REPORT OF THE BOARD OF SELECTMEN

The election in April saw the election of Leo M. Rousseau. The Board re-organized and John Sylvia was elected Chairman for 1987-1988.

In 1987 the town departments have seen many new changes with our computer system. This year we hope to have accounts receivable, budgeting and real estate data on line. It has been a long haul but the system has helped and will continue to help the work load of many departments when all data is entered.

The Phase I sewer project was completed last year with a total of 355 building units, 509 individual units. 244 of the 355 building units were tied-in in 1987. The balance must be tied-in by April 8, 1988 per order of Board of Health regulations. Our Phase II sewer project is also on its way. Approximately 468 questionnaires were sent to property owners from Boylston Street up Main Street as far as Lisa Avenue and side streets west and east of Main Street. Our engineering firm Camp, Dresser & McKee, Inc. has filed for State funding and a project number has been assigned. MA Divison of Water Pollution Control and Executive Office of Environmental Affairs will be reviewing the data for completeness before ranking and rating the project for the next proposed priority listing F.Y. 1989.

Again, the 9th Annual Apple Peach Festival was very successful. This annual September traditional event is very popular and brings out a great many townspeople and out of town people to participate in this festive occasion. Hats off to the Apple Peach Committee members for a fine job.

The Acushnet Road Race was held and it proved to be an exciting event with much interest. The plaque was again presented to the Board of Selectment and 4 names were added this year. The adults were Bill O'Mara 34:37, Kathleen LaPlante 44:27.8 and the youths were Sean Bourgeois 35:08 and Darnyl Williams 42:46. The Board of Selectmen would like to thank Mr. John Braun and his staff for a well organized race.

Through Job Partnership the Town was fortunate to employ about 10 youths in the summer program and anticipate a similar program this coming summer.

Our Council on Aging continues to provide meals and services to our senior citizens. Through PACE the Council also participates in the Fuel Assistance Program and the Surplus Commodities Food Program for needy individuals and families of Acushnet.

Our Representative John C. Bradford and Senator Thomas C. Norton have both been very helpful and co-operative when Acushnet is in need of their services regarding any matter that may arise. We thank them.

The Selectmen are also involved with the Acushnet Drugs Including Alcohol Advisory Council and they would like to thank the Council for all the fine work they have done and that their work continue. It is our obligation to our youths that we meet on a regular basis as a community who is greatly concerned about the effects of Drugs and Alcohol on our youths of today.

We would like to take this opportunity to thank the townspeople and employees for their constant support, for without their cooperation and understanding it would make our job a difficult task. Whenever this office can be of any assistance to you, please feel free to contact us as soon as possible, and we will do our best to help you in whatever way we can. Come by and see us sometime.

REPORT OF THE POLICE DEPARTMENT

To the officers and residents of the Town of Acushnet I hereby submit my report for the year ending December 31, 1987.

Officers trained as Emergency Medical Technicians attended refresher courses re-certifying them as required by law.

Acushnet received an AAA National Federation Safety Citation marking 23 years without a pedestrian fatality.

Officer Kelly A. Hough was appointed to a full-time position. Officer Francis L. Kasmire resigned.

Officer Paul Melo attended a course by Criminal Justice Training Council certifying him as a PR-24 (police baton) instructor. Sgt. Barry W. Monte and Officers Marc Antone, Charles Pelletier, Gil Marques, Jr., David Swift, Kelly A. Hough and Carol S. Kut were also certified in the use of the PR—24 baton.

Detective Charles G. Pelletier attended a two week course put on by the C.J.T.C. certifying him as an instructor for project D.A.R.E. (Drug Abuse Resistance Education). Detective Pelletier has been teaching the program in the Elementary School and St. Francis Xavier School since the beginning of the school year. The program has been enthusiastically accepted by the school staffs and student body and has received excellent reviews. Children will be graduating from the program in February of 1988.

Funds for project D.A.R.E. and our surrounding substance abuse resistance programs were funded by a state grant and through a generous donation by the Acushnet Police Association.

All full time officers and most part-time officers have attended/are attending a one week refresher course at Foxboro Academy. All mandated courses, by law, are covered in said academy including CPR, First Aid and Firearms qualification. In addition officers are trained in Child Abuse Law, Officer Survival, M/V laws update, Criminal Law update, Drug problems, Supervisory techniques and discipline.

Department personnel were also trained in suicide prevention as mandated by law.

The town purchased one (1) new 1987 Ford LTD unit to be used as a cruiser.

During the year 1987 the fire trucks left the stations 287 times, not counting times out for training and other activities.

The year 1987 was only a few months old when the untimely death of Call Firefighter, John Worthington/Captain of Engine Co. 1 was experienced by the department. Capt. Worthington will be missed as a true friend and hard worker on various projects on the Fire Department and for the town.

The past year has seen improvements made on the department and in the town as far as fire protection. Earlier in the year the men on the department received training by the Massachusetts Fire Academy with their trailer in search and rescue and protective breathing.

Large diameter hose and appliances were put into service. This hose is a marked improvement on the volume of water being moved at the fire scene.

The outdated and out of service dry hydrants in the northern part of town were removed and replaced with new ones made of plastic pipe. This project was completed with the help of the men on the Fire Department, Highway Department, and Water Department. I also wish to thank the property owners who gave us permission to install the dry hydrants on their land.

The year also saw the completion of the remodeling of the interior Fire Station-2. This included a new heating system, a portable generator installed and the office area remodeled.

The past year was a busy one for the department. The residents are again reminded to be fire conscious of the possible fire hazards around them.

In closing I would like to commend the men on the Fire Department for being there when the call was sent out. The support they gave for various projects and last of all the residents of the Town of Acushnet for their continued support.

REPORT OF THE PARK COMMISSION

The year 1987 brought a new member to the board. Robert Travers became the newest Commissioner. Robert's involvement in area sports and, particularly, in the Acushnet Little League has been a welcomed addition.

On opening day of the baseball season, a plaque was dedicated and placed in the park for the late Arthur Briggs. Mr. Briggs was a dedicated and well-liked employee of the Park Department, serving as Superintendent for several years. Mr. Briggs' death is a loss for both those associated with the Park Department and the Town of Acushnet.

Debbie (Honohan) Soares, Recreation Director, again ran an excellent summer program. With the aid of her assistants, the program was held for six weeks in the summer months. Activities took place at Pope Park, the Elementary School, and the Town Beach. We're sure the townspeople of Acushnet join the Board in giving Debbie a special thanks.

Appropriated at the Town Meeting was the sum of \$9,500.00 for the purchase of a new tractor for the Park Department. The tractor was purchased and arrived in late summer replacing the older model which for the most part was inoperable and becoming costly to repair. The tractor is the main piece of equipment used in the maintenance and upkeep of the park.

A section of water pipe was placed from the stone building in the front of the park along Addy Drive to a newly installed hydrant located in the area of the concession stand. The project was done for safety reasons to the building in the area and to reduce the amount of stone dust in the air during the hot summer months. This project was accomplished due to the efforts of the Selectmen's Office, Finance Committee, Highway Department, and Water Department. The Board wishes to recognize and thank these individuals for their assistance.

The baseball fields were used by the Acushnet Youth Athletic Association, Greater New Bedford Pony League, Acushnet Girls' Softball, Acushnet Men's Softball, Fairhaven High School J.V. team, and Old Colony Vocational's J.V. team

An Open Space plan was done by Linda Rinta for the Town of Acushnet. Some ideas for the future of Pope Park were also incorporated in this plan. At this time they are only ideas, but hopefully someday, they may be a reality.

Pope Park remains one of the best parks in the entire area with many people deserving special thanks including the residents of the Town of Acushnet.

The Parking Clerk position was taken over by the Town in 1982, after having been administered by the Third District Court in New Bedford. A purpose of this office is to process payments for tickets issued by the Police Department. Also, the Clerk must give a hearing to anyone disputing a ticket. During the year 1987, 391 tickets were processed thru this office, with total payment of \$1,765.00. On occasion a fine may be waived for certain reasons, and all records relating to this office are available for public inspection upon request. There is no salary paid for administering this position.

HOUSING AUTHORITY REPORT

To: The Officers and Residents of the Town of Acushnet. Subject: Reporting of the Acushnet Housing Authority.

April of 1988 will mark our fourteenth year at Presidential Terrace. We, the members and director of the Housing Authority, are proud to have been a part in offering to its elderly citizens of Acushnet one of the finest housing complexes in the Commonwealth of Mass.

Our meetings are held on the second Thursday of each month throughout the year at the office of Presidential Terrace. The office is open from Monday thru Friday, from 9:00 a.m. until 12 noon.

April of 1988 will see Presidential Terrace connecting into the newly constructed town sewer system at a cost of approximately \$70,000. Upon completion this will open approximately 1.5 acres of Authority owned land for additional elderly units.

Included in the Acushnet Housing Authority's comprehensive Housing Package, which is state mandated is a request for 12 units of Chapter 705 Family housing and 8 units of Chapter 689 Special Needs Housing.

This comprehensive Housing Package was submitted to Executive Office of Communities and Development in September 1987. A 2.34 million dollar housing grant was approved for the Acushnet Housing Authority in January 1988. Also approved was a \$7,500 grant for site control and designer selection.

Whereas a serious housing shortage exists in our area and has driven the cost of safe and attractive housing beyond the reach of many Acushnet citizens, this authority feels as elected officials it is the responsibility and duty of the Acushnet Housing Authority board members to face these issues in a fair and conscientious manner.

Once again, from its occupancy over a decade ago to its present day, the Authority would like to express its gratitude to everyone who in any way has been and continues to be an asset in making Presidential Terrace the outstanding Elderly Complex it is today.

CONSERVATION COMMISSION

To the Officials and Residents of the Town of Acushnet:

In last year's report I presented a lengthy explanation of the duties and responsibilities of the members of the Conservation Commission.

This year my report will be a little briefer.

For the greater part of this past year we have been operating with a full compliment of seven members - this number is regulated by statute. One member, William Ratcliffe, resigned because of other commitments. However, we were fortunate to quickly replace him with the services of A. P. Stuart Gilmore.

On the first of November another interest was added to the Wetlands Protection Act. (MGL Ch. 131: Sec. 40). Interest No. 8 demands Protection of Wildlife Habitats. Briefly, what this means is that any areas already under the protection of the "Act", ie: Wetlands, Buffer Zones or Flood Plains - must now be carefully examined to learn if they are viable feeding or breeding places of just about any species of wildlife that depends upon an unaltered environment of this type for survival. Note: these animals, reptiles, etc. do not necessarily have to be "permanent residents" of these areas for the areas to qualify as "Wildlife Habitats".

Areas that do qualify as Wildlife Habitats will have additional restrictions put upon any alterations during proposed dredging, filling, excavating or construction.

This last year, as with the previous year, we were called upon to make a couple of hundred determinations as to whether or not individual lots of prospective builders or areas of proposed sub-divisions came under the jurisdiction of the "Act". Although construction of new homes in Acushnet on individual lots has slackened a little since last year, construction of new homes in sub-divisions is definitely on the increase.

All indications are this trend will continue into the foreseeable future.

EMERGENCY MEDICAL SERVICE

To the Officers and Residents of the Town of Acushnet:

This year we were able to complete our Communication Room. Community projects continued with the fifth grade at St. Francis Xavier School. This year the Cub Scouts and Brownie troops began training, learning the Heimlich Maneuver. As a result of the Federal

Grant received, 8 members are now certified in the application of M.A.S.T. (Anti-Shock) Trousers. Among our members, we currently have 11 CPR Instructors, 3 CPR Instructor Trainers, 1 State EMT Examiner and 3 First Aid Instructors. There has been 227 hours dedicated to CPR training in the community, resulting in 175 people certified or recertified.

This year we provided Medical Control/Traffic Control at the following details: Apple-Peach Festival, Acushnet Road Race, A.Y.A.A. Walk-a-thon, Pro-Am Bike Race, Halloween Parade, Christmas Sing-a-long and the St. Francis Xavier School Walk-a-thon. We were also asked to provide medical control for the Town of Fairhaven during the visit by the Crown Prince and Princess of Japan.

The culmination of our year was being asked to serve on the Advisory Committee of the Greater New Bedford E.M.S. Coordinating Committee. This sub-committee is responsible for assisting St. Luke's Hospital in setting up the Hospital-Based Paramedic Service which will complement our existing E.M.S. Service.

I would like to thank the Acushnet Association of E.M.T.s for having the E.M.S. garage lettered and for purchasing a head immobilizer which will be used in EMS-1. I would also like to thank the members who donated their time to cover the details and community projects. BRISTOL COUNTY MOSQUITO CONTROL PROJECT

Annual Report - Acushnet, Mass. December 31, 1987

On June 30, 1988 the Bristol County Mosquito Control Project will complete twenty-nine years of service to the cities and towns of Bristol County.

The mosquito control project works year-round in its efforts to reduce mosquito breeding sites and adult mosquito populations. The Project uses several different measures of control in its never ending fight against mosquitos.

Winter Pre-Hatch - To treat breeding areas that are accessible only on the ice during the winter months.

Spring and Summer Larviciding - To reduce the emergence of adult mosquitos in areas where mosquito larvae is present.

Catch Basin Treatment - To stop mosquito emergence from rainfilled catch basins and storm drains.

Light Trapping Program - To monitor mosquito populations as to their type and number - a program necessary in encephalitis surveillance. Light trapping of mosquitos is also useful to determine what areas have high mosquito populations and should be sprayed.

Water Management - A year round endeavor to clean and construct mosquito drainage ditches in lowland swamps to reduce their favorability as breeding sites for mosquito larvae.

It is the policy of the Bristol County Mosquito Control Project to use pesticides that are environmentally safe so that the safety of the people and environment are not jeopardized. We use as many of the biological insecticides as are practical with the environmental conditions present in the New England area. We are presently using three different formulations of B.T.I. in our larviciding program.

All of our spray equipment is calibrated periodically in order to insure that dosage rates remain at safe levels but are adequate to reduce mosquito populations. The operators of our spray equipment are state certified pesticide applicators that are required to attend classes on pesticide safety on a yearly basis.

The 1987 mosquito season started the first week of March with larvae appearing in large numbers throughout most of the county. Precipitation from January 2nd through May 5th totaled 22 inches of snow and 20 inches of rain filling most swamps to capacity. The heavy rains caused an above average spring brood of mosquitos in all low lying areas. By mid-May mosquito populations were higher than they had been for several years. The over-wintering melanura larvae populations were also above average which indicated a large second brood come mid-season. It is the second brood of melanura which can trigger an outbreak of EE providing virus levels are high.

All project personnel including tractor operators were out spraying in an effort to knock down the large mosquito populations to avoid any mosquito related health problems. With additional spraying and the dryer weather conditions during July and August, the mosquitos were reduced to such low numbers that many areas no longer needed spraying. We did, however, continue limited spraying in some areas through September. The 1987 mosquito season ended with no recorded cases of EE in the Bristol County area.

With the end of the spraying season our work turned to water management projects. At this time crews cut brush and clean debris from existing ditches and streams in order to insure a better flow of water from normally wet areas.

During the spring and summer months a total of 20 acres were larvicided and 308 catch basins that were found to be breeding were treated. During the fall and winter months a total of 2,320 feet of brush was cut from ditches and 2,320 feet of drainage ditch was reclaimed. Our crawler tractor also dug 1,420 feet of drainage ditch.

I would like to thank the town officials and the people of Acushnet for their continued support and cooperation and look forward to serving them in the coming year. Should anyone have a question as to what might be done to relieve a mosquito problem in their area, whether it is water management work, treatment of a breeding site, or just having an area checked, please feel free to call our office.

The Acushnet Council on Aging meetings are held on the second and fourth Wednesday of each month at 9:30 A.M. in the office at the Drop-In Center located in the Parting Ways Building.

The Drop-In Center is open to all Senior Citizens of Acushnet daily except Saturday and Sunday from 9:00 A.M. to 2:00 P.M. This year the students of Old Colony Regional Technical High School built a ramp at the rear of the building making it more accessible for any of our Seniors who have a problem with stairs. Our goal for the year 1988 is to contact more of our Senior Citizens and to interest them in participating in our activities.

A hot lunch is served daily at noon under the auspices of the Elderly Nutrition Program. Our mini-bus transports those of us who have no transportation to the site and home again. In many cases, this is the only contact and socialization for those who attend. For Seniors who are not able to get out, we deliver a hot lunch to their home five days a week, Monday through Friday.

Our Senior bus transports many of us to Shaw's for grocery shopping on Wednesday and Thursday morning each week. Reservations for this service must be made in advance by calling the office at 995-8528.

We play Beano on Monday and Wednesday directly after lunch and we invite those Seniors who do not wish to attend lunch, to come in for a few hours of Beano. The newsletter continues to be published monthly and placed in various spots in the town. We plan a trip for luncheon each month to an out-of-town restaurant. For many of our Seniors, this is a special treat!

We applied for, and received, a Grant from the Department of Elder Affairs, through Coastline Elderly Services based on the number of Senior Citizens in the Town.

Our office works with P.A.C.E. to distribute surplus foods to those persons who qualify. We are, also, active in the Fuel Assistance Program. Coastline Elderly Services provides us with personnel trained in the latest information, at no charge, on Income Tax Assistance. The Board of Health conducts a monthly clinic on the fourth Tuesday of each month. They also staff the Flu Shot Clinic every November.

Again, our thanks to all our volunteers who serve through the year.

ACUSHNET HISTORICAL COMMISSION ANNUAL REPORT - 1987

The past year has been a very active and fruitful one for the Acushnet Historical Commission.

The preservation and restoration of the lovely 1759 Long Plain Friends Meetinghouse (Quakers), the only building in Acushnet listed in The National Register of Historic Places, has made considerable progress under a grant from the Massachusetts Historical Commission.

The roof, started in December 1986, was completely and authentically restored with white cedar shingles on oak boards, the foundation repointed, and sills, corner posts, sheathing and clapboards repaired or replaced up to the first floor windows.

After the first phase was completed, the Friends of the Friends Meetinghouse, a volunteer group, contributed funds sufficient to continue the work, completely restoring all the windows and currently working on the shutters. These funds were raised largely through individual and corporate donations and last July's very successful country auction.

The Commission wishes to thank the Acushnet Historical Society for acting as grantee and project supervisor under the state grant and the Friends of the Friends for their substantial contributions.

The Commission also wishes to thank the Town Highway Department for removing boulders from the front of the property and leveling and seeding with grass.

It is now planned to complete exterior and interior repairs and paint the entire building under a new grant for which we have already applied. An article will be placed on the warrant for next Town Meeting asking for an appropriation to cover the local share. If approved, the restored meetinghouse should be ready to inaugurate by June 1989.

The Historical Society set up two major new exhibits at the long Plain Museum: the Cornelius Howland Blacksmith Shop and the Whaling Corner.

The Society has completed three important building projects at the Museum: 1) a new basement meeting room, 2) a new and safer set of front stairs, and 3) a complete rewiring. The Commission, on behalf of the Town, wishes to express its most sincere appreciation to the Society for its dedication to the Museum's welfare.

Exterior repairs and maintenance are presently being planned by the Commission with the intention of completing the work within our regular maintenance budget.

At the request of the Commission, the Highway Department has erected several street signs directing people to the Museum.

Through the efforts of several members of the Society, the 1814 date stone of the historic Whelden Mill was retrieved from the ruins and brought to the Museum for safekeeping. A plaque explaining its historical significance is presently being prepared to set alongside the stone.

The Commission wishes to thank Troop 51 of the Acushnet Boy Scouts and the Ford Middle School Band for their participation in the unveiling last July 4th of the plaque marking the Captain Shockley house (currently St. Francis convent). Capt. Shockley was one of the Town's outstanding Arctic whaling masters.

Two projects for the coming year have to do with stones: 1) the photographic recording of our early 19th C. granite milestones, and 2) the recording and restoration of the oldest graveyards in Acushnet: The Queen Anne, the Long Plain, and the Friends Meetinghouse graveyards.

The researching of historical houses by AHC volunteers continued and the owners of several old houses were supplied with plaques. Owners of houses believed to be over 100 years old are encouraged to contact the Commission if they are interested in having us research their history.

REPORT OF THE ACUSHNET BOARD OF HEALTH FOR 1987

To the Officers and Residents of the Town of Acushnet:

The Board of Health respectfully submits the following report for the year 1987.

The Board welcomed Robert Medeiros, the newly elected member and organized as follows: Chairman, Madeleine Cioper; Clerk, Thomas Fortin and Inspector, Robert Medeiros.

Health Care Programs and Activities:

Presently, weekly Blood Pressure Screenings are held on Mondays, 9-10 A.M. and 4-5 P.M., in the office of the Board of Health in the Parting Ways building. Monthly Senior Citizens Health Counseling -Immunization Clinics and Well Baby Clinics are sponsored by the Board of Health.

Nursing - Rehabilitation - Home Health Aide Services:

We operate a Certified Home Health Agency, supplying home care for all residents who qualify for care under the Medicare, Medicaid, Home Care Programs. We also have a contract to service clients under the various Private Insurance Companies. Home Health Services and Rehabilitation Services are available to the town residents through contracted services. This last year, we have had a great increase in the need for Physical Therapy visits due to the change in health care with the many joint replacements that are being performed. As the clients needs change, the Board of Health will adjust their services to meet the demand. This year we expanded our services by contracting to supply Respite and Partnership Services for Coastline Elderly Services for residents of the town who qualify for this service.

Senior Citizens Health Counseling:

The Board of Health, with the cooperation and assistance of the Council on Aging, sponsor monthly clinics on the fourth Tuesday of each month. Appointments can be made by calling 995-8527, the Council on Aging office. We rotate sites between the Parting Ways Building Drop-in Center and Presidential Terrace, 23 Main Street. All seniors are urged to call and take advantage of this program. In 1987, we had a total of 9 clinics and 113 persons attended. Referrals are made to the client's physicians if there are any problems.

Premature Births:

In 1987, we received reports of 6 premature births, with 2 deaths. Home assessments were made by the nurse on all babies who were discharged home.

Clinics and Programs:

Flu Clinics were held in the months of October and November, with 374 people taking advantage of this Preventive Vaccine Program. Of the 374 doses administered, age breakdown was as follows:

Well Baby Clinic is held the first Wednesday of each month, with the exception of July and August. These are held in the Board of Health Office in the Parting Ways Building. Ten (10) clinics were held in 1987, with the following immunizations and Tine & Mantoux tests given.

Attending clinic were 90 adults, 196 children and 28 who received no immunization. There were 361 immunizations and tests given at clinic in 1987.

School Health Programs:

All school children were screened for hearing and vision problems. 1237 students were tested for visual defects, 119 were retested and 77 were referred for follow-up. Hearing tests were given to 1236 students, with 92 retested and 25 referred for care.

1241 students were weighed and measured.

Physical examinations were requested for all students entering school and also for 4th and 8th graders. A total of 449 students received physicals, either by their own Physician or the School Physician and the following conditions were found:

Referrals were made to the parents requesting they see the family Physician for any conditions that the School Physician felt needed attention.

Postural Screening for all children in grades 5-8 resulted in 525 students screened, with 64 of these children referred to the School Physician, and a total of 13 children in our school population who are under care, or have been treated for Scoliosis. All referrals for the past year are under observation. This is a State mandated program carried on by the Board of Health and the School Department. Early detection of Scoliosis and Kyphosis is the aim of this program in this age group. The earlier the problem is detected, and the earlier treatment is instituted, the better the results.

Pre-School Registration was held in April and May 1987, with 119 children seen. All were screened for Vision and Hearing and complete immunization histories were reviewed.

HIGHWAY DEPARTMENT REPORT 1987

To the Officers and Residents of the Town of Acushnet.

The following streets were resurfaced with Bituminous Concrete:

Rogerson Avenue, two thousand, one hundred feet long by twenty-five feet wide, including new berms, driveway aprons and shoulder work.

Budano Drive, eleven hundred feet long by twenty-eight feet wide, including crack sealing and driveway aprons.

Coury Drive, twelve hundred feet long by twenty-eight feet wide including crack sealing and driveway aprons.

A 5,280 foot by thirty six foot section of Middle Road was crack sealed this year and nineteen hundred forty-three feet by thirty-six feet was repaved.

We ran out of Chapter 90 Funds at this point and hope to continue next spring with new funds.

We patched and slurry sealed Henry Drive, Henrietta Drive, North Anthony Drive, and chipped sealed Rogerson Avenue before repaving. A total of thirteen thousand three hundred eighty-three square yards.

Land takings are complete and Tibbets Engineering has presented preliminary drawings to state aid on the Hamlin Street Bridge. They are in the process of seeking State Funds for a new bridge.

State Aid has informed the Town that the designs are complete on the new section of Middle Road, from Ray Parkers to Whites construction past the Elementary School.

They are waiting for Town Meeting to vote Land Taking Funds and to complete the land taking process before they can go out for bid.

Five hundred Catch Basins in Town were cleaned with a hired basin cleaner.

All Center Lines on main roads were painted including 11 Cross Walks and 6 School Emblems.

Our Highway Department Workers:

Snow Plowed and Sanded our Town Roads and kept the Storm Drains open all winter.

Worked with a Hired Broom and our equipment to clean Winter Sand off main roads, sidewalks and intersections.

Graded the Town Beach Parking Lots and all Dirt Streets in Town that were not private ways.

Cut Brush on sides of roads concentrating on blind corners.

Did general Drainage and Asphalt repairs along with getting Streets ready for Reconstruction and Sealing.


