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BOARD OF SELECTMEN

The Town Election in April saw the re-election of Leo M. Rousseau for his third term. The Board reorganized and John Sylvia was voted Chairman for the coming year.

Again departments struggled with Proposition 2½ in 1990 and will be facing severe cutbacks for 1991. Our department heads are doing their utmost to stay within their budget, but often times unforseen matters occur during the year forcing them to request for extra funding to complete the fiscal year. What no one seems to realize is that if the departments don't have an adequate budget to work with, they can't service the Town the way is should be. For 2-3 years now we have asked our departments to cut more and more and yet we expect to maintain town needs with a lesser budget. There is a limit that certain departments can be cut without putting the town in jeopardy. Therefore serious consideration should be given to this at Town Meeting when voting on Town budgets. The State itself has contributed a tremendous burden on us thus forcing us to be more self sufficient and not depend too much on Local Aid to get by. Therefore charges such as rubbish collection fees were implemented this year and other charges may have to be implemented so that the Town's financial well being will not be over burdened.

This year marked our eleventh year of the Apple/Peach Festival. We are grateful to the Committee for this event. It brings publicity to our town, not mentioning the business and old time country spirit. Keep up the good work, in making Acushnet a peach of a Town and the apple of everyone's eye.

The Town is looking into a recycling program which sooner or later will be mandated. A committee has been formed and volunteers will be needed at the site location to assist the townspeople in placing the recyclables such as paper, glass, and plastics in the proper containers. Anyone interested in helping out in this program please contact our office. Your help will be greatly appreciated as always.

Once again the Town of Acushnet participated in the SEMASS Run for the Environmental Race. William O'Mara was the Town's designated runner again this year. Coming in second he enabled the Town once again to receive another \$1,500.00 check to be used for any environmental projects. We congratulate Mr. O'Mara for a job well done.

Finally we would like to thank the townspeople and employees for lending their support and cooperation to us and hope that the coming year will be prosperous and beneficial for everyone.

If a "bridge" program had been purchased, as requested by this office two years ago, information would have been ready in a more timely manner and bills would have gone out sooner.

Our three year updating plan for re-inspecting and re-measuring all buildings throughout the town has been completed with the exception of businesses.

The Assessors' office has also completed the project of renumbering tax maps. All properties in named subdivisions have been renumbered and this new numbering system has been used for the first time on the Fiscal 1991 tax bills.

REPORT OF THE POLICE DEPARTMENT

To the officers and residents of the Town of Acushnet I hereby submit my report for the year ending Dec. 31, 1990.

All EMT personnel attended refresher courses as required by law. All non-EMT personnel were re-certified as First Responders as required by law.

Part-time officer Gary L. Rousseau was promoted to full-time status effective February 11, 1991. Officer Rousseau will attend the Barnstable Police Academy.

Officer Louis Guillette resigned from the department on 1/29/90.

Our D.A.R.E. (Drug Abuse Resistence Education) program was a great success once again in 1990. Unfortunately Det. Charles Pelletier, our D.A.R.E. officer, was activated for military duty on Dec. 28, 1990. and for this reason the D.A.R.E. program has been interrupted in midstream. Hopefully Det. Pelletier will be back soon so that the program will not have to be cancelled.

Our Safety Officers Paul Melo has also continued teaching his safety lessons in the schols covering a broad range of subjects to help keep children safe not only from traffic but from strangers as well.

All full-time officers attended a one week refresher course at the Plymouth Police Academy covering all mandated subjects and helping to keep them abreast of the ever-changing laws.

Acushnet received an annual AAA Traffic Safety Award marking 26 years without a pedestrian fatality.

The computer purchased by the department in 1988 continues to be used and overall is a success, however due to financial constrains we are not able to update or maintain the system properly. The result of this is far from a total loss as we continue to get much service from the system but there is an obvious loss of efficiency.

The department suffered a loss of potential revenue when an Acushnet dwelling burned to the ground. The house had been forfeited to federal authorities and was scheduled to be auctioned off. The Acushnet Police Department, for its part in the investigation, would have shared the net profit from the sale.

The department continues to operate under a hybrid system, namely some full-time and part-time personnel. Such a system impedes professionalism, increases the likelihood of suits due to lesser training of part-time personnel and results in the loss of well qualified personnel who move on to full-time positions elsewhere. The reason the department continues to operate this way is quite simply because it is cheaper and there never seems to be enough money to change the system which has operated as such since the 1950s. According to figures provided for fiscal '92 we will not only have to continue operating under the same basic system but in fact there will be cuts in personnel. Rest assured that whatever funds are made available to the department will be used in the manner considered to be in the best interest of public safety.

REPORT OF THE CONSERVATION COMMISSION

To the Officials and Residents of the Town of Acushnet

The duties and responsibilities of the Conservation Commission are to protect the interests identified in the Wetlands Protection Act, (M.G.L.

Ch.131:Sec.40.) This year construction and other related activity fell off quite a bit compared to last year. We made "Site Determinations" on only 117 Parcels of land. Last year "Determinations" were made on over 170 parcels.

Also, this year we held only 7 Pubic Hearings where we reviewed Notices of Intent and plans for individual building construction. No hearings were held for sub-division construction. Last year we held 23 Public Hearings.

In recent months it has come to the attention of the Commission that many residents do not understand what administering the Wetlands Protection Act really entails. The commission's duty is to make "Determinations" either position or negative on an applicants "request for a Determination of the Wetlands Protection Act." If our Determination is positive the applicant may have to abandon the proposed project or may be allowed to proceed under numerous restrictions and limitations. If our Determination is negative the applicant will be allowed to proceed with the plans as proposed to the Commission. However, the applicant must conform to the requirements of various other Boards, such as the Building Department, Board of Health, Planning Board, Appeals Board, Wiring Department and several more. The Conservation Commission does not issue permits. Permits must be obtained by the applicant, from the various Boards, depending upon the type and extent of the activities proposed for any given site.

When it is necessary, all Commissions, Boards, Departments and Committees consult with each other to aid in the decision making process.

During 1990 there were no major changes in the Department of Environmental Protection policies or in the methods of operation.

Three members, Roger R. Savaria, Yvette T. LeBlanc and Raymond F. Barlow resigned during 1990. The Board of Selectmen appointed associate members Scott A. Timms and Diane K. Pankiewicz to replace Mr. Savaria and Ms. LeBlanc The Board also appointed Walton E. Braley of 1189 Main Street to replace Mr. Barlow.

Special meetings and public hearings were held when needed. The Planning Board members reviewed and acted upon individual plans each month. Subdivision Public Hearings were held in accordance with MA General Law, Chapter 41, Section 81T. The following subdivisions were approved by the Planning Board:

To obtain a copy of the Planning Board Subdivision Rules and Regulations, please see the Treasurer-Collector's Office. If an individual wants to subdivide out an individual lot, please see the Building Inspector and/or the Planning Board. All questions will be answered by the appropriate departments. Town officials are here to serve you, the people.

The Planning Board members continue to keep themselves informed of all the changes in state laws. All actions taken by the Board are in accordance with the MA General Laws, Acushnet Subdivision Rules and Regulations and the Town's Protective By-Laws.

REPORT OF THE EMERGENCY MEDICAL SERVICE

To the Officers and Residents of the Town of Acushnet, MA I hereby submit this report for the calendar year ending Dec. 31, 1990.

The year 1990 was a year of many progressions in our department. We were the first service in the area to have implemented the EMT-Defibrillator program. I am pleased to annonce 100% pass rate with 13 members trained in defibrillation. We were able to purchase our semi-automatic defibrillator and are the only service in the area currently using the machine. To date we have used the defibrillator 6 times during the last year. It is a great advantage to know what you are dealing with immediately upon arriving at a cardiac arrest scene. We thank you for giving us such a valuable piece of equipment to help us better serve your needs.

We have 3 new members to bring our staff to 15 Emergency Medical Technicians. Of these 15, 14 are MAST certified. All 15 are State and/or Nationally Registered EMTs. We now have 10 CPR instructors and 2 CPR Instructor Trainers.

In our commitment to make the public more aware of the need for early intevention and CPR, we have trained 250 citizens including some staff members from the Sassaquin Nursing Home, Sacred Heart Home, Alden Court, Acushnet Fire Dept., SMU student nurses, Acushnet Police Dept., The Standard Times, Center School - Mattapoisett, Sippican School - Marion, St. Luke's Hospital, Bristol County Sheriff's Dept., various Day Care facilities and Explorer Post 309.

The Acushnet Association of EMTs purchased a defibrillator skin which enables us to convert a recording manikan to defibrillating status for recertification purposes. I'd like to thank the Association for their continuous support and hard work.

The Ambulance Fund has collected \$22,000.00. At a time when budgets and monies are crucial, we are grateful and pleased with the response from our citizens and businesses. Our goal will not be achieved without their help. While we are pleased with the amount collected to date, we are well aware that we have a long way to go to reach our goal. I'd like to express my gratitude to the Explorer Post for their help with the 2nd Annual Walk-A-Thon. Thanks also to the Friends of the Ambulance Fund Committee.

I would like to acknowledge 2 members who retired in December, Ed Dufresne and Joe Desrochers. Both these gentlemen were active members when the ambulance became a Third Service in July, 1981.

We will miss them and thank them for their contributions and many years of dedicated service.

For the first time in 10 years we are now able to receive reimbursement for our Mutual Aid Runs to other communities. As you will see in the statistics that follow, these runs comprise 1/5 of our ambulance runs. These runs generate revenue to the Town's General Account which helps defray the cost of running this dept.

BRISTOL COUNTY MOSQUITO CONTROL PROJECT

On June 30, 1990 the Bristol County Mosquito Control Project completed thirty-one years of service to the cities and towns of Bristol County.

The mosquito control project works year-round in its efforts to reduce mosquito breeding sites and adult mosquito populations. The Project uses several different measures of control in its never ending fight against mosquitos.

Winter Pre-hatch — To treat breeding areas that are accessible only on the ice during the winter months.

Spring and Summer Larviciding — To reduce the emergence of adult mosquitos in areas where mosquito larvae is present.

Catch Basin Treatment — To stop mosquito emergence from rain-filled catch basins and storm drains.

Light Trapping Program — To monitor mosquito populations as to their type and number — a program necessary in encephalitis surveillance. Light trapping of mosquitos is also useful to determine what areas have high mosquito populations and should be sprayed.

Water Management — A year round endeavor to clean and construct mosquito drainage ditches in lowland swamps to reduce their favorability as breeding sites for mosquito larvae.

It is the policy of the Bristol County Mosquito Control Project to use pesticides that are environmentally safe so that the safety of the people and environment are not jeopardized. We use as many of the biological insecticides as are practical with the environmental conditions present in the New England area. We are presently using three different formulations of B.T.I. in our larviciding program.

All of our spray equipment is calibrated periodically in order to insure that dosage rates remain at safe levels but are adequate to reduce mosquito populations. The operators of our spray equipment are state certified pesticide applicators that are required to attend classes on pesticide safety on a yearly basis.

By early spring of 1990 most criteria was in place to indicate the emergence of large broods of mosquitors and the potential for a severe outbreak of Eastern Encephalitis. The Bristol County areas again had

an exceptionally wet spring with heavy rains filling swamp areas with substantial amounts of water. These areas were to be large breeding sites from eggs that were laid by late season mosquitos from the previous year. As the season progressed, Culiseta melanura densities were significantly above the 7 year median. The Eastern virus was isolated in melanura mosquitos in late June which was the earliest isolations to be found since records have been kept. Each week virus levels climbed at an alarming rate. By early July mosquito control personnel and the State Public Health knew there would be a spill over of virus to human biting mosquitos that would eventually involve horses and humans in Southeastern Mass.

The Bristol County Project began intensifying its ground ULV spraying in areas of high risk in order to protect the people from possible virus carrying mosquitors. All spray crews were put on a 6 day schedule with earlier hours to get as much coverage as possible. During this time plans were being made for a widespread aerial spray program but it was not until August 27th that the planes were finally in the air. We believe that our increased ground spraying during the several weeks before the aerial spray took place prevented any human cases of encephalitis in Bristol County. With the support of its member towns, the Project was able to respond to an extremely dangerous mosquito situation.

The Project answered all requests for spraying along with our regular spraying of known infested areas for a total of 1,470.8 sprayed acres.

During the spring and summer months a total of 192 catch basins that were found to be breeding were treated. During the fall and winter months a total of 445 feet of brush was cut from ditches. Our crawler tractor also dug 1,108 feet of drainage ditch.

I would like to thank the town officials and the people of Acushnet for their continued support and cooperation and look forward to serving them in the coming year. Should anyone have a question as to what might be done to relieve a mosquito problem in their area, whether it is water management work, treatment of a breeding site, or just having an area checked, please feel free to call our office.

COUNCIL ON AGING

The Acushnet Council on Aging meets on the second and fourth Tuesday of each month at 9:30 A.M. in the office at the Drop-In Center in the Parting Ways Building.

The Center is open to all Senior Citizens of the Town from 9:00 A.M. to 1:00 P.M. Monday through Friday. We welcome all Seniors to come in and watch television, play cards, play records on the stereo, help to finish our table puzzle, or just socialize. The coffee pot is always on!

The Center hosts a daily hot meal served by the Elderly Nutrition Program. Approximately 2500 clients were served in 1990. We have two drivers who deliver Meals on Wheels to our shut-in seniors five days a week. There were approximately 1550 meals delivered in 1990. We applied for, and received, our yearly Formula Grant from the Department of Elder Affairs through Coastline Elderly Services again in 1990 which helps to maintain our bus. This bus brings those seniors who have no means of transportation to the Center for lunch daily. We play Beano on Mondays and Wednesdays directly after lunch. On Wednesday and Thursday mornings, the bus takes our seniors grocery shopping. Reservations for bus service and lunch must be made in advance by calling the office.

In 1990, we were asked to perform a new service, that of Intake for Fuel Assistance. Due to Federal cut-backs PACE could not take care of new clients. The Board of Health conducts a monthly Health Clinic on the fourth Tuesday at the Drop-in Center. Again, we offered free Tax Counseling for the elderly (TCE) in cooperation with Coastline Elderly/AARP. We distribute 500 copies of our newsletter each month. The Council distributes Surplus Foods quarterly under the auspices of PACE. We sponsor a monthly bus trip to out-of-town restaurants and interesting side trips. These are sold out almost as soon as they are announced. Speakers are on our agenda whenever they are available. We have seen a number of new clients this past year but would like to see more.

Again this year, we thank our faithful volunteers without whom we could not function.

ACUSHNET HISTORICAL COMMISSION

To the officers and residents of the Town of Acushnet:

The work of preserving the Town's historical heritage and of increasing people's awareness of the area's historical riches continued during 1990 with considerable success.

The Long Plain Friends Meetinghouse project is now nearing completion. After another successful auction, the Friends of the Friends Meetinghouse were able to contribute an additional and substantial amount to the restoration. The exterior is now complete and really impressive, especially when floodlit, on special occasions.

The downstairs floor, painted by "friendly" volunteers with paint contributed by a local store, is also now complete. The two turn-of-the-century woodstoves were professionally restored and a local woodworker completely restored the cabinet of the Sunday (First Day) school library, as his contribution to the project.

The upstairs is all ready for finishing. Still needed: baseboard molding, a large frame to show the old wallpaper, and a complete wallpapering, plus a paint job on the trim. We will also need some restoration work on the old benches (pews), some from 1759 and others from 1860.

It is hoped that some money may be raised from the foundations that have helped in the past (Acushnet Foundation, Polaroid and Henry H. Crapo) so that we may be able to finish the upstairs and hold a dedication ceremony in late spring. It is also planned to unveil a new bronze National Register of Historic Places plaque at the same ceremony.

The Acushnet Historical Society continued to operate and contribute the lion's share to the maintenance of the Museum. As usual, the peach cobbler and other goodies sold at their stand during the Apple-Peach Festival was the principal fund-raiser of the year.

As discussed in our last year's report, the entire third grade of the Acushnet Elementary School visited the Long Plain Museum last spring. They were transported by "horse-driven school barge" (courtesy Chipaway Stables) and bus (courtesy Medeiros Bus Co.), and spent their entire day on the grounds. Later, the fourth grade was taken on a Historical Tour of Olde Acushnet with buses once again

contributed by Medeiros. These activities, now expected to be annual events, are part of the program, along with visits by the 5th grade to the Whaling Museum, to give Acushet children a good grounding in local history.

In August the Commission sponsored another Historical Tour for seniors, which included the unveiling of the Leonard Boat Shop sign. It is planned to hold another Historical Tour for the general public in the spring of 1991, both for educational and fund-raising purposes.

The First Precinct Meetinghouse sign was to be installed in December but due to unforeseen circumstances the date has been postponed until spring.

Other signs planned for 1991 are:

Summerton House

The bell from Bell Rock, on Keene Road, turned up quite by accident, after about 10 years. It was located on a property farther down Keene Road in East Freetown. The Commission offered to erect a sign, if the owners would arrange to have the bell reinstalled in its old place atop the rock. We have not yet had a reply.

The Commission looks forward to continuing its rewarding work in 1991.

REPORT OF THE SANITARIAN

I respectfully submit a Sanitarians Report for the Acushnet Town Report. I assumed my responsibilities as Regional Sanitarian for the Acushnet, Marion, Rochester Health District in December of 1989. My work schedule for the District consists of two days in Acushnet, one day in Rochester and Marion. In addition a district day is scheduled on Fridays to visit the three officers and catch up on administrative work and inspections. My duties within each town includes witnessing percolation tests, plan review of proposed septic systems, inspection of restaurants and retail food stores, and investigation of complaints. I also review as-built plans of newly installed septic systems to be sure that they meet the requirements of Title V.

To provide contact with the applicants of those persons who are building new homes or repairing septic systems I have incorporated the use of a check off sheet to assure that all of the necessary information is obtained to process septic system permits. Applicants must supply Conservation Commission Determination and/or Orders of Conditions, well water analysis sheets for private well supplies, signature on disposal works construction applications, and the name of a licensed installer who will be installing the septic system.

In the town of Acushnet procedural policies have been developed regarding the installation of septic systems and the repair of failed systems. For the installation of all septic systems an inspection is required at the time of excavation and the completion of the septic system. For repairs an observation hole is required prior to the design of the plan to determine the nature of the soil.

My other duties include obtaining water samples for the analysis of the town beach. Last summer the beach was closed in July due to the high levels of fecal coliform. These levels may have been deposited by the large number of Canada geese who frequent the beach in the early morning hours.

I have also worked in conjunction with the recycling group C.L.E.A.N., Inc. of Rochester to schedule a newspaper recycling drive for the residents of Acushnet.

To conclude I feel that my first year as regional Sanitarian has focused on three areas:

1. Adjusting to the three individual office procedures.

- 2. Developing communication within the Town Hall officers such as the Building Inspector.
- 3. Developing a means of communication for those applicants in pursuit of obtaining septic permits and occupancy permits.

SOUTHEASTERN REGIONAL PLANNING AND ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT DISTRICT

The Southeastern Regional Planning and Economic Development District continued to serve the Town of Acushnet in 1990. SRPEDD (pronounced sir-ped) is a locally run regional agency serving southeastern Massachusetts dealing with issues being faced by each city and town in the region. The year 1990 was a difficult one for SRPEDD and for all of southeastern Massachusetts. The economy went into decline and all levels of government had to cut back, reducing the services they could provide. At SRPEDD we found more demand than ever for the regional approach to individual city and town problems. And we found more support for certain state government functions to be decentralized to the regional level.

In the past year, following the resignation of John Carvalho in August, Acushnet had no representation on the SRPEDD Commission.

Some of the district's more significant accomplishments in 1990 were:

- Completion of the annual Transportation Improvement Program (TIP) and Overall Economic Development Program (OEDP) which set regional priorities on federal and state grants for transportation and economic development projects.
- Staffing of the South Eastern Economic Development (SEED)
 Corporation, which makes loans to small businesses for expansion.
 In 1990, SEED approved loans to 7 small businesses in the amount
 of \$1.3 million. These loans are projected to create 130 jobs and
 will result in the investment of over \$5 million from private sources.
- SRPEDD continued to provide the planning services for the two regional transit authorities, GATRA and SRTA.
- SRPEDD reviewed the environmental impact of larger development projects in the region to insure that potential harmful impacts will be addressed. This year, we reviewed 43 such projects, commenting on the impact on traffic, water supply, sewage disposal, wetlands, and other development-related issues.
- Nine applications for federal and state funds were reviewed to insure consistency with other plans and efficient use of public funds.
- SRPEDD conducted a district-wide traffic counting program and

maintained a computer file of all available traffic count data for the period of 1980 through 1990 throughout the region.

- SRPEDD conducted workshops for local boards on Title V regulations (Health) and revolving accounts for review fees (Planning and others).
- SRPEDD worked throughout 1990 to expedite completion of the Old Colony Line, which will provide MBTA service into the region with a terminus in Lakeville. A 1992 completion date is projected.
- A regional industrial land plan was begun in 1990. The plan will determine if more land for industrial development is needed to meet future growth.
- SRPEDD, through a 205(j) water quality grant, worked with the Towns of Acushnet, Rochester, Mattapoisett and Fairhaven to inventory and map all domestic and commercial liquid underground storage tanks.
- SRPEDD has worked with Boards of Health, Wastewater Treatment Plant operators and septage haulers to assess the needs for appropriate septage management strategies for the Buzzards Bay area.

We look forward to serving you in 1991.
