A great hindrance to the advancement of pupils is irregular attendance at school. Very few realize how much is lost by an absence of a day or two in a week for weeks in succession, but its results are plainly seen in our schools. With the appropriations at the command of the School Committee, we have been enabled to continue our schools for nine months during the past year. Generally speaking, our schools have made commendable advancement. Most of them contain scholars from five years of age and upward; therefore, from the multiplicity of classes, recitations must necessarily be short, and the teacher often feels as if he could not accomplish as much as he desired; but oftentimes it occurs in such schools that pupils are made to feel more dependent upon themselves, and acquire as much knowledge as those who depend upon the assistance of the teacher to a greater degree. Many pupils, when they know the teacher has time to render considerable assistance, are very willing to depend upon that help, and therefore acquire a habit of leaning upon others, and do not put forth their own exertions as much as they ought.

Let the pupil keep in mind that upon his own exertions depends to a great extent his success, and learn to depend upon self as much as possible.

Our registers of the past year show that the schools have been visited by many of the parents and friends, and this we would encourage, as good results arise from it.

Parents, by coming in occasionally, encourage both teacher and pupils, and see for themselves how a school is

As our schoolhouses are comparatively new, but little expens has been required to deep them in repair. It is the duty of teachers to have a care of school property, but some do not give it the attention it ought to have, and injury is frequently done where it ought not to be. Our schoolrooms should be kept as neat as possible, so that children may be taught habits of neatness and order.
