acushnet for the period from January 1, 1972 to August 11, 1973 and report thereon as follows:

An examination and verification was made of the financial transactions as recorded on the books of the several departments receiving or disbursing money for the Town or committing bills for collection.

An analysis was made of the town accountant's ledgers for the period covered by the audit. The receipts were checked with the treasurer's books and the payments were compared with the warrants authorizing them and with the treasurer's records of payments. The appropriation accounts were checked with the town clerk's record of town meeting proceedings, and the recorded transfers from the reserve fund were verified by comparison with the records of the finance committee.

The necessary adjusting entries resulting from the audit were made, and a balance sheet, which is appended to this report, was prepared showing the financial condition of the town on August 11, 1973.

The appended balance sheet shows an overdraft in the "Arbitration Award - Elementary School Building" account amounting to \$6,026.01, contrary to the provisions of Section 31, Chapter 44 of the General Laws. The examination of the vouchers submitted by the various departments for payment showed several instances of insufficient detail and documentation of the charges. Such information is essential in order that the town accountant can make a proper determination as to whether or not a voucher shall be approved for payment as required by the provisions of Section 56, Chapter 41 of the General Laws.

The books and accounts of the treasurer were examined and checked in detail. The receipts, as recorded, were analyzed and checked with the records of the several departments collecting money for the town and with other sources from which money was paid into the treasury, while the payments were compared with the selectmen's warrants authorizing the treasurer to disburse town funds.

The cash book footings were verified, and the cash balance on August 11, 1973 was proved by actual count of the cash in the office, by examination of the savings bank book, and by reconciliation of the bank balance with a statement furnished by the bank in which town funds are deposited.

The Federal Revenue Sharing Funds were examined and checked. The funds received from the Federal government were listed, the appropriation voted was checked with the town clerk's record of town meeting proceedings, and the payments were compared with the selectmen's orders authorizing the disbursement of Federal Revenue Sharing Funds. The cash balance on August 11, 1973 was proved by verification of the savings bank book.

As of the audit date, August 11, 1973, \$16,996.74 in the Federal Revenue Sharing savings bank book is due the revenue general cash account.

The payments made on account of maturing debt and interest were compared with the amounts falling due and with the cancelled securities on file. The outstanding coupons were listed and reconciled with the balance in the coupon account as shown by a statement furnished by the depos.tory.

The savings bank books and securities representing the investment of the several trusts and investment funds in the custody of the town treasurer and the board of health were examined and listed. The income was proved and all expenditures or transfers to the town were checked in detail.

The records of tax titles held by the town were examined and listed. The amounts added to the tax title account were compared with the collector's records, the reported redemptions of tax titles were checked with the treasurer's cash book, and the tax titles and tax possessions on hand were listed, reconciled with the accountant's ledger, and compared with the records at the Registry of Deeds.

The books and accounts of the tax collector were examined and checked. The motor vehicle excise outstanding on January 1,1972, as well as all subsequent commitments of taxes, excise, and assessments, were audited and compared with the assessors' warrants issued for their collection. The payments to the treasurer were verified, the recorded abatements were checked with the assessors' records of abatements granted, the taxes transferred to the tax title account were proved, and the outstanding accounts were listed and proved with the respective controlling accounts in the general ledger.

The records of departmental and water accounts receivable were examined and checked. The commitments were proved, the collections were checked with the treasurer's recorded receipts, the abatements were verified by comparison with the records in the departments authorized to grant them, and the outstanding accounts were listed and reconciled with the respective controlling accounts in the general ledger. The outstanding tax, excise, departmental, and water accounts were verified by mailing notices to a number of persons whose names appeared on the books as owing money to the town, the replies received thereto indicating that the accounts, as listed, are correct.

The town clerk's records of dog and sporting licenses issued and and of receipts from miscellaneous charges, as well as the records of licenses and permits issued by the selectmen, were examined and checked in detail, the payments to the town treasurer and to the State being verified.

The records of receipts of the sealer of weights and measures, and of the health, school, and library departments, as well as of all other departments collecting money for the town or committing bills for collection, were examined, the reported payments to the treasurer being checked with the treasurer's cash book and with the town accountant's records.

The surety bonds of the town officials required to file such surety for the faithful performance of their duties were examined and found to be in proper form.

Appended to this report, in addition to the balance sheet, are tables showing a reconciliation of the treasurer's cash, summaries of the tax, tax title, tax possession, departmental, and water accounts, as well as schedules showing the condition and the transactions of the trust and investment funds.

During the progress of the audit cooperation was extended by all town officials, for which, on behalf of my assistants and for myself, I wish to express appreciation.
