REPORT OF THE ACUSHNET BOARD OF SELECTMEN 1999

In April of this year, Peter W. Koczera was re-elected to his third term, and the Board reorganized, electing David E. Wojnar as Chairman. It was a year marked with change and improvements.

Restructuring

After notification of the retirement of long-time Executive Secretary Elaine Miranda, the Board commissioned the Center for Policy Analysis at the University of Massachusetts, Dartmouth, to conduct a study for recommendations for future Town structure. Following one of their recommendations, the Board appointed former Finance Director Alan G. Coutinho as the Town's first Town Administrator and Robin M. Reasor to replace him as Finance Director.

Senior Center & Town Hall Improvements

It was a year that saw the completion of two substantial Capital Improvements. The Council on Aging Center at the former Burt School, with the help of a Community Development Block Grant from the Department of Housing & Community Development, opened, providing Acushnet's seniors with one of the nicer facilities in the area. The Town also completed the Americans with Disabilities Act's (ADA) required renovations at the Town Hall, allowing us again to use this beautiful building to conduct town business. If you haven't had a chance to stop in and see either of these projects, we recommend you do.

Downtown Village Area

The Board has a vision of an improved village area and appointed a Downtown Steering Committee to help bring that vision to fruition. With the help of a \$75,000.00 award from the State, the Town hired the Cecil Group to conduct a study for the Downtown Revitalization. They sought input from residents, officials and the private sector. In doing so, they've received some incredible ideas. The Board and our elected State officials were instrumental in the Town being eligible for a matching grant to get some of these ideas accomplished.

Rivet Land Purchase

The Town purchased property on Main Street that will, in the future, serve the Town on two fronts. A part of the property will be used for Conservation/Recreation purposes while the other will serve as a future water source. The Town was also awarded a self-help grant for \$115,600.00 by the Executive Office of Environmental Affairs to help defray this cost.

Parting Ways Building

In 1999, with the help of Senator Montigny, a \$325,000.00 grant was awarded to our Town. In the upcoming year we will begin renovations to the

Parting Ways Building to bring this historical property up to ADA code as well.

Golf Course

The Acushnet River Valley Golf Course completed its second season of operation and is on target with its original projections. The 1999 season planned for 30,875 rounds of golf and the actual number was 30,969. Projected revenues were \$1,029,570.00, and actual revenues were \$1,040,622.00. The June 30th Fiscal Year, as reported in the Finance Director's section, shows that the course's actual revenue was \$135,000.00 above projections.

Man of the Year

We would also like to congratulate Selectman Hardy in his award as Acushnet's Man of the Year.

The Board of Assessors received approval of Valuation in the month of September, 1999, enabling the Town to have actual tax bills sent, rather than estimated ones.

There are many new homes being built in Acushnet this year. That, along with sales for 1998 being much higher than the previous year, increased the valuations of residential property in town. Commercial values stayed the same or only a small value increase. The tax rate went up. Tax rate is figured using valuation and moneys approved at Town Meeting. Each year appropriation can be raised by 2 1/2%.

Very few appellate cases filed for FY99. This is happening due to accurate assessment system being used by the Board of Assessors, staff and consultant.

The consultant to the Board of Assessors is continuing to make in-house inspections as well as building permit inspections to update Assessors' records as required by Department of Revenue.

A G.I.S. system is in the process of being implemented in Town. Angela Filippone, of this office, has been working on and being trained for use of software programs which will benefit the Town. Angela has been appointed the G.I.S. system coordinator. The Board of Assessors, Conservation Commission and the Board of Public Works are just a few departments that will have a use for this new tool.

Services:

As developmental pressures continue to place stress upon the environment, the Board of Health activities and area of responsibilities continue to increase, including the implementation of new policies and regulations. At the conclusion of 1999, Mrs. Maria Otocki, Administrative Assistant to the Board, after more than 20 years of service to the Town of Acushnet, retired. The Board of Health wishes to thank Maria for her years of dedicated service to the citizens of Acushnet and wishes her happiness and good health in her Retirement.

Community Management Septic Program:

This program provides low interest loans through the Water Pollution Trust Fund for low to moderate income families for septic system repairs. REPORT OF THE HEALTH AGENT

During 1999 there was a slight slowdown in new construction, but repairs or replacement to existing septic systems continued to be steady as a result of property transfers.

As mentioned above, the Title V Betterment Grant Program will end on August 1, 2000, so any property owner who needs to upgrade or replace a failing septic system may take advantage of this low-interest loan. The use of innovative and advanced sewage disposal technology continues to increase. The Board of Health and the Health Agent attend educational seminars on New Technology. In addition, one Board of Health member attended a 3-day Soil Science seminar sponsored by UMASS Amherst and Coastal Zone Management. This will allow for certain soil determinations, such as system excavation depths and water tables to be done when the Health Agent is out of town.

The Board continued its ongoing health programs, such as food service inspections, water testing, tobacco control, and solid waste disposal. While Housing and general Environmental health complaints decreased in 1999, public and private water supply issues increased. Through the cooperative efforts of the Board of Public Works, Conservation Commission, and Board of Health, the residents of Squinn Brook began the remediation of the sewage problems. Design plans were approved by the local Boards, and actual repair construction started in the Fall of 1999. The Board of Health anticipates completion of the new septic systems by Summer of 2000 and wishes to publicly thank the residents of Cedar Hill Drive for their hard work and cooperation in bringing this project to the construction phase.

REPORT OF THE BRISTOL COUNTY MOSQUITO CONTROL PROJECT

On June 30, 1999 the Bristol County Mosquito Control Project completed forty years of service to the cities and towns of Bristol County.

The mosquito control project works year round in its efforts to reduce mosquito breeding sites and adult mosquito populations. The Project uses several different measures of control in its never-ending fight against mosquitoes.

Winter Pre-hatch - To treat breeding areas that are accessible only on the ice during the winter months.

Spring and Summer Larviciding - To reduce the emergence of adult mosquitoes in areas where mosquito larvae is present.

Catch Basin Treatment - To stop mosquito emergence from rain-filled catch basins and storm drains.

Light Trapping Program - To monitor mosquito populations as to their type and number - a program necessary in encephalitis surveillance. Light trapping of mosquitoes is also useful to determine what areas have high mosquito populations and should be sprayed.

Water Management - A year-round endeavor to clean and construct mosquito drainage ditches in lowland swamps to reduce their favorability as breeding sites for mosquito larvae.

It is the policy of the Bristol County Mosquito Control Project to use pesticides that are environmentally safe so that the safety of the people and environment are not jeopardized. We use as many of the biological insecticides as are practical with the environmental conditions present in the New England area. We are presently using three different formulations of B.T.I. in our larviciding program.

All of our spray equipment is calibrated periodically in order to insure that dosage rates remain at safe levels but are adequate to reduce mosquito populations. The operators of our spray equipment are state certified pesticide applicators who are required to attend classes on pesticide safety on a yearly basis.

The 1999 mosquito season was normal at the beginning with larvae hatching in average numbers in the usual breeding sites. As early summer approached, however, breeding sites began to dry down rapidly. By mid-summer our spraying, along with the extremely dry weather, had reduced mosquito populations to such low levels that spraying was not necessary in

most areas. It was not until after Labor Day, when it began to rain on a fairly regular basis, that the mosquito populations began to rise again.

The Massachusetts Department of Public Health found 2 isolations of the EE virus in Bristol County but no human cases were reported in the State during the 1999 season.

New York, however, had 60 confirmed human cases of West Nile-like virus that resulted in 7 human deaths. Mosquitoes began spreading the virus south into New Jersey and east to Long Island and along the Connecticut coast. More than 10,000 birds were infected and died as a result of the virus, along with a number of horses, a dog and a cat. Areas that had year-round organized mosquito control did not seem to have any problems, other than some isolations of the virus.

Massachusetts Public Health ran many tests on birds and mosquitoes to check for the West Nile virus, but all testing was negative.

It is not known, at this time, if the West Nile-like virus found in New York and Connecticut this year will become a problem in Massachusetts during the next mosquito season, the summer of 2000. DPH, along with all mosquito control projects, will be on the alert for any signs of the virus when the season begins.

The Project sprayed all known mosquito-infested areas and answered all requests for spraying, for a total of 3,889.8 sprayed acres.

During the spring and summer months, 6.63 acres of breeding wetlands were larvicided

During the fall and winter months, a total of 860 feet of drainage ditch was reclaimed.

I would like to thank the town officials and the people of Acushnet for their continued support and cooperation and look forward to serving them in the coming year. Should anyone have a question as to what might be done to relieve a mosquito problem in their area, whether it is water management work, treatment of a breeding site, or just having an area checked, please feel free to call our office.

REPORT OF THE ACUSHNET CABLE ADVISORY COMMITTEE

To the Subscribers and Residents of Acushnet:

The present Acushnet Cable Advisory Committee was newly appointed in November 1997. The Committee has five full time members.

The Committee meets on the first Thursday of every month at the Acushnet Community Center at 7:00 p.m. This Committee, in the short span of two years since it was reappointed, has accomplished the following:

We have completed the relocation of the old studio and operate from the Acushnet Cable Studio in the Acushnet Community Center, located at 232 Middle Road, Acushnet, MA. The studio facilities are open and available to the residents of Acushnet for any production of interest to the Community.

We are in the process of building and equipping a new programming center at the Town Hall so that many more Town meetings will be broadcast live from the new Town Hall Meeting Room.

The Committee has been taping events of Community interest since its inception. We began our own live programming on Acushnet's Channel 15 - Government Access programming, and we maintain the Channel 15 Bulletin Board, which is on 24 hours a day. We rebroadcast taped events every day at various times so that the citizens of Acushnet may be able to watch a meeting in the event they missed the live broadcast or taped meeting.

The Committee has taped over 150 meetings in the last year. Several town board meetings were broadcast live this year. We are presently showing live productions on Channel 15 every Monday with broadcasts of the Selectmen's meetings on Acushnet's Channel 15 - Government Access.

During the past year we taped several events of community interest; for example, the school concerts, the school Halloween Party Parade, the Gong Show, the Apple Peach Festival, Holiday greetings from the department heads, Candidates' night, the Special Town Meetings, and of course the School Facilities Study Committee meetings.

We are presently negotiating a new cable casting contract with RCN which will bring competition into the Town and hopefully lower the present cable rates. We hope it will help in maintaining lower rates in the future as well. A contract with RCN will offer the Town additional channels that at present are not being offered by ATT.

We have trained our camera operators, alpha gen operators, and editing operators. The Committee welcomes anyone willing to volunteer for the above studio duties or as a camera operator. These positions are always needed and

the Committee pays camera operators \$50.00 per event and editors and alpha gen operators \$10.00 per hour.

The Committee hopes to become more experienced, better trained and equipped in order to film many more events live in the upcoming year. The Committee has developed plans to purchase additional studio equipment so that we may more effectively operate the studio, show additional tapes on a daily basis, run longer (up to three hours) productions and update the studio for future events.

We are also trying to produce programs of community interest, such as studio interviews, possible debate forums, and/or talk show style productions. If anyone is interested in producing this type of production for the upcoming year, please contact the Committee.

The Committee welcomes any ideas from the subscribers of Cable TV and residents of Acushnet as to what they consider most important or what they would like to see produced live, versus a taped production.

The Committee also welcomes any input as to what times are the best to view previously taped meetings as we can now run the tapes on a 24-hour basis.

Flood control and storm damage prevention
Pollution prevention
Protection of fisheries, shellfish and wildlife habitat

The Commission also strives to plan for, acquire, and manage recreational open space, as well as encourage conservation and agricultural preservation restrictions.

Acushnet's 5-Year Open Space & Recreation Plan update was also begun in October 1999, which will enable the Town to compete in obtaining state and federal grant money.

Also in March 1999, there were five members and staff of the Commission who attended the Massachusetts Association of Conservation Commission's Annual Conference. The MACC is a nonprofit corporation founded in 1961 to support, educate and advocate on behalf of Conservation Commissions throughout the Commonwealth.

REPORT OF THE COUNCIL ON AGING

To the Officers and Residents of Acushnet:

The Acushnet Council on Aging meets on the second and fourth Tuesday of each month at 9:30 a.m. in the Conference Room of the new Senior Center.

The Senior Center is open to all seniors daily from 8:00 a.m. to 4:00 p.m. Lunch is served daily with day-before reservations at 11:45 a.m. Free bus transportation is available to those who need it to come to lunch. We also deliver approximately 70 meals (Meals on Wheels) to our shut-ins on a daily basis.

Our seniors play Bingo every Monday and Wednesday at 12:45 p.m. Massage service is also on Monday afternoons. Cribbage games are also on Monday afternoons. We also have craft lessons daily in the morning. The Scrabble Club meets every Tuesday afternoon from 1:00 to 4:00 p.m.

Line dancing is held at the Senior Center every Thursday afternoon. Whist parties are held on Friday afternoons from 1:00 to 4:00 p.m. Square dancing will be held the first Saturday of each month from 7:00 to 10:30 p.m.

The bus also picks up seniors who are able to get on or off the bus without assistance to take them grocery shopping on Wednesday and Thursday mornings. Seniors must call ahead if they need this service.

The Visiting Nurse Association services a Blood Pressure Clinic every Wednesday from 9:00 to 10:00 a.m. This service is well attended.

The Shine Program consists of a representative who assists elders in understanding health insurance, helps process claims, informs elders of their rights and assists them with problems concerning health insurance

We assist seniors in filling out forms for fuel assistance and the Pharmacy Program. We also have a tax consultant who assists seniors in filling out their tax forms. These services are free of charge but an appointment is required.

Senior I.D. pictures are taken by appointment only.

The Share Program is sponsored by the Acushnet Council on Aging and is distributed monthly at the Senior Center.

Due to arrangements made by C.O.A. with COM Electric, COM Gas, and Bell Atlantic, residents may now pay their utility and phone bills at the Acushnet Credit Union. This is a great convenience, especially for seniors.

We have a group called the "Friends of the Acushnet Council on Aging." They invite you to establish your membership with them. This group is primarily interested in raising funds to assist the Senior Center financially. They are a nonprofit entity of the Acushnet Council on Aging. To join, simply call the Senior Center at 998-0280.

We distribute 500 copies of our monthly newsletter to various spots in town. We also send them to area councils on aging. The Council has again applied for and received a yearly grant from the Department of Elder Affairs. This grant helps to maintain our bus which is used to transport seniors who have no transportation to come for lunch or go grocery shopping.

As we do each year, we wish to thank our many and faithful volunteers who devote many hours daily to serve our seniors -- we couldn't function without them. We also thank all town departments for their assistance and cooperation; we have all worked well together.

REPORT OF THE ACUSHNET EMERGENCY MANAGEMENT AGENCY

To the Officers and Residents of Acushnet:

The Acushnet Emergency Management Agency is compromised of volunteers who are trained to support the work of town departments, such as Police, Fire, E.M.S., Public Works and all other Town organizations, as well as working with the Massachusetts and Federal Emergency Management Agencies. We respond to personal crises, as well as town-wide disasters, such as hurricanes and winter storms. We provide lighting to town events and traffic control for parades and traffic accidents.

Since almost all of our repairs and improvements are completed by our volunteers, each tax dollar spent provides the best possible return. With your support and our hard work, we maintain our own office and communications center and provide the town with two emergency vehicles complete with onboard generators.

This year we assisted in a variety of events, such as the Apple Peach Parade, Halloween Parade, Little League Parade, Grade 6--8 dances at the Community Center, Christmas Sing-A-Long, Santa at the Mall in Dartmouth, and the Fathers' Day Road Race in Fairhaven. Also in 1999 we gave assistance to the teen dances at the Parting Ways of the Greens during the summer, which were a great success.

This year we were more involved with the Amateur Radio Emergency Services (ARES). In case of power and telephone outages, this group of ham radio operators can assist us with emergency communications. In 1999, again, I would like to thank ARES for their assistance at the Apple and Peach Festival parade, providing communications along the route.

The Agency also works with SKYWARN. This group of amateur radio operators monitor the weather along the New England coast and report to the National Weather Service in Taunton, MA.

REPORT OF THE EMERGENCY MEDICAL SERVICE

To the Officers and Residents of the Town of Acushnet, MA, I hereby submit my annual report for the year ending December 31, 1999.

It has been a very anxious year for EMS in the advent of the rumored divesting of Paramedic Services at St. Luke's Hospital. This service is a vital link in our community. Many lives have been saved because of this service. While the service continues, efforts are being made to prepare for an alternative plan to continue to provide this service. It is a monumental task which is being addressed by many communities.

We continue to treat walk-in injuries and transports from our new station. We are also receiving many more direct calls for services. We attribute this to better visibility and a sign of what EMS is becoming because of managed care.

While we are unsure of the Y2K bug, EMS has tested all equipment to insure compliance. There are no inconsistencies at this time. All vendors have guaranteed full compliance of their equipment.

We are continuing to provide CPR and First Aid training to the community. We successfully completed the defibrillation training for the Acushnet Police Officers. This will be ongoing to insure skill proficiency.

We also were fortunate to receive Critical Incident Containment training from STOP Team's Lt. Cary Maroni, through the coordination of Acushnet Police Chief Michael R. Poittras.

We are currently staffed with 20 members: 16 are State EMT-D certified, 4 are currently awaiting upgrading, and 6 members are nationally certified. All are updated to the new national curriculum. We currently have eleven CPR instructors and two CPR instructor-trainers. We also have one State Examiner and one Chief Examiner. We also acquired three ASHI Instructors.

I would like to thank the members of Acushnet EMS for continuing to perform in the professional manner they always do.

I would also like to thank the Board of Selectmen for recognizing the need and addressing the paramedic issue.

To the Officials and Residents of the Town of Acushnet, I hereby submit my report for the year ending December 31, 1999.

During calendar year 1999 your Fire Department responded to 244 calls for service. A partial breakdown is as follows:

All Town fire apparatus is in good condition; however, our radio system needs upgrading. We currently are using low-band radios which are affected by computers and other outside interference. Repair parts and replacement equipment is now becoming limited because fewer vendors have this type of equipment available for purchase. It is hoped in the next year that our radios will be updated to enable us to communicate with all Town departments in the event of a major incident.

Three potential new members are currently working through a mandatory in-house Firefighter Certification Level I/II, which is required for membership in the Department. Monthly training sessions were conducted for all members.

The Fire Department received a \$3,115.00 grant for the Student Awareness of Fire Safety Education (S.A.F.E.) program. This was a \$600.00 increase over the amount of last year. This program is conducted with the fourth grade students in all our schools, emphasizing fire safety and the dangers associated with tobacco use.

The annual Open House was again a great success. Displays of Fire Department equipment were presented, along with informational booths by the Acushnet Police Department and Emergency Medical Services Department.

During 1999 the name of this department was modified to reflect the services provided by the fire service in the 21st century. We are now known as the Acushnet Fire/Rescue Department. As shown by the breakdown in the

beginning of this report, the majority of the calls to this department are no longer fire related but more of a public assistance nature.

REPORT OF THE ACUSHNET HISTORICAL COMMISSION

The Acushnet Historical Commission had a successful year in its twin tasks of encouraging preservation of historical properties and of furthering the education of townspeople in their history.

The Commission's intervention in the preservation of the White's Factory property finally resulted in its transfer to the Fairhaven/Acushnet Land Trust, with the Town holding a preservation restriction. This will ensure that this very historic property will be preserved in perpetuity.

As a result of the Commission's intervention, the original Long Plain School class lists hanging on the walls of the Long Plain Museum were taken down and stored for preservation and replaced with copies.

The summer of 1999 saw a great deal of activity. The Acushnet Historical Society opened the Long Plain Museum for visitors and the Friends of the Friends Meetinghouse, under the jurisdiction of the Commission, opened the Meetinghouse for visitors every Sunday from June through mid-September and offered tours to the public. Their very successful free summer concert season -- The Beans in June, Jeff Dunn Band in July and the Harpoon Harmonizers in August -- attracted hundreds of visitors, many of whom were also given historical tours around the building.

During the course of the summer Kathleen Fair, Chairman of the Dartmouth Historical Commission, acting on a free-lance basis, researched some twenty historical homes to add to our inventory.

The Commission has applied for a "Survey and Planning" grant, which will involve the Town matching a \$9,000.00 grant from the state with a \$6,000.00 appropriation. These funds will be used principally for completing the Town's comprehensive inventory in preparation for applying for three National Register Historic Districts: the Village (institutional), the Village (residential) and Long Plain. The decision to apply for three separate historic districts was based on a visit to the Massachusetts Historical Commission by our chairman and a tour of the town with a representative of the Massachusetts Historical Commission, and her resulting recommendation.

Partially as a result of intervention by the Commission, Miss Rogerson of Whelden Lane donated 25.6 acres along the river to the Fairhaven/Acushnet Land Trust.

With the encouragement of the Commission, the Town purchased the socalled Rivet property behind the Meetinghouse, partially to be held as conservation land and partly for well sites. This will act as a buffer for the Meetinghouse and prevent development in the area. The grant for the establishment of the Whelden Mill Nature and Historical Trail was approved and funds are now available. Work will be done during the spring of 2000 and it is hoped the Trail will open to visitors during the summer of 2000.

Plans are being made for some interior and exterior painting of the Meetinghouse during the spring of 2000. This will not incur any expense on the part of the Town since the Commission has sufficient funds from the income of its trust funds to adequately cover such expenses.

REPORT OF THE HOUSING AUTHORITY

April of 2000 will mark our 26th anniversary at Presidential Terrace.

We, the members and Executive Director of the Acushnet Housing Authority, are proud to have been a part in offering to its elderly citizens of Acushnet one of the finest complexes in the Commonwealth of Massachusetts.

Our meetings are held on the second Thursday of each month throughout the year in the Community Hall at Presidential Terrace at 9:30 a.m. The office is open Monday through Friday from 8:30 a.m. to 12:30 p.m.

Eligible/qualified residents of State-aided housing pay no more than 30% of their adjusted monthly income for rent. In order to qualify for State-aided public housing administered by the Acushnet Housing Authority, you must have an income in the following range:

Number of Occupants	Net Income Range
One Person	Max. \$25,150.00
Two People	Max. \$28,750.00

As of August 9, 1996, DHCD has eliminated the maximum asset limits as long as the applicant's yearly net income is below the net income range. Applicants must be over the age of 60 years or handicapped/disabled to be eligible.

Our 689 Project on Garfield Street has been open for over five years and is working successfully.

The Advisory Committee meetings for Garfield Street are held quarterly throughout the year. New members are encouraged to attend by calling New England Fellowship at Garfield Street.

Once again, from its occupancy over a decade ago to its present day, the Acushnet Housing Authority would like to express its gratitude to everyone who, in any way, has been and continues to be an asset in making Presidential Terrace the outstanding elderly complex that it is today.

REPORT OF THE PACT PROGRAM

The PACT Program (Prevention and Cessation of Tobacco) is now over five years old. It all began in 1994 when the Acushnet, Marion and Rochester Regional Health District applied for a grant through the Massachusetts Tobacco Control Program. The Marion Board of Health is the lead agency for the grant, and since then the Boards of Health in Lakeville and Mattapoisett have joined the collaborative with the new three year grant awarded in 1997.

The PACT Program has addressed three areas of responsibility: policy promotion and enforcement to reduce tobacco sales to minors (youth access), policy promotion and enforcement aimed at protecting the public from ETS (environmental tobacco smoke), and community services, such as prevention outreach and free smoking cessation, now known as Tobacco Treatment.

Over the past year, the PACT Program conducted six compliance checks on tobacco merchants throughout the five towns served. Four of the six checks resulted in 100% compliance with the youth access regulations in the towns surveyed. In two of the six checks, tobacco products were sold to minors under the age of 18. Our compliance check rate is very high. In fact, compliance checks in Mattapoisett and Rochester resulted in no sales to minors for the entire year. Merchants who have never sold to minors are to be commended. It takes daily vigilance to consistently check for ID's from everyone who purchases tobacco products. These tobacco vendors have clearly shown their support of their local Board of Health regulations.

The PACT Program also participated in a cable TV production filmed at Cable Access in New Bedford, featuring the Directors of the Greater New Bedford Tobacco Control Program, the Tobacco Free Greater New Bedford Coalition, and the PACT Program. The program was designed to educate the public about the dangers of ETS and the importance of passing ETS regulations for all public places and worksites, including restaurants. In addition, the program highlighted the upcoming free Tobacco Treatment programs in the region scheduled to commemorate the Great American Smokeout last November. The program was aired several times on Media One, serving Marion, Mattapoisett and Rochester.

School assemblies are another important component of the PACT Program. Last year six assemblies were coordinated by the PACT Program at Old Rochester Regional High and Junior High, Ford Middle School in Acushnet, Sippican School in Marion, and Austin Middle School in Lakeville. These assemblies featured Bob Mehrman, a laryngectomee, and Pam Laffin, a 30-year-old lung transplant recipient who suffers from emphysema. Over 2,225 students were reached with these important tobacco prevention presentations.

Tobacco Treatment (formerly known as cessation services) plays a big role in the work of the program as well. Last year we piloted a new model in which smokers could participate in a three session support group led by the PACT Program Director, followed by three hypnotherapy sessions conducted by a clinical hypnotherapist specializing in Tobacco Treatment. The programs were conducted in Acushnet, Lakeville, Marion and Mattapoisett. One of the hypnotherapy programs was held at the Sippican Shop hosted by Noreen Nolan, and two hypnotherapy sessions were paid for by the Acushnet Health Advisory Council and one by the Old Rochester Regional Health Advisory Council. Over 200 smokers participated, with an astounding 55% quit rate when they were surveyed six months after the programs ended. The national quit rate for "stop smoking" support programs is approximately 30%, so our model is working very well!

The PACT Program once again acted as Advisor to TASC (Teens Against Smoking & Chewing), Old Rochester Junior and Senior High Students, as well as Smokebusters, elementary students from Sippican School. The students participated in Youth Day 2000 at the North Dartmouth Mall, reaching 2000 area residents with their tobacco prevention message. They also designed and put together another creative 4th of July float, with the support of the League of Women Voters of Marion, Mattapoisett and Rochester, and Alex Race, who generously donated the use of his truck. This year's themes were "Don't Let Your Health Go Up In Smoke" and "Listen To Your Heart, Don't Start." The group's efforts paid off with a trophy for second prize in the Creative Category.

The PACT Program also talked to participants and distributed information to 600 Rochester residents at the Annual Rochester Safety Awareness Day and 120 employees of Logo Headgear in Mattapoisett at their annual health fair. The program provided Freshair.net T-shirts, beach balls, and lip balm for distribution at the Mattapoisett Wharf Dance, sponsored by the Mattapoisett Track Club and Acushnet Teen Dances, sponsored by the Acushnet Police Department, as well as the 4th of July parade.

Several area tobacco control organizations collaborated with the PACT Program on the first ever ETS Bus Campaign by developing an ad that read "DON'T BREATHE - That's The Only Way Second Hand Smoke Won't Harm You." The buses with the ads were seen in Dartmouth, Fairhaven, Fall River, Mattapoisett, New Bedford, and Westport last spring. People with questions about the effects of ETS were encouraged to call an 800 phone number. The campaign helped local Boards of Health to gain support for ETS regulations.

The big news this year is that another Board of Health, Freetown, has expressed interest in joining our collaborative. We are looking forward to bringing them on board in February when additional funds from the Tobacco Settlement will become available. Now all communities from Dartmouth to Wareham will be part of an MTCP Board of Health collaborative. We welcome Freetown and look forward to serving their residents in 2000.

Once again a very sincere thanks to all the Boards of Health in Acushnet, Lakeville, Marion, Mattapoisett and Rochester. We have seen incredible new data which reveals that smoking rates among Massachusetts adults have declined 1.5% since the inception of the Massachusetts Tobacco Control Program, from 22.6% to 19.1%, while the national adult smoking rate is 24%. This corresponds to approximately 153,000 fewer smokers. More good news smoking among Masschusetts Youth, ages 14-17, has declined from 24.6% to 19.7%, while the rest of the nation has seen an increase. Together we are making smoking history!!

REPORT OF THE ACUSHNET PLANNING COMMISSION

To the Officers and Residents of the Town of Acushnet:

The Planning Commission respectfully submits the following report for the calendar year 1999.

Regular meetings were generally held on the first Monday of the month at 7:30 p.m. at various handicap-accessible locations around Town, from the much appreciated use of the Acushnet Elementary School's various rooms to the equally appreciated occasional use of the Acushnet Community Center's facilities. A total of twenty meetings were posted. Special and on-site meetings were posted and held also, and public hearings were scheduled as warranted.

The Planning Commission spent a good deal of its time this year overseeing the compliance of 17 different subdivisions as to roadways, drainage issues, surety issues, lot releases and resident satisfaction with conditions within the various subdivisions.

The Planning Commission continues to respond to the zoning and roadway questions referred by the Board of Selectmen, the Building Inspector, the DPW, and the Conservation Commission, as well as those posed by the citizens of Acushnet, landowners and developers.

While the Planning Commission handled issues dealing with the following subdivisions: Apple Blossom Estates, Bernardo Farms, Buttonwood Meadows, Davis Farms Estates, Deep Brook III, Forestdale, Gabriel Farms Estates, Golf View Estates, Hathaway Farms, Mendall Hill Estates, Reservoir Estates, Sandpiper Lane Subdivision, Squinn Brook II, Stony Acres, Wayland Estates, Wild Rose Meadows, and Wood Duck Road Subdivision, there were no new subdivisions approved in 1999.

Twenty-two Form A submissions were processed and some were accepted. On-site meetings were held in four locations. Two special permits for common driveways were processed: one was ultimately approved, the other was withdrawn.

The Planning Commission is always willing to assist individuals in understanding the land rules and regulations. Acushnet residents are welcome to attend all public meetings which are posted at Town Hall on the bulletin boards in the Town Clerk's office and outside of the Selectmen's office.

REPORT OF THE POLICE DEPARTMENT

To the officials and residents of the Town of Acushnet, I hereby submit my report for the year ending December 31, 1999.

All police officers attended First Aid and CPR courses as required by law to retain their First Responder status.

Five new part-time officers were given contingent offers of employment in November of 1999. One of those officers, Scott R. Gordon, was hired effective December 20, 1999. Officer Gordon attended a Reserve Intermittent Academy held in Barnstable from September through December 6, 1999. Officer Gordon is continuing his training here at the Acushnet Police Department. He is currently working dispatch duties only but will be fully trained for patrol duties by the end of January. The remaining four officers are enrolled in the Westport Reserve Intermittent Academy, scheduled to graduate in March of 2000.

Officers Gil Marques and Joseph Pontes retired in the Spring of 1999. Officers Keith A. Ashley and Jason L. Matton were promoted from the part-time ranks to replace the above two officers. Officer Ashley graduated from the Basic Recruit Academy in September and has been working full time for the Town since then. Officer Matton entered the Academy on October 18, 1999 and will graduate in early March. There is still one remaining vacancy to be filled in the full-time ranks due to the federal "COPS in School" grant (\$125,000) we received this year.

Officer Gary L. Rousseau continued the D.A.R.E. program in the Town's elementary schools and in the middle school.

The Police Department continued to be very effective in obtaining grants in 1999. In addition to the COPS grant mentioned above, we received a D.A.R.E. grant that will cover the officer's salary and expenses. We anticipate receiving \$25,000 from the State for Community Policing and over \$28,000 from the Bureau of Justice Assistance Program. These grant monies will be used to replace our soon-to-be-obsolete radio communications. FCC regulations will require us to replace all of our current equipment which is in dire need of replacing anyway. The grants will allow us to do so at no cost to the Town.

All members of the Department were qualified or re-qualified with their duty weapons and shotguns.

Officer John A. Bolarinho received recognition from MADD as Acushnet's eleventh Officer of the Year.

To the Officers and Residents of the Town of Acushnet

The Acushnet **DPW** - **Highway Division** has been busy during the 1999 calendar year with repairing streets, cleaning drain lines, clearing drainage ditches, constructing and repairing manholes and catch basins, repairing sidewalks, clearing roadside brush, street sweeping, sanding and snow plowing being the major tasks accomplished by the Department.

Numerous small tasks, performed on an as-needed basis, were also completed. The Department personnel responded to emergency situations very quickly and are often called during off-duty hours to complete these emergency tasks.

In addition to the day-to-day activities of the Highway Division, the following special projects were completed in 1999.

New drainage systems were installed and improved upon on Gammons Road, Lambert Street, North Main Street and Cedar Hill Drive. Chapter 90 Roadway Funds were used to resurface James Street, John Street, Coulombe Street, Bardsley Street, Hayes Street and Garfield Street. Local funds were used in the reconstruction of Lambert Street.

In addition to these projects, the Department was able to assist other departments with small tasks on an as-needed basis.

Finally, while no new equipment was purchased during 1999, a major effort was made to repair existing equipment, thus prolonging the useful life of this very costly machinery.

WATER AND SEWER DIVISION

The Water/Sewer Division installed 800 feet of new water main on John Street during 1998. During 1999 the Department laid 260 feet of new water main on Gill Street

In addition, the Department also replaced 6 hydrants and repaired 8 water leaks and/or water main breaks in Town.

Water service installations included 84 new homes, 63 old meters were replaced, and 50-100 meters were repaired, for a total of approximately 247 new meter installations.

The fire hydrants in the system were flushed and tested for function during the year and reinspected prior to the winter months. All hydrant valves were exercised and monthly water sampling was done. We also had 10 service inspections and completed our lead and copper testing for the year.

A study was begun and is under way in an effort to evaluate infiltration and inflow into the sewer system. This study continued into 1999 and is ongoing at this time.

We also completed two segments of Back Flow testing for 1999.

We would like to thank all D.P.W. employees and all Town departments for their cooperation and assistance during 1999.

Listed below are some of the proven practices for water conservation. By utilizing them, we will be helping to save our natural resources and save money by reducing product demand.



Some easy to understand things you can do to conserve water (Ideas from the American Water Works Association)

- 1. Check every faucet in your house for leaks. Just a slow drip can waste 15 to 20 gallons of water a day.
- 2. Put a bit of food coloring in each toilet tank. Without flushing, watch to see for a few minutes if the color shows up in the bowl. It is not uncommon to lose 100 gallons a day from an otherwise invisible toilet leak.
- 3. Do not shower too long or fill the tub too full. Five minutes for a shower and five inches in the tub is plenty.
- 4. Try to use automatic dish and clothes machines with full loads only. Even when machines feature short cycles, you are being more efficient with water with a full load.
- 5 Water your lawn and garden with good sense. It is best to water early in the day or late in the afternoon and **NOT** in the mid-day heat. Avoid watering on windy days or allowing your automatic sprinkler system to operate on rainy days and when it is not necessary. You might want to consult with a local Lawn and Garden Specialist for unique water conservation devices.

REPORT OF THE RUSSELL MEMORIAL LIBRARY

To the Officers and Residents of the Town of Acushnet:

The Board of Trustees and the library staff continued to work together to meet the educational, informational, and recreational needs of the citizens of Acushnet in 1999.

The Board meets on the third Wednesday of the month at 6 p.m. at the Library. The Library is open Monday 3-6 p.m., Tuesday and Thursday, 1-8 p.m., Wednesday 10 a.m.-6 p.m. and Saturday 10 a.m.-1 p.m., year round. Telephone, 998-0270; Fax: 998-0271.

Staff: Claudette Olivier, Assistant Director; Constance Preston, Technician II; Denise Hamer, Technician I; and Judith Caruthers, Page; unfilled, Custodian II. Director Valdene Kane resigned in the spring to move out of state. We thank her for her years of service and wish her well. Tonya Revell became Library Director effective May 27, 1999.

The first annual user count was taken during an average week in October; 363 people came in. Using this number, the estimated visits to the library in 1999 was 18,876.

The Library offers a wide selection of books, magazines, videos, music CDs, books on tape, and CD/ROMs for all ages. Two computers are dedicated to public Internet use. On-line databases are available for research. A copy machine and fax machine are available for a nominal fee. The meeting room may be used by town organizations free of charge.

The Library's continued membership in the Southeastern Automated Libraries (SEAL) Network brings substantial benefits to the Town. Users have access to extensive collections throughout the region via our automated catalog. This year SEAL provided the Library with a free computer, one of three needed to connect to the new web-based automated system coming in 2000. SEAL membership provides technical support, electronic resources, and staff development classes.

The Library is also a member of the Southeastern Massachusetts Regional Library System (SEMLS), an agency of the Massachusetts Board of Library Commissioners. Free membership in SEMLS provides pickup and delivery of shared materials, on-line databases, materials for the summer reading program, staff development, and consultants.

Children's services continue to be in great demand. The summer reading program was a big success. 160 children registered and made over 1500 visits to the library in July and August. Seven free afternoon programs and seven

evening storytimes brought a total attendance of 629. Preparations for Summer 2000 are well under way.

A grant of \$950 from the Acushnet Cultural Council allowed the library to sponsor a visit by award winning author William Sleator to Ford Middle School. Books purchased by the PTO enabled students to read a title in advance of the visit.

Pre-school story times are offered in spring and fall for children 3, 4 and 5 years of age. A second session was added this year to give parents a choice of day and time.

The inadequacies of our aging, inaccessible, and too-small building and the demands of a rapidly changing technology continue to present obstacles and challenges to library service.

The Building Committee is comprised of Alfred Robichaud (Chairman), JoAnn Bertrand (Secretary). Ted Govoni, Deborah Healey, James Knox, Peter Koczera, Constance Preston, and Marylou Marques, and Tonya Revell (ex-officio).

This Spring we were excited to learn of a major gift. A generous local citizen, who wishes to remain anonymous, gave stocks to the library that, when sold, brought \$192,128.80. This money is intended for a new library that will be fully accessible and will have space for our growing collection and growing population. The Building Committee and Selectmen are working to find and acquire a suitable location.

Meanwhile we continue to care for our cherished local landmark. In the Spring voters approved a special article that paid for repairs to the large leaded glass windows and for new blinds. Both expenditures have helped keep utility costs down and protect the computers in the main hall.

Electronic databases are rapidly replacing print materials as the source of up-to-date information. Automated systems are becoming more sophisticated. Internet use has increased. All of these require more time and expertise of the staff, both for their own work and to enable them to help patrons find and evaluate information. Equipment and software require frequent upgrades.

Acushnet's financial support of the Library met and exceeded the minimum standards required by the Massachusetts Board of Library Commissioners for certification in 1998. Acushnet was awarded three State Aid grants, totaling \$10,454.00. In 2000 the official federal census estimate for Acushnet is 10,111. To remain certified and eligible for State aid, grants, and other services, the Library will be required to meet higher standards, including an increase in hours open.

We give our heartfelt thanks to: The Friends of the Russell Memorial Library, led by volunteers Constance Preston and Cynthia Marks, for unflagging service and wonderful materials, Wilfred Fortin for his generous donations of books and magazines, the businesses, organizations and individuals whose financial donations make our summer reading program possible, Ed Macomber for numerous acts of kindness, the Parting of the Ways Beautification Committee for plantings and wreaths, the Police Association for children's videos, and the library patrons who generously donate books and magazines.

The Board of Trustees and the Library staff wish to thank Town officers, other Town departments, and the citizens of Acushnet for their support throughout the year.

REPORT OF THE SOUTHEASTERN REGIONAL PLANNING AND ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT DISTRICT (SRPEDD)

The town of Acushnet is a member of the Southeastern Regional Planning and Economic Development District. SRPEDD (pronounced sir-ped) is the regional agency serving twenty-seven cities and towns in southeastern Massachusetts dealing with common issues facing our region, such as economic development, growth and land development, transportation, environment and general planning for the future. SRPEDD is governed by a commission of local mayors, selectmen, planning board members and at-large members. We are funded by federal and state grants and local assessments. For 1999 the Town of Acushnet paid \$1,468.93 to SRPEDD, based upon an assessment of 15,375 cents per capita.

During the past year the Town of Acushnet was represented on the SRPEDD Commission by David Wojnar, Richard Forand and Richard Ellis. Representatives on the Joint Transportation Planning Group were Kenneth Souza and Richard Settele.

Some of SRPEDD's more significant accomplishments during 1999 were:

- * The Vision 2020 Task Force released its report in 1999 Southeastern Massachusetts: An Agenda for the Future. It addresses the issue of unplanned growth and sprawl in the region and makes specific recommendations for change. The Vision 2020 Task Force was a panel of regional leaders representing various interests throughout southeastern Massachusetts. It was sponsored by SRPEDD and two other regional planning agencies OCPC and MAPC.
- * Completion and certification of the annual Transportation Improvement Program (TIP), which set regional priorities for federal transportation funds. The TIP sets priorities for \$92 million in federal and state dollars for regional transportation projects over the next three years.
- * Building Partnerships for Economic Development in Southeastern Massachusetts, a regional economic development strategy, was completed and certified by the U.S. Economic Development Administration, making the region eligible for federal economic development grants from EDA.
- * "The 100 Most Dangerous Intersections in Southeastern Massachusetts" was compiled by SRPEDD utilizing accident information for the 1996-98 three year period. All 100 intersections are evaluated and ranked according to level of danger and traffic volume, and the report is used to identify needed safety improvements at these intersections.
- * SRPEDD conducts a district-wide traffic counting program and maintains

a computer file of all available traffic count data throughout the region. SRPEDD undertook counts at 90 locations this year. SRPEDD also compiled computerized accident records for Acushnet, Fairhaven, Norton, Rehoboth, Rochester, Seekonk and Freetown.

- * Southeastern Massachusetts is represented on the Internet by SRPEDD's web site at http://www/srpedd.org. The site contains data and information about every city and town in the region and includes the Vision 2020 project, transportation, planning, zoning, environmental and economic development. SRPEDD also operates the Southeastern Massachusetts Data Center, which maintains the Fact Book and provides information to businesses, cities and towns, and individuals. We completed population, employment and housing unit projections to the year 2025 for each city and town.
- * SRPEDD continued work to develop commuter rail service to Taunton, Fall River and New Bedford, and is continuing to monitor MBTA studies of alternative routes. SRPEDD reviewed and commented on the MBTA's Draft Environmental Impact Report for commuter rail service. SRPEDD reviewed and commented on the MBTA's Draft Environmental Impact Report for commuter rail service. SRPEDD conducted a public informational meeting on the technical comments on the DEIR to assist other interested parties in preparing their review comments.
- * An inventory of sensitive environmental areas impacted by roadway runoff along federally eligible roads is being prepared by SRPEDD in the Buzzards Bay region. GRRIP (Geographic Roadway Runoff Inventory Program), funded by the Executive Office of Transportation and Construction (EOTC) and the Massachusetts Highway Department (MHD).
- * SRPEDD designed and developed a regional economic development web site identifying over 100 "Priority Development Sites," including information on location, highway access, acreage and/or square footage, zoning, permitted use. rail lines, transit, airports, development incentives and contract(s).
- * SRPEDD approved \$1,437,000.00 in grants from our regional transportation allocation for six "enhancement" projects. Included were: Fall River Bike Path Phase I, construction; Wareham Bike Path Phase I, construction; Mattapoisett Bike Path, planning and design; Fairhaven Bike Path, planning and design; Seekonk Stormwater Mitigation, installation of new stormwater drains; and Buzzards Bay Stormwater Runoff Project, inventory and ranking.
- * An extensive Geographic Information System (GIS) mapping program is maintained by SRPEDD. This year new computerized "data layers" were added to the system, including local zoning and environmental data. The GIS staff is working on EOEA-funded buildout analysis for 19 communities in the district. Information provided will include zoning, wetlands, floodplains, waterbodies, land use and new subdivisions.

- * SRPEDD worked with the two regional transit authorities, GATRA and SRTA, on issues such as route evaluations, marketing, service to elderly and handicapped persons and overall data compilation and analysis. SRPEDD also continued to assist SRTA and GATRA in expanding service through the Welfare-to-Work, Access to Jobs program.
- * SRPEDD continued its affiliation with the South Eastern Economic Development (SEED) Corporation, which makes loans to small businesses for expansion. In 1999 SEED approved loans to 149 small businesses in the amount of \$26 million. These loans are projected to create 963 new jobs. SEED once again was the #1 Small Business Administration lender of SBA 504 loans in Massachusetts.
- * SRPEDD reviewed and commented on major transportation related, economic development initiatives in the region, such as: the Park at Great Woods in Norton, the Great Waves Park in Mansfield, Route 44 improvements in Raynham and Middleborough, seaport master plans in Fall River and New Bedford, the Attleboro Industrial/Business Park, and commuter rail station improvement plans in Mansfield, Attleboro and Lakeville.

In addition, municipal assistance was provided to Acushnet in the following area:

* Assistance and Training with the Town Web Site.

SRPEDD was created to serve the cities and town of southeastern Massachusetts. We are governed by elected and appointed officials from all the cities and towns. We look forward to serving you in the future.

REPORT OF THE ACUSHNET SCHOOL DEPARTMENT

I am pleased to offer this report on the state of public education in the Town of Acushnet, Massachusetts. The Public Schools of Acushnet are directed by a School Committee elected to three year overlapping terms. Your School Committee members at this time include:

Alan Miner, Chairman Manuel Goncalves, Vice Chairman Frank Kuthan Robert Lanzoni JoAnn Bertrand

Earlier this year JoAnn Bertrand became the newest member of the School Committee. She joins Bob Lanzoni, who was elected to a full three year term. Their terms of office extend through year 2002.

The last year of the 20th century was highlighted by the debate over school facilities. On two occasions the School Facilities Study Committee came before the Town with plans that were not approved. As the new century began, the Committee is once again coming before voters with a school expansion project that we all hope will result in the creation of badly needed school facility renovations and expansion.

The Acushnet Elementary School continues to offer a wealth of activities and programs for both students and the community. All of the classrooms have been wired for Internet access and networking capability. Technology is becoming more and more a part of our total educational program. Our investment in quality equipment has provided us with the best in technology for our students.

Beginning early in January, Acushnet Elementary School sponsored four "blood drives." Approximately 300 pints of blood were collected from staff and other community members. As always, AES enjoyed a partnership with the Fire and Police Departments. The DARE Program was offered to all fifth graders by the Police Department and the SAFE Program was offered to fourth graders by the Fire Department.

There was a six week "after school enrichment program" offered to all students. In this program students remain after school for an hour and a half one afternoon per week to participate in activities such as sports, theater, and arts and crafts.

The Preschool staff worked hard with the New England Association of Young People and attained national accreditation. The remainder of the staff continued to work with the New England Association of Schools and Colleges to prepare for the "self study" for the accreditation team visit which was held in October.

There were many educational field trips taken by various grades. Five grade levels visited the Zeiterion Theater, funded by the Acushnet Cultural Council PASS Grant, PTO, and school budget. The fourth grade toured the "Freedom Trail" and the first grade went on the "Make Way for Ducklings" tour in Boston. The third grades went to Plimoth Plantation. The third grades, in collaboration with the Ernestina and the Coalition for Buzzards Bay, boarded the Ernestina to learn about the environment. Approximately 60 fifth graders had an educational sleepover at the Boston Museum of Science.

There were also great presentations for children held at school. Bill Babcock, from the Taunton Weather Services, spoke with the fourth graders about weather. The Lloyd Center for Environmental Studies built a life-size Delphi whale in the gym. An excellent Beethoven impersonator, funded by the PTO, performed. The opera "Carmen" was presented by the Brown Bag Opera Company.

The entrance way was carpeted to protect children and adults from slipping on the tile floors. An additional fourth grade was added to reduce class size in that grade. Two new reading programs were adopted. Accelerated Reading is being offered at the third grade level and to some fifth and second grades. Reading Recovery was placed in the first grade to help children at risk of failing reading.

Two teachers began a pilot looping class (remaining with the same class for two years). The think tank concept was adopted in the library. The fifth graders exchanged books every other week and use the library computer bank ("Think Tank") to research short questions on the alternate week.

In an effort to promote reading, Title I staff held a "Books for Bingo" night for students and their families. The Principal offered to roller skate on the first day of school if the students collectively read 5000 books during summer vacation and chances to attempt to dunk the Assistant Principal in a dunk tank were given to any student who read twenty books between September and November.

The PTO continues to support our school in many ways. They offered a reading incentive sleepover at Acushnet Elementary School for the older students. They also offer many fun performances and activites for all families, such as the Valentine's Family Dance, Family Skate Night and Santa's Secret Workshop.

To promote a "Caring, learning community," students held a very successful can drive and *Quarters for Christmas* campaign. Students went caroling at a local nursing home and AES staff gave thousands of dollars in purchased gifts and food to needy families.

The 1999 school year at Ford Middle School saw continuation of many activities, such as trips to the Boston Aquarium, Museum of Science, Tsongas Center in Lowell and the Shakespeare Festival. Additionally, the 13-week

DARE Program continues at grade 8. The middle school faculty and staff are completing their first year working on the Middle School accreditation process.

A Welcome to Ford Day was initiated for all incoming sixth graders and new students to our school. After-school programs have been increasing for our students, and they include a fitness and nutrition program, focusing on topics of nutrition and positive behaviors, as well as an exemplary program for grade six students at Old Colony Regional Technical School.

The Ford Middle School has been the recipient of two competitive grants: a Future Teachers Club Grant and a Gifted and Talented Grant. These grants are enabling more students to become involved in a variety of different activities.

In the light of strategic planning for the future, the entire faculty is undertaking a study of the overall curriculum with particular emphasis on the relationship of curriculum issues to the high stakes state testing program known as MCAS.

Once again, this has been a very exciting and challenging year in those areas involved with special education. I'm very pleased to report that our Preschool Program has received its three year accreditation from the New England Association for the Education of Young Children.

We are also pleased to welcome an additional Speech/Language Pathologist, as well as a School Psychologist. The School Psychologist is a new position that allows us to conduct many required evaluations within the schools, as opposed to sending students to area school psychologists. Because of students with significant disabilities and issues, we have added several special education aides to our staff.

Unlike any other year, the Commonwealth of Massachusetts and its school systems are in a state of confusion regarding eligibility for special education services. The causes of this confusion are the changing laws and regulations from the Federal perspective that includes IDEA 1997 and Section 504 of the Rehabilitation Act of 1973. From the state perspective, we have had proposed changes in our own special education regulations for the past year which have not been adopted by the Board of Education. This leads to significant discussion for each student referral for special education services.

In the school year 1999-2000, there have been many important improvements made to the overall curriculum. In the spring of 1999, a new Social Studies Curriculum was approved by our School Committee and is in the early stages of being implemented. The curriculum was developed by a team of teachers representing each grade level in the district. Also, in regards to curriculum, the math team is in the process of reviewing the math curriculum. The State Frameworks in math are due to be finalized in the winter of 2000 and we are prepared to adapt to whatever changes are necessary. Finally, the Ac-

celerated Reader Program is being used by our third grade team, as well as one of our second, fifth, and sixth grade teachers. The program has shown a positive affect on reading improvement and enjoyment over its first few months. We are anxious to see the results after more time has elapsed.

Training for our staff occurred this year on November 12 and December 22. The days involved in training encompassed a wide variety of topics, such as the use of the Accelerated Reader Program, how to better use technology in the classroom, CPR, legal issues regarding education, and behavior management. Although each staff member was not able to attend each training, a wide variety was offered and positive results have been evident. Staff development is not limited to these two days. It also occurs in the form of teachers attending conferences, training on early release days, and through courses taken by staff members.

The 1999-2000 school year initiated the reorganization of two service areas within the Acushnet Public Schools; Food Service Operations and Technology Support Services.

During the last school year, an extensive review of food service operations, including the services of an outside consultant, resulted in the recommendations of several substantial changes in our operations.

Included in the recommendations were changes in staffing, cost saving measures and menu and nutrition suggestions. Linda Rogers was appointed cafeteria manager of both the elementary and middle schools. Cost saving suggestions were adopted and nutrition and menus were revised to reflect different tastes and nutritional needs between elementary and middle school-aged students. As a result, we have seen modest increases in student participation and revenue.

A second area of operation to see a reorganizational change is Technology Support Services. With close to three hundred computers and two networks in the school system, the task of training staff, maintaining equipment and resolving technical issues is substantial. To efficiently provide our school system with the appropriate level of support and to fully take advantage of our technology, a three-tier operation structure was implemented during the fall of this school year.

Technology support services are provided through a full time Technology Coordinator who oversees all technology operations. Supporting the coordinator is our maintenance staff which provides installation and trouble shooting support. Their third tier is a technology service company that provides repair and technical support as needed for our computers and networks.

An additional major economic event affecting the Acushnet Community is the conclusion of our present student transportation contract and entering a new three-year contract to begin July 1, 2000. Bid specifications were prepared and bids were received in December. Six contractors offered competitive bids. Given the bids received, we can anticipate a modest increase in transportation costs for the next three-year contract period.

The year 1999 has been another year of excitement, recognition and transition for the Acushnet Public Schools. We have enjoyed wide community support, and for this we are truly grateful. We look forward to the new millennium with visions of new and improved school facilities so that we can continue to provide the level of quality that our children and our community deserve.

Acushnet has much of which to be proud. On behalf of your schools and your School Committee, I thank the community for your caring support this past year.
