REMARKS.

We are aware it has been common in school reports to suggest the needed improvements. But our town has had "line upon line, and precept upon precept," and that little has resulted from such efforts is seen in the standing "vote not to repair our school-houses," which, with few exceptions, are in a miserable condition. We wish to call your attention to an increasing evil, which threatens our moral condition as a people, - the neglect of parents to send their children to school. What committee, unaided by their fellow-citizens, can successfully grapple with an evil so wide-spread and vast? The child and society have rights, as well as the parent. Have parents and guardians the right to withhold from their children the means of education so liberally provided? We answer, moral obligation and legal provision forbid such neglect. While education enlightens and elevates, the neglect of the same lowers and degrades, both morally and physically. There have been twelve scholars kept from one school during the Winter term from neglect of parents. The law makes it the duty of every parent or person who has children in his charge under fourteen years of age, to furnish them at least with twelve weeks of schooling during the year, six weeks of which shall be consecutive. It would be a kindness to all concerned to put these wise and beneficent laws in force by choosing a truant committee.
