As directed by you, I have made an audit of the books and accounts of the town of Acushnet for the period from November 6, 1945, the date of the previous examination, to October 26, 1946, and submit the following report thereon:

The financial transactions as recorded on the books of the several departments receiving or disbursing money for the town or committing bills for collection were examined and reconciled with the books and reports in the town accountant's office and with the records of the town treasurer.

The town's ledger was analyzed, the receipts being checked with the treasurer's books, while the payments were compared with the warrants authorizing them and with the treasurer's records of payments. The appropriation accounts were checked with the town clerk's records of town proceedings and the recorded transfers from the reserve fund were verified by comparison with the records of the finance committee.

The necessary adjusting entries resulting from the audit were made, and a balance sheet, which is appended to this report, was prepared showing the financial condition of the town on October 26, 1946. An examination of this balance sheet indicates that the town is in very good financial condition.

The books and accounts of the treasurer were examined and checked. The receipts, as recorded, were analyzed and checked with the records of the several departments collecting money for the town and with other sources from which money was paid into the treasurery, while the payments were compared with the selectmens' warrants authorizing the treasurer to disburse town funds. The cash book additions were veri-

fied, and the cash balance on October 26, 1946 was proved by actual count of cash in the office and by reconciliation of the bank balance with a statement furnished by the bank of deposit.

The payments made for maturing debt and interest were compared with the amounts falling due and with the cancelled securities on file.

The savings bank books and securities representing the investment of the several trust and investment funds in the custody of the town treasurer and the board of health were examined and listed. The income and withdrawals were proved and checked with the treasurer's recorded receipts.

The records of tax titles held by the town were examined and reconciled with the tax books and with the accountant's ledger, while the redemptions were checked with the treasurer's cash book. The records of tax possessions were examined and listed, the additions as a result of tax title foreclosures being proved and the sales being compared with the treasurer's recorded receipts. Tax title and tax possession transactions were further verified by comparison with the records in the Registry of Deeds.

The books and accounts of the collector of taxes were examined and checked. The taxes outstanding at the time of the previous examination and all subsequent commitments were audited and compared with the assessors' warrants issued for their collection. The payments to the treasurer were verified, the recorded abatements were checked with the assessors' records, the taxes transferred to the tax title account were proved, and the outstanding accounts were listed and reconciled with the accountant's ledger.

The records of departmental and water accounts receivable were examined and checked in detail. The payments to the treasurer were compared with the treasurer's recorded receipts, the abatements were verified, and the outstanding accounts were listed and reconciled with the accountant's ledger.

Verification of the correctness of the outstanding tax, departmental and water accounts were obtained by mailing notices to a number of persons whose names appeared on the books as owing money to the town, the replies received thereto indicating that the outstanding accounts, as listed, are correct.

The financial records of the town clerk and of all other departments collecting money or committing bills for collection were checked with the treasurer's recorded receipts and with the accountant's ledger.

The surety bonds of the various town officials required to file them were examined and found to be in proper form.

Appended to this report, in addition to the balance sheet, are tables showing a reconciliation of the treasurer's cash, summaries of the tax, tax title, tax possession, departmental, and water accounts, as well as tables showing the condition and transactions of the trust and investment funds.

For the co-operation extended by the various town officials during the progress of the audit, I wish, on behalf of my assistants and for myself, to express appreciation.

REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS 1946

To the School Committee and Citizens of Acushnet:

I respectfully submit my fifteenth annual report.

On December 18, 1946 the School Committee met at the Parting Ways School and rendered the following unanimous votes:

- 1. Voted to request \$68,000.00 for the 1947 school budget.
- 2. Voted to request \$10,000.00 for the 1947 Vocational High School Budget.

The schools of any community are constructed by the townspeople for the express purpose of providing a free system of public education for young citizens. The School Committee is elected by the people to make such rules and regulations as, in its good judgment, are required for the proper maintenance of an effective program of education.

It is of primary importance that the best teachers available shall be secured to staff the schools. As the task of attracting and holding good teachers in any school system becomes increasingly difficult so, too, the ability to properly educate children becomes complex. The very low salaries now made available to Acushnet teachers have contributed alarmingly to a rapid turnover in the teaching staff membership.

To reveal to what extent teachers have come and gone in Acushnet may I recount specifically the more recent incidents.

Alice Doran, Bettina Sessums, Mary Driscoll and Shirley Joy left the teaching staff soon after the resignations of Rita Kerivan, Constance Quigley, Hester E. Quigley, Frances Kinniery, Blanche Rogers, Jennie Maskalenko and Anne Crosby became effective.

In December, 1946, Mrs. Beula Mecarta Lentell and Mrs. Hazel W. Thompson resigned their positions in Acushnet.

Here it is readily observed that thirteen teachers out of a total of nineteen have recently moved on into other communities.

The opportunity of the children to secure effective instruction under these circumstances has been seriously limited. It is a natural conclusion that the low rate of pay in Acushnet has been a factor in the terific loss in personnel. It has been impossible to replace all vacancies with instructors willing to become employed on a permanent basis.

An examination of the present staff shows that three teachers are currently working on a substitute basis. Frankly, insufficient funds are available with which to hire competent teach-

ers as regular members of the staff. It is very important to distinguish between regular teachers and substitute teachers. Little difficulty is had finding substitutes for comparatively short periods of time. However, it is a different matter to obtain good teachers who will remain from the start of a school year to the June closing of classes.

As to the immediate outlook for correcting this unweildly situation may I state that candidates for teaching, who will graduate from the Teachers' Colleges in June, 1947, are generally accepting a salary of \$2,000.00 per year to begin in September, 1947.

The present maximum salary for teachers in Acushnet is \$1,690 per year.

It follows rather obviously that a substantial adjustment must be made in the local salaries of teachers to meet this problem squarely.

The increase in the proposed 1947 school budget of over \$9,000.00 is for the purpose of beginning an adjustment in wages which will ultimately bring local pay levels into line with prevailing wage scales in Southeastern Massachusetts. It is vital to the children of Acushnet not only to be enabled to hire competent teachers but to retain them as well.

On October 29, 1946 the Acushnet Teachers' Association communicated with the School Committee asking for an annual increase in wages of \$500.00. All other school employees requested salary adjustments. The School Committee considered the problem carefully. It was first determined that \$72,000 would be required in 1947 to permit granting all salary adjustments in full. Feeling that long range planning would be practical in order to prevent too great an increase in the budget in any one year the School Committee voted to request \$68,000.00 for 1947. It was voted by the Committee that this sum should include a raise of \$6.00 per week effecive immediately after town meeting in March and retroactive to January 1, 1947 and \$3.00

per week additional at the start of the next school year in September, 1947 for all employees in the public schools. This vote represents a raise of \$363.00 per teacher for the calcular year 1947.

A new salary schedule was adopted for teachers which would permit the average teacher to reach a maximum of \$2,470.00 by 1950. In order to recognize preparation for teaching the Committee voted that the maximum for a holder of the Master's Degree in Education would be \$2,600.00.

A petition for a larger amount of state financial aid for the use of local public schools in the 351 cities and towns is receiving marked support. Massachusetts is near the bottom among the states in respect to reimbursements from state collected taxes. Unless much more state aid is produced, the schools will suffer a lowering of standards.

In 1946, \$7,500.00 was appropriated for Vocational High School purposes. This figure was exceeded by \$1,176.10.

The Finance Committee transferred \$700.00 from Reserve Fund, this being all remaining funds available to put toward payment of final tuition bill. Hence \$476.10 is being carried to the annual town meeting for disposition as an unpaid 1946 obligation.

Due to an increased enrollment the School Committee estimated that \$10,000.00 would be a fair estimate of the cost of this type of education in 1947.

The following sums were appropriated by the General Court as reimbursements to Acushnet for Vocational education.

Tuition	\$2,662.35

The net cost to local taxpayers for Vocational education in 1946 was \$5,243.85.

In the way of information this particular refund represents one-half the actual costs for the period ending on August 31, 1945. In practice the State Department of Education recommends the reimbursement for actual payment during the next following calendar year.

Under the provisions of Part 1, Chapter 70 of the General Laws, which provides for state reimbursement on account of the employment of teachers, \$3,650.00 was due Acushnet on 11/20/46. For the tuition in our publis schools of children in the custody of the Division of Child Guardianship, under Chapter 76, \$514.84 was credited this town. These refunds total \$4,164.84.

Hence the net cost to taxpayers for regular school purposes was \$54,535.16.

With reference to repairs \$3,178.39 was expended. This figure includes the cost of furnishing and installing a new Mills Boiler and Condensation pump at the Marie S. Howard School for \$2,345.00. Project was completed by Lyman and Baker, Heating Contractors. Bill for advertising for bids was \$20.80. Total cost of this project came to \$2,365.80. On all other repair work \$812.59 was expended. It is noteworthy that the School Committee turned back to the town \$135.90 even though this money could have been used advantageously. Actually the Finance Committee had proposed that \$2,500.00 be allocated to the boiler installation with the understanding that if a balance remained it would be returned as an unexpended balance. The School Committee acted in good faith with the Finance

Committee and returned \$134.20 plus \$1.70 which was the true balance remaining in appropriated funds which the School Committee considered available for regular expenses.

Ceilings were scraped and whitened in all schools except the Mason W. Burt School. Much inside painting was completed. Repairs were made in the toilets at the Howard and Burt Schools. The flag pole at the Burt School was painted.

The wornout boiler-room ceiling at the Howard School was removed and metal laths were installed. New ceiling in two coats was applied and whitened. Most of the labor was provided by the school janitors who worked after regular hours and on Sundays to complete these projects.

All buldings remain in need of extensive repairs. Window sash and frames are deteriorating. Gutters need replacing. Outside surfaces should be painted. The longer one delays in this work the greater the cost when repairs are completed.

The Trust Fund Commission approved bills for the purchase of school books in sum of \$106.77. Payment is made from available interest accruing in the Russell Public School Fund.

Three unusual situations arose with respect to the distribution of pupils among the grades in all schools. For the first time in seventeen years an extremely over-crowded eighth grade developed at the Parting Ways School. Several pupils were transferred to the eighth grade at the Marie S. Howard School. To make room for this transfer all seventh graders in the Howard School district were enrolled at the Parting Ways School and assigned to the seventh grades. A classroom accommodating only eighth graders at the Howard School resulted. Excellent co-operation was had among parents.

The enrollment in the lower grades at the Parting Ways School was very large. The dividing line between the Mason W. Burt School district and the Parting Ways School district was re-defined. Over twenty children were transferred to the

Burt School and transportation was provided. A more equal distribution resulted. Parents were very helpful in this emergency.

A boy was found residing very near the Acushnet, Freetown line on Keene Road. It was impractical to try to operate school bus over this road both because of limited time and extreme wear and tear on equipment. School Committee contacted Freetown school officials who said they would be pleased to enroll the boy at the Mason's Corner School in Freetown and bill Acushnet for tuition. In this manner the situation was satisfactorily handled. In the event, however, that more children of school age reside on Keene Road it may be necessary to send the school bus for them.

To conclude this report, I am appreciative of the friendliness of the School Committee and townspeople. May I pay my respects to all the employees in the public schools. The only consideration that remains of vital importance as we enter 1947 is the welfare of the children of Acushnet.

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REPORT OF MEDICAL DEPARTMENT OF SCHOOLS

In making this brief report of the work of Physician and Nurse of the School Department, we are proud to call attention to the fact that we are now over twenty years without a case of diptheria in the town, and that since our first immunization efforts, no cause of diptheria has developed in the town. Suspicious cases have been reported but bacteriological examinations have failed to comfirm such a report.

Conditions resultant upon world conditions have seriously interfered with the efficiency of medical school work as the co-operation of parents busy with industrial and war work result in increased neglect of children's health. Inability to obtain dental co-operation, results in unhealthy and diseased condition leading to nose and throat infections and the spread of disease.

These conditions are nationwide and have focussed the attention of the public upon the fact that our school work is circumscribed to a point that is deplorable, in that we find threatening physical conditions and are still not able to remedy them. We are hoping that in the near future we may be able to increase our school budget so that we may be able to add physical culture and corrective gymnastics to our school work and correct postural deficiences.

Both School Nurse and Physician unite in requesting an increased interest of parents in the physical conditions and good health of their children. We thank school officials, teachers and parents for their co-operation and solicit its increased continuation.

To the Officers and Residents of the Town of Acushnet.

The Board of Health respectfully submits the following report for the year 1946.

Immediately after the election and the re-elected member having been duly sworn in, a meeting was called and the Board organized as follows:

Chairman Joel P. Bradford, M.D. Secrtary Louise F. Taber Agent and Inspec. of Licenses, Clement St. Amand, Jr.

Mr. Allen E. Weeks was appointed Inspector of Slaughtering, which appointment was confirmed by the State Department.

Meetings have been held the second Tuesday of each month at which time routine business was transacted together with all complaints.

We have been very fortunate in having no serious outbreaks of contagious diseases and for the last three months of the year no tubercular patients in the Bristol Tuberculosis Hospital in Attleboro which has relieved us the expense incident to these.

The garbage question is the same and in time will require a different set up but at present we are still able to cover the work at a minimum. The matter of dumps and rubbish continues to cause no end of trouble as residents think that rubbish comes under the Board of Health.

All new dwellings have septic tanks installed for sewerage disposal and the system is still sufficient.

Few complaints have been received regarding the keeping of swine and fewer cellars have been flooded than usual. The following contagious diseases and deaths have been recorded for the year.

On Monday the Third (3), next, A.D. 1947 (it being the first Monday in March) at 11 o'clock in the forenoon then and there to bring in to the Precinct Officers of their respective precincts their votes on one ballot for the following Town Officers and questions, to wit:

One Selectman and member of the Board of Public Welfare for three years.

One Assessor for three years.

One School Committeeman for three years.

One Member of the Board of Health for three years.

One Trust Fund Commissioner for three years.

One Trustee of Free Public Library for three years.

One Member of the Cemetery Board for three years.

One Surveyor of Lumber for three years.

One Surveyor of Lumber for two years, to fill vacancy.

One Surveyor of Lumber for one year, to fill vacancy.

One Tree Warden for one year.

One Moderator for one year.

One Park Commissioner for three years.

All the above mentioned Town Officers are to be voted for on one ballot.

For this purpose the polls will be opened at each and all said precincts at 11 o'clock in the forenoon and will close at 8 o'clock in the evening at each and all of the several precincts.

You are hereby further required and directed to notify and warn the said inhabitants of the Town of Acushnet aforesaid who are qualified to vote in Elections and Town affairs therein to assemble subsequently and meet in Town Meeting at the Town Hall in said Acushnet, on Saturday, the Eighth (8) day of March next at 2 o'clock in the afternoon, then and there to act on the following subjects and business, viz:

INSTALLATION OF WATER MAINS IN NEW DEVELOPMENTS OR SUBDIVISIONS

The Board of Water Commissioners may from time to time, on such conditions as may be determined by the Board, receive from prospective developers of lands in the Town, respectively, sums of money sufficient, in the opinion of the Board to cover the estimated expense to the Town, as certified by the Planning Board or such part thereof as is to be incurred by the Town, of constructing water mains with all appurtenances necessary or proper in private ways approved by the Planning Board under the provisions of General Laws (Ter.Ed.) Chapter 41, as amended by St. 1936, C 211, or as otherwise amended, such sums to be paid to the Town Treasurer to the credit of the Town, each sum to be held as a special fund marked with the name of the depositor and the way or ways to which the same is applicable, and subject to retention and appropriation by the Town for the purpose of reimbursing the Town for moneys expended in constructing water mains and appurtenances in the respective ways designated for the respective funds and for the return to the depositor of any unexpended balance as certified by the Board of Water Commissioners after completion of such water mains and appurtenances. If such deposit of estimated expense in any case is not sufficient for the work, the developer shall make deposit of a sufficient additional amount.

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Article 35. Recommend \$100.00.

This By-Law shall be additional to and not in limitation of the powers otherwise vested in said Board of Water Commissioners.

- A. The Board of Water Commissioners shall upon notification by the Planning Board, determine specifications for and estimated costs of complete installation of all mains, pipes, gates, valves, hydrants and all other appurtenances and connections to existing mains together with service connections to the property line of each lot, as shown on a plan of a development or subdivision submitted to the Board of Water Commissioners and approved by the Planning Board.
- B. Applications for installation of water mains shall include all streets in the subdivision and must extend to the limits of the development and include connections with existing mains in boundary streets and service connections to lots shown on the aforesaid plan.
- C. Applications for the installation of water mains, as aforesaid, in new developments or subdivisions shall be in writing, signed by the owner of the lands included therein, and shall be accompanied by
 - 1. The plan of the development or subdivision showing the proposed installation approved by the Planning Board.
 - 2. A certificate of the Planning Board that all necessary bonds have been filed.
 - 3. Releases signed by the owners, mortgagees and all other persons having interests in the lands releasing the Town of Acushnet from any and all claims and damages incurred or to be incurred in the takings necessary for the installation of the mains and appurtenances and connections to adjoining properties and of and from all liability for things done or failed to be done in such installation and the owner shall covenant and agree to hold harm-

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- less the Town of Acushnet and the Board of Water Commissioners from claims of all persons having interests in the land whether or not named in the releases.
- One copy of the estimate certified by the Planning Board of the estimated expense to the Town of installing the water mains and appurtenances and connections therewith.
- A certified check, payable to the Town of Acushnet, in the amount of such estimated expense to be deposited with the Town Treasurer and said sum to be held by the Town under the provisions of the By-Laws above quoted.
- D. After acceptance and approval by the Board of Water Commissioners of applications so filed and accompanied, the Town will make the necessary takings for the installation of the water mains and appurtenances at such time as shall be determined by the Board of Water Commissioners.
- E. Water and sewer pipes shall not be installed in same trench.
- F. All materials are to be furnished and work done by the Water Department at the expense of the developers except that developers may, at their own expense, dig and prepare the trench or trenches and may fill the same, all under the supervision of the Water Department, and in accordance with the specifications as to location, size, and depth and other details thereof determined by the Board of Water Commissioners. If a developer shall elect so to prepare and fill such trench or trenches, the amount of the deposit hereinbefore referred to shall be reduced in an amount to be determined by the Board of Water Commissioners.
- G. After laying is made, as aforesaid, pipes shall be covered by hand at least two feet deep and no stones larger than four inches in diameter shall be placed in any part of the trench.

- H. All mains, pipes, gates, valves, hydrants, service connection and service and appurtenances shall be and remain the property of the Town of Acushnet.
- I. If the deposit made under the provisions of paragraph C-5 shall not be sufficient for the expense of completing the installation, the owner shall agree to make a further deposit of the amount necessary to complete the same.
- J. Upon completion of the work of installation, the Board of Commissioners will authorize repayment to the owner of any balance over and above the expense to the Town of Acushnet, as determined by the Board of Water Commissioners, then remaining in the account referred to in paragraph C-5.
- K. It is to be understood and agreed that neither the acceptance and approval of an application or receipt of a deposit, nor any other thing done by the Board of Water Commissioners shall be or constitute, a contract on the part of the Town of Acushnet or of the Board of Water Commissioners; that the method of installation and the materials to be used therein and the time when the installation is to be made shall be solely in and according to the discretion of the Board of Water Commissioners; that neither the Town of Acushnet nor the Board of Water Commissioners, nor their respective servants or agents, shall be liable at law or in equity for anything done or failed to be done in connection with the installation or other things done or in connection with the proceedings hereinbefore set forth; and that the sole right of the owner and other persons signing the application or the release shall be to have returned to the owner, and to no other person or corporation, any balance of money remaining in the possession of the Town of Acushnet after the completion of the installation, as provided in clause J.

Article 38. To see if the Town will vote to accept a By-Law as follows:

INSTALLATION OF WATER MAINS IN STREETS AND WAYS NOT COVERED BY PREVIOUS BY-LAW

The Board of Water Commissioners may install water mains and connections in streets and ways not included in the provisions of the Previous By-Law.

- A. Applications for installation shall be in writing accompanied by an agreement guaranteeing annual payments amounting to at least 6% per annum of the cost of the installation, for a period of not less than six years. Such agreement shall be accompanied by a satisfactory bond, or by a cash deposit amounting to a sum sufficient to guarantee annual payments for a period determined by the Water Commissioners. Payments under the agreement shall be made at such time as the Water Commissioners may determine, at which times the amount to be credited for water taken shall be computed. If the payment for water does not meet the required 6% per annum the balance will be taken from the deposited fund or bonding company. Any balance left in the deposited amount after the required period will be refunded to the original signers of the agreement. The Water Commissioners reserve the right not to make installations of main line pipes, if they deem it for the best interest of the Town not to do so, or if the funds available for such purposes are insufficient.
- B. If such installations are contemplated by the Board of Water Commissioners in private ways or over private property, there shall be furnished to the Board releases signed by the owners, mortgagees and all other persons having interests in the lands releasing the Town of Acushnet from any and all claims and damages incurred or to be incurred in the takings necessary for the installation of the mains and appurtenances and connections to adjoining properties and of and from all lia-

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bility for things done or failed to be done in such installation and the owner shall covenant and agree to hold harmless the Town of Acushnet and the Board of Water Commissioners from claims of all persons having interests in the land whether or not named in the releases.

OPERATING OF HYDRANTS AND OTHER APPURTENANCES.

No person, except firemen, at fires, shall open, operate or tamper with any fire hydrant directly connected to the Town system of mains, whether on public or private property, without the permission in writing of the Water Department. No person, without similar permission shall open, close or operate any valve or stop attached to the Water Department system of mains or service pipes except those on private property placed at meters for the convenience of Water Takers.

RATES.

All persons taking water shall pay for the same in accordance with the rates currently effective, which rates will be fixed from time to time by the Water Commissioners. Copies of the rates in effect may be secured at the office of the Water Department.

AMENDMENT OF THE REGULATIONS.

The Water Commissioners reserve the right to change these Regulations and to make such additional Regulations as may from time to time be deemed necessary.

And you are directed to serve this warrant by posting attested copies thereof (7) days at least before the time of said meeting as directed by the Board of Selectmen.

Hereof fail not and make return of this warrant with your doings thereon at the time and place of said meeting.
