Sir:

In accordance with your instructions, I have made an audit of the books and accounts of the town of Acushnet for the period from January 1, 1932, to April 5, 1933, and submit the following report thereon.

The financial transactions of the town, as recorded on the books of the several departments receiving or disbursing money for the town or committing bills for collection, were examined and compared with the records of the town treasurer and the town accountant.

The books and accounts of the town accountant were examined and checked in detail. The recorded receipts were compared with the treasurer's books and with the records of the several departments in which charges originated or money was collected, while the records of disbursements were checked with the treasury warrants and with the treasurer's records of payments. Approved vouchers and payrolls on file were examined and checked with the appropriation accounts.

The appropriations, loan orders, and transfers as recorded on the accountant's ledger were checked with the town clerk's records of town meetings and with the finance committee's records of transfers from the reserve fund.

The ledger accounts were analyzed, the necessary correcting and adjusting entries were made, a trial balance was taken off, and a balance sheet, which is appended to this report, was prepared, showing the financial condition of the town on April 5, 1933.

The books and accounts of the town treasurer were examined and checked in detail. The recorded receipts were analyzed and compared with the collections as recorded in the several departments collecting money for the town and with other sources from which money was paid into the town treasury, while the payments were checked with the selectmen's warrants authorizing the treasurer to disburse town funds.

The payments on account of debt and interest were verified by a comparison with the amounts falling due, the canceled securities being checked and the outstanding debt being listed and proved.

The savings bank books representing the investments of the trust funds in the custody of the town treasurer were examined and listed, the income being proved and transfers to the town verified.

The tax title deeds in the custody of the town treasurer were examined and listed, and the necessary adjusting entries were made to bring the accountant's ledger into agreement with the tax title list. It is recommended that the validity of the tax titles now on hand be determined, with a view toward instituting proceedings for foreclosure of rights of redemption.

The accounts of the collector of taxes were examined and checked in detail. The commitments were verified by a comparison with the warrants

issued by the board of assessors for their collection. The recorded collections were checked with the commitment books, the abatements were compared with the assessors' records of abatements granted, the payments to the treasurer were verified, and the outstanding accounts were listed and proved to the accountant's ledger.

The outstanding accounts were further verified by mailing a large number of notices to persons whose names appeared on the books as owing money to the town, the replies received thereto indicating that the accounts, as listed, are correct.

It is recommended that action be taken at once to secure settlement of the outstanding tax levies of 1924 and subsequent years if the collector is to perform his duties faithfully in accordance with the terms of his surety bond.

A discrepancy in the accounts of the former collector of taxes amounting to \$376.68 should be liquidated promptly.

The financial accounts of the town clerk were examined and checked. The receipts from dog licenses issued on behalf of the county and for sporting and trapping licenses, the proceeds of which are paid to the State, were checked with the records of licenses issued. The payments to the town, to the county, and to the Division of Fisheries and Game were verified.

The records of licenses issued by the selectmen were examined and checked, and the payments to the treasurer were verified.

The accounts of the sealer of weights and measures were examined. The recorded receipts were checked with the records of weights and measures

sealed and adjusted, and the payments to the treasurer were verified.

In addition to the departments mentioned, the available records of all other departments receiving money for the town were checked, and the payments to the treasurer were verified.

The surety bonds filed by the town officials for the faithful performance of their duties were examined and found to be in proper form.

There are appended to this report, in addition to the balance sheet, tables showing a reconciliation of the treasurer's cash, summaries of the tax, assessment, and tax title accounts, together with tables showing the condition of the various trust funds.

During the progress of the audit, co-operation was received from the various officials, for which, on behalf of my assistants and for myself, I wish to express appreciation.

REPORT OF ANIMAL INSPECTOR FOR THE TOWN OF ACUSHNET FOR 1933

To the Board of Selectmen of the Town of Acushnet:

During the year 1933, I have made 161 inspections, seven of these were to barns where cows were tested. We have eight barns in town now under State and Federal Supervision with a large number signed up for 1934.

When a herd is tested, it is necessary to make two and three trips in order to make a report to the state, so you can see by making a third more inspections than was ever made before until last year with the extra work on the State inspections, the amount reimbursed for this work which includes machine is not sufficient

I have inspected 642 cattle, 111 young cattle, 4 oxen, 60 sheep, 104 pigs, 23 bulls, and 10 goats, making a total of 954.

I also made inspections on complaint of two dogs but did not find it necessary to quarantine in either case.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF HEALTH

To the Officers and Residents of the Town of Acushnet:

The Board of Health submits the following report for the year ending December 31, 1933.

Immediately following the annual election the Board of Health met and organized as follows:

Chairman—Joel P. Bradford, M. D. Secretary—Alexander Newton.
Inspector of Licenses and Agent—Charles Dietz.

Allen E. Weeks was again appointed Inspector of Slaughtering and was duly sworn into office.

The prevalance of Diphtheria in the town for the past two or three years has been a source of worry to the Board, and early in the year at the earnest solicitation of the State Board and the cooperation of the District Health Officer, Dr. McKnight the Board started a campaign resulting in the prophylactic treatment or Schick treatment for the prevention of Diphtheria. This was given to a large percentage of children in the first four grades of school. All whose parents would consent were treated and about 350 were immunized. The last half of the year has shown marked decrease in this disease.

The fact that no cases of measles, mumps, whooping cough or chicken pox were reported during the year causes the Board to feel sure that there has been a failure to report many cases of contagion

that have occurred, and we wish now to call attention of all citizens that the penalty for not reporting the presence of a contagious disease is severe, and also ask that all suspicious cases be properly reported and thus a serious epidemic be averted. Any one of these contagious diseases are dangerous and an epidemic may result in many deaths to small children. So please co-operate with the Board better during the coming year.

The usual number of minor complaints of nuisances have been adjusted, and we wish to call attention to the illegal dumping of garbage or other organic refuse in ash or rubbish dumps. The Board has provided for the collection of all garbage in the town, and any calls to the Board will bring the collector of garbage to your door, so the illegal dumping is uncalled for, and if detected violators of the law will be dealt with less lenienty in the future. Garbage collections have been made very satisfactorily by Joseph Martin last year and we anticipate the same arrangement this year.

No dental work has been carried on in the schools this year as the Board felt it could not be afforded, but already the State has begun dental work and the Board hopes to augment such work next year.

On account of a less number of tubercular cases this year at the Bristol County Hospital, the Board ended the year with an unexpended balance of \$179.93.

REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the Acushnet School Committee and Citizens of Acushnet:

I respectfully submit my second annual report as Superintendent of the Acushnet School System.

The fiscal year 1933 has been conspicuous for the many and varied crises which confront the nation during times of hardship and depression. The School Department has experienced a year of drastic changes and reductions. Several directed votes of the Acushnet School Board have paved the way to a very efficient economy. Upon balancing the School Budget at \$47,940.00 for 1933 the School Committee found that the Acushnet tax-payers had benefited exactly \$6,360.00 over the 1932 expenditure of \$54,300.00. It is clearly seen that this figure represents a very material saving and that the School Department has contributed much in furthering the economy program which has been forced upon the Town as a whole due to the general depression.

On March 11, 1933 the School Department was voted \$43,440.00 which constituted a 20% reduction on the 1932 figure. At the first meeting of the School Board, following this action, a budget was formed in which the figures totalled \$43,440.00. At this meeting the amount allowed for High School and Junior High School tuition fees to the City of New Bedford was reduced drastically. It was hoped that the enrolment of Acushnet students in the New Bedford Schools would be held to a lower level. The

tuition rate itself could not be reduced and was destined to remain at \$150.00 per year. Instead of decreasing, the attendance increased greatly. One outstanding factor which accounted for this rise was the N. R. A. ruling that no school pupils were to work in the industrial field under the age of sixteen years. Over-crowded conditions at the New Bedford Vocational School turned many Acushnet children into High School ranks. At the close of the school year in June, 1933 it was very evident that there were insufficient funds to cover the tuition bills for the rest of the year. Consequently the School Board was forced to insert an article in the Town Warrant requesting \$4,500.00 to defray New Bedford Secondary School tuition bills. This amount was voted by the Acushnet voters at the Special Town Meeting held in August, 1933.

The School Department Budget then totalled \$47,940.00. The following paragraphs will reveal the various methods of retrenchment used by the School Board in making possible the balancing of the budget at the close of the fiscal year. Having experienced a cut of about 12% in 1932 the Acushnet school teachers were again subjected to an additional 10% reduction on March 17, 1933. In addition to this action the school year was shortened two weeks causing a 38 week attendance instead of the regular 40 weeks. In terms of percentage this meant a contribution of another 5% of the teachers' salaries bringing the total reduction in teacher wages to 27%. It is readily observed that the Teaching Staff has borne a considerable part of the cutting program. The School Bus driver, school nurse and school custodians shared in a similar manner. The amount set aside for the Superintendent of Schools was \$677.37 less than that of 1932. The duties of the Attendance

Officer were carried by the Superintendent from March 1933 to October 1933 thus affording another saving. At this time the Administration problems were such that the services of the Chief of Police of Acushnet, Mr. Henry Landreville, were secured to carry out the necessary investigation connected with the duties of an attendance officer.

The regular yearly school census was disposed with in the light of the financial condition of the Town. This action provided a saving of \$100.00. Close supervision of office expense meant a reduced item. The sums reserved for the purchase of textbooks and supplies were nearly 50% lower than in 1932. Through the vigilance and care of the School Custodians the yearly expenditure for fuel and building supplies was held to a figure which approximated half that of the previous year.. Although the School Department shared the cost of materials for C. W. A. project work on the Marie S. Howard, Parting Ways. and Long Plain Schools the repair bills for 1933 were \$239.19 less than in 1932. In making reference to C. W. A. projects I wish to state that the playground at the Marie S. Howard School has been widened thus enlarging the area on which the children play. At the Parting Ways School and the Long Plain School the interior walls and ceilings were painted and calsomined respectively. The improvement in the general appearance of the classrooms is very marked.

The cost of Health supervision in the Acushnet schools was materially decreased. The transportation expenditure involving such items as salary of School Bus driver, gasoline, oil, tires, lubrication, repairs, and Union Street Railway car tickets was less for the in-town pupils but somewhat greater for

the students attending the New Bedford Secondary schools. The outside increase was due to the added enrolment at the High School and Normandin Junior High School in New Bedford.

The New Bedford School Department was faced with a lack of funds to continue the operation of its schools to the end of the city fiscal year which ended November 30, 1933. Consequently the New Bedford schools were closed during the last two weeks in November, 1933. Although this action caused an unfortunate break in the education of the youth of New Bedford, the Acushnet School Department benefited by not having to pay for Secondary school tuition during the above-mentioned period. This situation meant much in the balancing of the School Budget for 1933. The expenditure of money for tuitions to the New Bedford School Department totalled \$11,355.17 for 1933. In 1932 this figure was \$11,633.90. It must be clearly understood that the 1933 expense covered a school attendance of 38 weeks while the 1932 cost encompassed a period of 40 weeks. Comparison reveals that the Secondary school tuition bills were but \$278.73 less this year than last in spite of the fact that the New Bedford System was closed for two weeks.

In looking to the future it is practical to assume that the New Bedford Secondary School tuitions will continue on a 40 week basis. Acting on this assumption it is evident that the cost for tuitions in 1934 will approximate \$12,000.00.

I feel that the Acushnet School Board has accomplished much in fostering a greater return for money expended in payment for Secondary education of Acushnet students attending the New Bedford schools. In my mind the following vote ren-

dered by the School Committee on May 31, 1933 is self-explanatory and bears out the above statement:—

"All Acushnet Students attending the New Bedford High School will be suspended from school for one term if found failing in two subjects, of major importance, for two successive terms. At the end of the period of suspension the student may return to school on probation. Should he again fail he will be dropped from the rolls permanently. It is understood that the cause of suspension be directly due to neglect in studies and not failure to pass. This measure is to take effect with the beginning of the Fall term in September, 1933."

The enrolment of Acushnet students at the New Bedford Vocational School was materially lessened in 1933. This circumstance was caused by the overcrowded attendance of New Bedford pupils. Many Acushnet children were unable to gain admission in the Fall of 1933 due to this fact. The expenditure under the Vocational School Budget totalled \$9,986.60 for the fiscal year 1933. The appropriation for this budget was \$10,000.00. Thus it is seen that this figure covered the expense in a satisfactory way. In November, 1932, the tuition fee per pupil was reduced from \$200.00 to \$160.00 per annum. This fact, coupled with the lowered attendance, contributed to the saving of \$3,372.81 for the Acushnet tax-payers. The Bristol County Agricultural School at Segreganset is rapidly becoming more popular with Acushnet pupils. The attendance now totals twelve students. The courses offered at this institution are of real educational value and provide a training along Agricultural lines which is proving very useful.

I feel that the Acushnet teachers are to be commended on the fine spirit with which they have met the trials of the past year. An underlying trend of indominable strength has shown itself at all times. The school efficiency has been maintained. Teacher morale, though severely tested during payless periods of considerable length, has remained intact and unimpaired. The constant diligence and practical vigilance of the Teaching Staff has been a very buoying feature in the pursuit of administrative duties. The responsibility for a considerable amount of the 1933 saving on the School Budget rests with the teachers.

In spite of the harrowing year just experienced it is with much satisfaction that I observe a raised educational standard in the Acushnet School System. It is evident in the rapidly increasing number of Honor pupils whose ranks must average above 80% before being eligible for the honor. Many Acushnet students also appear on the Honor Rolls at the Normandin Junior High School and the New Bedford High School.

It has been previously indicated that a great saving was realized on fuel and maintenance expense in the budget. This was due to the close supervision of the School Custodians who have offered their support in very admirable fashion. I wish to thank the janitors for their loyal cooperation.

Doctor Bradford and the School Nurse, Mrs. Margaret Heap, have been working very hard this year in the pursuance of their respective duties in the Health field. The consistent support and cooperation rendered by Doctor Bradford and the School Nurse has been very gratifying and I extend my appreciation of the exhaustive services given by them.

The School Bus driver, Mr. Aime Pepin, has been filling his position in admirable fashion and his consistency of cooperation has been very helpful to the School System.

The Trust Fund Commissioners have been very loyal in extending aid to the School Department in the purchase of school books. The help made possible through the kind interest of Mr. Hersom, Mr. Poyant and Mr. McCarthy has been a most material factor in strengthening the educational standards of the Acushnet Schools. I wish to thank the members of the Trust Fund Commission for their efforts in behalf of the School Department.

The Acushnet School Committee has been exceptionally helpful in the task of administrating the Acushnet School Department and has been a very material factor in fostering a true economy. This year's saving to the tax-payers will bear out my statement. In concluding my report I wish to offer my most sincere appreciation of the fine assistance, loyalty and cooperation tendered me by the Acushnet School Board and townspeople of Acushnet.

REPORT OF THE SCHOOL NURSE FOR 1933

Mr. Albert F. Ford, Superintendent of Schools, Acushnet, Massachusetts.

My dear Mr. Ford:

The close of the year 1933 finds the children of our schools in much better health as a result of school health work. Much has been accomplished through the various activities of the local and state health workers.

Perhaps the foremost of these duties is the regular physical examination semi-annually of all school children which requires several months to complete. A decided improvement was noticed in the general health of the children. Defects were fewer and mostly of a minor nature.

Although no provision was made for Dental Work this year a Dental Clinic was held for extraction of teeth and treatment of gums with Dr. Kuechler, who contributed his services a half day each week during the first five months of the year. The majority of children requiring treatment were attended to in this period.

Thirty-one children were X-rayed at the Chadwick Anti-Tuberculosis Clinic held in January and the same children examined at the clinic conducted in February. This number is five less than the previous year. "Follow up" work continues on these cases until the next annual clinic.

During May about 250 children were inoculated for the prevention of diphtheria and about 100 more in September. Children entering school for the first time were vaccinated at a clinic held in the Library early in September.

Two children were taken to the Bristol County Anti-Tuberculosis Camp at Attleboro for one month in the summer. This was made possible by the sale of Anti-Tuberculosis seals during December of the previous year. Several trips were made to the Bristol County Hospital to have tubercular suspects X-rayed.

Preliminary work for a Mental Clinic to be held in January 1934 by the State Department of Mental Hygiene called for considerable time being spent in investigating the home environment and obtaining a complete history from the parents of each child to be examined. The completed records are very essential to the doctor in the examinations. Only pupils reported to be retarded in their studies are examined at this clinic after which appropriate studies are arranged for them.

Many children of needy families were fitted with shoes and clothing brought in to the nurse for distribution from various organizations and individuals in the town.

Added to these various duties is the work of examining and attending, almost daily, to children reported by teachers to be ill or injured while at school.

May we take this opportunity of expressing our sincere appreciation for the splendid co-operation of the superintendent, teachers, and parents in accomplishing so much towards the mental and physical development of our future citizens.

One Surveyor of Lumber for 1 year.

One Surveyor of Lumber for 3 years.

One Tree Warden for 1 year.

Moderator for 1 year.

One Park Commissioner for 3 years.

One member of the Board of Health for 3 years.

- 1. Shall licenses be granted in this Town for the sale therein of all alcoholic beverages (whiskey, rum, gin, malt beverages, wines and all other alcoholic beverages)? Yes or No.
- 2. Shall licenses be granted in this Town for the sale therein of wines and malt beverages (wines, and beer, ale and all other malt beverages)? Vote Yes or No.
- 3. Shall licenses be granted in this Town for the sale therein of alcholic beverages in Taverns? Vote Yes or No.

All the above named Town Officers and Questions are to be voted for on one ballot.

For this purpose the polls will be opened at each and all of said precincts at 8 o'clock in the forenoon, and will be closed at 8 o'clock in the evening at each and all of the several precincts.

You are hereby further required and directed to notify and warn the said inhabitants of the Town of Acushnet who are qualified to vote in elections and Town affairs therein to assemble subsequently and meet in Town Meeting at the Town Hall in said Acushnet, on Saturday the tenth (10) of March next at 2 o'clock in the afternoon, then and there to act on the following subjects and business, viz:

Article 1. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for incidental expenses.

Article 2. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for Memorial Purposes.

Article 3. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for Free Public Libraries and also transfer the Bristol County Dog Fund to the Library Account.

Article 4. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for the Suppression of Moths.

Article 5. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to procure the Treasurer's Collector's and Town Clerk's bond.

Article 6. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Treasurer with the approval of the Selectmen, to hire money from time to time in anticipation of the revenue of the current year and to issue notes of the Town therefor; and the debts incured under the authority of this vote to be payable from said revenue.

Article 7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for Public Welfare expenditures. Such appropriation to include \$745.32 of 1933 unpaid bills.

Article 8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for Soldiers' and Sailors' Relief. Such appropriation to include \$38.40 of 1930 and 1931 unpaid bills.

Article 9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for the Board of Health.

Article 10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for Street Lights.

Article 11. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for the Removal of Snow.

Article 12. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for the employment of district or other nurses.

Article 13. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for the maintenance of the Town Hall.

Article 14. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for notes and interest due in 1934.

Article 15. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for the Department of Sealers of Weights and Measurers.

Article 16. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for the Reserve Fund.

Article 17. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for Park Purposes.

Article 18. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for the maintenance of Schools.

Article 19. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for Hydrant Services.

Article 20. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for the maintenance of Vocational Schools.

Article 21. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for Sewer Pumping Charges. (\$123.00).

Article 22. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of \$50.00 for the purpose of maintaining during the ensuing year, the mosquito control works as estimated and certified to by the State Reclamation Board in accordance with the provisons of Chapter 112, Acts of 1931.

Article 23. To see if the Town will vote to take care of its proportional part of the Bristol County Tuberculosis Hospital maintenance and care, and to raise and appropriate the sum of Two thousand, three hundred twenty-six dollars and seventy cents for the Towns proportional part of maintenance and care of said Hospital.

Article 24. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for the Bureau of Old Age Assistance.

Article 25. To see if the Town will vote to approve the report of the Selectmen.

Article 26. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for Highways and Bridges.

Article 27. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for the purchase of 2 new trucks for the Highway Department. (Recommended by Finance Committee.)

Article 28. To see if the Town will vote the sum of \$300.00 to be used by the Board of Health in repairing the Perry Hill Isolation Hospital which is to be used by the American Legion Post for Headquarters. (Recommended by Finance Committee).

Article 29. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of (\$.03) three cents which was paid to the Commonwealth of Massachusetts for 1931 Bank Tax.

Article 30. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Treasurer with the approval of the Selectmen, to renew any or all of the notes issued under authority of and in accordance with the provisions of Chapter 49 of the Acts of 1933 or take any action relative thereto.

Article 31. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for the maintenance of the Fire Department.

Article 32. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for the maintenance of the Police Department.

Article 33. To see if the Town will vote to determine the compensation which each town Officer will receive and make an appropriation therefor.

Article 34. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$254.00 to pay for the medical treatment of John Bettencourt for the period from November 30, 1933 to January 11, 1934 or take any other action relative thereto. (By Petition.)

Article 35. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Treasurer, with the approval of the Selectmen, to borrow money for general municipal purposes under authority of and in accordance with the provisions of Chapter 49 of the Acts of 1933, or take any action relative thereto.

And you are directed to serve this warrant by posting attested copies thereof seven days at least before the time of said meeting as directed by the Board of Selectmen.
