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

REPORT OF THE SELECTMEN

To the Citizens of Acushnet:

We submit herewith our report for the year ending December 31, 1962.

At the initial meeting following the Town Elections, the Board met for the purpose of organization. At this meeting Gerard Charest was elected chairman of the board and Wilfred Fortin was appointed clerk and secretary of the board.

The Board met every Monday night, as in the past, at 7:00 P.M. in their offices at the Town Hall to hear petitioners and to administer the variety of duties connected with this office.

In our ever continuing endeavor to cope with the increasing problems attending the rapid and expansive growth of our community, the Board quite frequently found it necessary to meet on other week day nights.

The annual audit of the Town was conducted and as in the past, again maintaining her very enviable position of being in fine financial condition, entering the new year with free cash in the approximate amount of \$81,000. This accomplishment can be directly attributed to the close supervision of Departmental Budgets, fine co-operation of the Finance Committee, and the excellent record of fiscal control by our Treasurer and Collector as well as an outstanding job of record keeping by our new Town Accountant, Mr. Fortin, in his junior year.

The Town as in the past, again made full utilization of Chapter 90 Maintenance monies made available by the State and County, extending areas resurfaced on North Main Street a considerable distance.

Chapter 90 Construction funds have brought to reality the reconstruction of Middle Road as well as the installation of storm drains and catchers which has alleviated a very serious water problem in this area. 1963 will continue to show improvements along these lines.

Installation of curbings and sidewalks on Crompton Street under the Betterment Provisions of the General Laws, construction and dedication of the new Post Office, surface maintenance of old streets, drains in Laura Keene and Dorothy Streets, additional and improved lighting, are just a few projects of note. Various other accomplishments and improvements too numerous to be mentioned could here be noted; however, the Board in concluding this, its annual report, wish to thank each and every resident of the Town of Acushnet for the effort, support and encouragement which they have given to the Board in trying to

achieve our mutual ends: "Better Town Government."

The Board acknowledges also, the co-operation and assistance of the various town departments. It is indeed gratifying to see so many dedicated peoples working towards our common goal.

REPORT OF PARK COMMISSIONERS

To the Officers and Townspeople of Acushnet:

The annual report of the Board of Park Commissioners, together with reports on youth activities, and the playgrounds under the control of the Board, is herewith presented in accordance with provisions of law, for the fiscal year ending December 31, 1962.

The Board held 16 regular meetings and 4 special meetings during the year. We organized in March for the ensuing year, elected August R. Cote as its chairman, and welcomed its newest member, Edwin W. Church.

Bids for a fence to enclose the Little League ball field were advertised for, and was awarded to the low bidder, who was the Atomic Fence Corp., of Fall River, \$720.00. Other bidders were Ornamental Iron Works, New Bedford, \$863.00; Century Fence Co., Fall River, \$1,000.00, and New Bedford Wire and Iron Works, New Bedford, \$1,041.00. Bids were also put out for the materials needed to construct two new concrete dugouts for the Little League. Contract was awarded to low bidder, Buildings Materials, New Bedford, \$274.00.

Thanks to the ingenuity of the man at the park this year, Mr. Henry Martin, the two old wooden dugouts which were removed to make room for the new ones, were put to good use. He used one of them, after reinforcing it, for a much needed storage shed. The other dugout was disassembled and the lumber was used to make three bicycle parking racks, and for supports for the two baskets and backboards which were set up on an unused portion of the oiled surface of Addy

Drive. These baskets are portable and can be removed during the summer. These were put up at no cost to the taxpayers.

The Midget Football League has two new, much needed, goal posts, made of 4" steel tubing, and these are also portable. The old wooden goal posts were also put to good use. They are the posts holding up the two new baskets. Also, several new signs, directing people to our newly enlarged picnic area, were made at no cost to the town.

We had an unexpected large repair bill for our tractor-lawnmower, but in spite of this, we were able to stay within our budget.

As usual, demands for use of the ball diamonds were heavy. Leagues using our fields at one time or another were: Little League, Pony League, Colt League, CYO, Junior High, and Twi-Light League. We feel quite proud of the fact that our ball fields are rapidly becoming the favorites of the different leagues in this area, and we are constantly hearing praise from managers and players alike, on how they compare with diamonds in the bigger cities. We are continuing to improve the diamonds, at a minimum of expense to the town. As a result of some forward thinking, the Board has devised a way to change the size of the ball diamonds, in the matter of minutes, to accommodate the different leagues, thus saving the taxpayers additional expense.

The pieces of Kiddy equipment, at the park, which were donated by the Lion's Club last year, were found to be in much increased use this year. We feel this is because of the growing population in town, and the fact that more people know that the facilities are there. We feel that these reasons warrant increasing the games and facilities at Kiddy-Land, as well as all other activities at the park. Having a greater

variety of games at the park, such as baseball, football, basketball, volleyball, softball, tennis, horseshoes, badminton, handball, band concerts, and other organized events, there would be something at the park for everyone, young and old. Adding these things, plus a sprinkler pool for the kiddies, and many other events for townspeople to attend. We feel that all this can be accomplished without increasing our budget.

As a demonstration of co-operation between departments in the town government, the Park Dept. has been cutting the grass, and maintaining the grounds at the Memorial at Parting Ways. In turn, the Selectmen are to have the Street Dept. clear away the brush along Addy Drive, which has long been an evesore.

Any suggestions which you may have concerning the improvement of your park, will be carefully considered by the Board, as well as appreciated.

In conclusion, we wish to extend our appreciation to those of you who used the facilities at the park in the past year. And to those of you who don't see *much* of your park, we invite, and urge, you to come out and enjoy yourselves. Physical activities will make you feel younger, and add enjoyment to your life.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF HEALTH

To the Officers and the Residents of the Town of Acushnet:

The Board of Health respectfully submits the following report for the year 1962:

Immediately following the election the newly elected member, Emile R. Houle, was sworn into office by the Town Clerk. At the first regular meeting the Board organized as follows:

Chairman—Sylvano Frates Secretary—Emile R. Houle Agent and Inspector of Licenses—Joseph H. Lepage

During the last year no tuberculosis patients required hospitalization at the Bristol County Tuberculosis Hospital. This hospital was closed as of December 31, 1962 for the care of Tuberculosis patients and all patients will be sent to Norfolk County Hospital. Six premature births were reported to the board and one case received financial assistance for the amount of \$108.00. The amount of \$276.00 was reimbursed the City of New Bedford for care given a case with an Acushnet settlement.

Dental Clinic was conducted throughout the school year with 24 clinics held. A total charge of \$1,516.00 for the clinics with \$348.75 credited for payment by the children, leaving the net cost to the Board of Health of \$1,167.25. There were 74 examinations; 267 fillings; 68 extractions; 2 X-rays; 62 prophylasis; and 108 treatments.

During December 1962 the Board of Health and the Bristol County Health Association sponsored a Heaf Testing Program for all school children. A total of 1150 children took advantage of the program, and of this amount there were 18 children who had a positive reaction. All positive reactors and their families will be asked to come in for a chest X-ray when the Mobile X-ray unit is in Town.

Oral polio vaccine (Sabin) was offered to all children 3 months of age to 7 years, and 1264 doses of Oral Vaccine were given. This was Type I and III of the Oral Vaccine. In the coming year we plan to offer Oral Polio Vaccine to all children through the age of 18 years.

Well Baby Clinic was held monthly on the first Wednesday of each month September through June. A total of 274 children attended clinic. Flu immunization clinics were held with a total of 680 doses of flu vaccine given.

A total of 20 were issued Food Handler's Certificates, and 23 Burial Permits were issued and recorded in 1962.

A total of 36 applications for Septic Tank Permits were received and 34 permits were issued. New regulations adopted by the Board of Health in November 1962 require a percolation test by a Registered Professional Engineer prior to the issuing of any Septic Tank Permit. The above regulations were published in the Standard Times in November 1962.

REPORT OF THE SCHOOL PHYSICIAN AND NURSE

Acushnet, Massachusetts January 30, 1963

To the Members of the School Committee, The Superintendent, Teachers, and Residents of the Town of Acushnet:

We respectfully submit for your consideration our report of data concerning our activities during the year 1962.

School health examinations were conducted on all children who entered the first grade. Physical examinations were also given to all students in Grades 4, 6 and 9; and to all aspirants for the Baseball and Basketball teams. 426 physical examinations were completed, which revealed the following conditions:

Notices were sent to 128 parents, and 103 referrals were completed.

The Massachusetts Vision Examination was given to 1183

children, of which 72 had vision defects. Parents were notified, and 53 of these children underwent corrective treatment.

The Massachusetts Pure-Tone Audiometer Test for Hearing was given to 1112 children. 47 children had hearing defects; parents were notified, and 41 of these underwent corrective treatment.

With the help of the Bristol County Health Association, the Heaf Test for Tuberculosis was offered to all children attending school in Acushnet in December. A total of 1150 children were tested and 18 had positive reactions. All positive reactors and their families will be notified and asked to have chest X-rays when the Mobile X-ray Unit is in town.

At the Clinic which is held in Russell Memorial Library at 2 P.M. on the first Wednesday of each month, we:

- a. Attended to 274 children.
- b. Gave 87 Vaccinations against Smallpox.
- c. Inoculated 100 children against Diphtheria, Pertussis, and Tetanus.
- d. Inoculated 337 individuals with Salk Vaccine for Anterior Poliomyelitis (Infantile Paralysis).

During May and June, Clinics were held for an Oral Polio Program, offering the Sabin Oral Vaccine for Type I and Type III Anterior Poliomyelitis (Infantile Paralysis) to all children from age 3 months to 7 years. A total of 1264 children underwent this immunization. During 1963, we believe we will be able to offer this program to all children through 18 years of age.

This year, we were again able to offer an immunization program against "Flu", and inoculations of Influenza Virus Vaccine were given to 680 persons.

Thus, we have given a brief outline of the essential data concerning our accomplishments during the past year. It has been a pleasant duty, and we feel satisfied that we have done much in the interest of better community health.

It has been a great satisfaction and pleasure to have had the able assistance of Mrs. Lois Pinchbeck, R.N. and are very sorry that she is forced to resign due to the pressures of her home and household duties.

We enjoyed immensely the comradeship and co-operation of the Students, the Parents, the School Committee, the Superintendent and Teachers, and Co-workers, and especially to the Board of Health whose financial backing has made some of these immunization programs possible.

REPORT OF THE PLANNING BOARD

To the Citizens of Acushnet:

As chairman of your Planning Board, I have the honor of submitting this Board's report for the fiscal year 1962.

It is appropriate at this time to review the calendar of events for the past year.

The first scheduled meeting after the Town Meeting and Elections was an organizational meeting at which the election of officers was undertaken. Conrad Richard was appointed chairman and Edward Hall clerk. A work agenda was also established at this date in order to insure maximum efficiency at forthcoming meetings.

The first item of this agenda facing the new Board was that of preparing a Master Plan for the Town. It is well to mention at this time that Commonwealth Statute directs that a Planning Board established under Chapter 41 G.L., Section 81A, is required under Section 81D to prepare a Master Plan. Since a Master Plan is in a sense a master blueprint containing specifications for both long and short range development of community facilities, its preparation is predominantly technical and professional in nature.

Town Meeting appropriation of \$3,000 combined with \$9,000 of available Federal funds (upon application and/or approval of) then made it possible for the Planning Board to

consider the hiring of professional consulting planners to aid us in the preparation of our Master Plan.

Weekly meetings were then substituted for the regular semimonthly meetings during April, May, and June. The above period of time was devoted initially to the interviewing of representatives of qualified consulting firms and secondly with a review of the merits of their individual proposals for carrying out such a Master Plan Study.

After a careful evaluation of all the consultants, the Board went on record as unanimously selecting the firm of Atwood & Blackwell, Consultant Planners of Boston.

At this time, we submitted our formal application to the Planning Division, Department of Commerce, Commonwealth of Massachusetts, which is the vehicle for such contracts under the Federal Area Redevelopment Administration. As of this writing, official certification of the application is still pending but its approval is expected shortly.

The balance of our schedule has been largely devoted to the preparation of Sub-Division Regulations. These regulations, while lengthy and somewhat complex, have been resolved to a large extent and to the general satisfaction of the entire Board. A public hearing on December 19, 1962, produced a somewhat disappointing attendance; however, spirited discussion of several points by interested parties are being evaluated and a compromise that will benefit the community as a whole will be reached prior to the adoption of these regulations. Official adoption by the Board will be shortcoming.

Several plans of proposed subdivisions were examined and processed by the Board. The major portion of the plans submitted were plans whose existence had been previously established or that did not require Planning Board approval.

In closing, it is anticipated that the bulk of the work on the Master Plan Study will be carried out in the coming year, and its results will establish courses of action that can be adopted and thereby making it possible to achieve the objectives of efficient municipal operations.

SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT — 1962

The annual report submitted here is the thirty-first in a consecutive series released by the writer.

The School Committee held twenty-four meetings at the Acushnet Junior High School during the year. On March 6, 1962 the School Board organized for the year with Leo T. Jackson as Chairman.

After many years of creditable teaching service in the Acushnet public schools, Mrs. Elva S. Gurney, retired on January 15, 1962. Her last days of teaching were completed in grade six at the Parting Ways School.

Effective September 5, 1962 the following teachers were elected and assigned to the Parting Ways School:

Mr. C. Roger Johnson of Mattapoisett, grade six Mrs. Esther J. Livesley of Fairhaven, grade five Miss Marian L. Poisson of Acushnet, grade three

In a re-organization of classes in the Parting Ways School Mis Muriel Barnes was assigned to teach grade four. Underlying factors contributing to the necessity of changing the distribution of pupils in the Parting Ways School are stressed here. Enrollment pressures throughout the town in grades three and four made it impractical to house all these school children at the Long Plain School, the Marie S. Howard School, and the Mason W. Burt School. To accommodate an overflow registration in grades three and four, two classes at

these levels were set up in the Parting Ways School beginning on September 5, 1962.

At the present time there are no spare rooms remaining at the Parting Ways School or in any other local public school. Being fully aware of these limitations and noting a gradual upturn in enrollments at all grade levels, the Board sponsored the following article to appear on the warrant for a Special Town Meeting held July 26, 1962:

Article 14—To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Moderator to appoint a five man School Building Committee, one of whom shall be a member of the Acushnet School Committee, and to empower said selected School Building Committee to act as follows:

- 1. To explore the need for new school construction.
- 2. To make specific recommendations to the Town concerning land taking, if any, and new school plant housing, and further, to raise, appropriate and transfer from available funds in the treasury, a sum of money for the expenses of said School Building Committee; or take any other action relative thereto.

This article received an affirmative vote and the Moderator forthwith appointed Walter E. Owen, Walter Witkos, Jr., Leo T. Jackson of the School Committee, Harold E. Harding, and Roger W. Gaudreau to serve as the members of the newly created School Building Committee. This group has been busily engaged in research which will ultimately produce a specific recommendation with respect to the need for more classrooms.

A study of the Age and Grade Distribution chart, which is a part of this report, will reveal the basis for concern in the matter of providing adequate school housing for the children of Acushnet. At each grade level where the total enrollment exceeds ninety pupils, there are pressures for four classrooms. At present there are four third grades and four fourth grades. Two years hence these pupils will be assembled in the Parting Ways School as four fifth grades and four sixth grades. Upon completion of the sixth grade in June of 1965, how will these pupils be absorbed in three seventh grade rooms at the Junior High School?

Securing an answer to this question is one phase of the housing problem. A practical solution suggests expansion of the Junior High School facility.

With no classrooms available for the assignment of additional enrollees in any of the four elementary schools, what will happen in the near future if the first grade registration exceeds one hundred pupils? Seeking an answer to this question is another facet of the problem.

Is it possible to effect a change in grade organization to permit of one construction project to encompass the need for classroom space at elementary as well as secondary levels? Research now being conducted by the School Building Committee may provide a specific recommendation in this direction. As a gradual growth in school population becomes factual, it is clear that additional new school facilities must be made available.

For the most part repairs to the several school buildings were routine in nature. One notable exception was the removal of the belfry and bell at the Parting Ways School. Deterioration had set in and a hazard persisted. The bell and its hangar were installed in concrete near the flagpole and were preserved for posterity.

Extensive interior repairs to walls and ceilings were completed in the Parting Ways School. An auxiliary heating unit was installed in the basement. Additional hot water facilities were installed.

The exterior walls and trim at the Long Plain School were painted and the roof cupola was repaired. Adjustments were made in the automatic heating equipment. Interior walls and ceilings were plastered and painted.

A considerable washout was experienced on the school site at the Howard School. Temporary fill was provided here. Much blacktopping is needed to prevent similar damage in the future. Much interior painting was completed in the Howard School. Corrections were made in direct radiation units and in lines providing hot water services.

New classroom wall panels were installed in the grade three room at the Burt School. A new exterior door was furnished and installed in the fourth grade classroom.

Wear and tear was experienced in the operation of numerable automatic devices in the Acushnet Junior High School. These findings were normal, particularly in the third year of operation. Several key replacements were made on an as needed basis. The functioning of automatic equipment requires a constant surveillance.

Site development and repairs as well as extensive replacement of outside trim among several schools will occupy the attention of the School Committee in 1963. Fireproof materials, to be installed on the basement floor timbers in the Parting Ways School, have been requested by the State Building Inspector.

It has been gratifying to note the increased use of the gymnasium and the assembly hall facility in the Junior High School by local community groups. As of this writing, the gymnasium is being used four nights in each school week.

In a similar vain, it is noteworthy that the Junior High School facility is being utilized for voting purposes in precinct three. The Board of Selectmen, with the approval of the School Committee, has designated the Junior High School as a Civilian Defense Shelter to be used in public emergencies.

The number of Special Class enrollees, currently tuition pupils in the Lincoln School in New Bedford, has increased so sharply that the State Department of Education will insist that accommodations for these people be provided in the Junior High School. Plans are being made to seek out a qualified instructor and to organize a Special Class in the Acushnet Junior High School in September, 1963.

The story in the Junior High School cafeteria is one of a continuing high participation in the school lunch program. During the school year ending in June, 1962 the total of meals served reached 41,150. Gross receipts were tallied at \$17,426.69. The opening cash balance in September, 1962 was \$1,869.51 with an inventory on hand valued at \$218.45.

The efforts of teaching and non-teaching personnel to contribute to a wholesome and productive classroom atmosphere are recognized and appreciated.

Community growth is a key factor which, in itself, is descriptive of current trends in Acushnet. Many more families are moving into this town. To the extent that more people seek out municipal services in Acushnet, pressures will remain for

augmented public facilities. The membership of the Acushnet School Committee is keenly aware of the impact of growth in the local public schools. This growth manifests itself in an increased teaching staff and an enlarged pupil-teacher ratio. The challenge of shaping administrative policy to fit an ever changing set of circumstances is being squarely faced by the Acushnet School Committee.

REPORT OF TRUSTEES OF RUSSELL MEMORIAL LIBRARY

To the Officers and Townspeople of Acushnet:

Another library year has come to a close, and another major repair work completed. Water seepage was noticed along one wall of the main library room. This, naturally, necessitated immediate attention. Finding the offending area in a slate roof was another matter. However, it was located and the work completed. Gutter work and replacement of missing slates were part of the already proposed 1962 repairs. Before the year ended, we found that all the valleys as well as the flashing around the chimney needed replacement. Since so much had already been done to the roof, the Board of Trustees felt this work should be completed if at all possible. With this in mind, the Finance Committee was asked for a \$500 transfer for repairs. The work on the roof then proceeded, and once again we have a sound roof which should last for many years.

During the year, the librarian continued to add to our reference library volumes for which our junior and high school students had need. This is a continuing process, and one that cannot be neglected. Each year the major portion of our book and periodical allowance goes into these volumes.

The art exhibit in observance of Massachusetts Art Week (the last full week in May) sponsored by the Board of Trustees was a huge success, and it is our intention to continue this educational and cultural exhibit yearly. In conjunction with

the weeklong exhibit, Open House was held at the Library. This gives our townspeople a chance to visit and ask questions of our library staff. It also gives people from other communities opportunity to see what we in Acushnet are doing, and a chance for the exchange of ideas.

The monthly one-man shows of painting in various media were continued throughout the year. These continue to be popular with both adults and young people, and for that reason, we hope to be able to keep this project going for a long time. These exhibits may be viewed during library hours only.

The Story Hour was again the highlight of the summer months, and this year slides and lectures pertaining to the subjects read were added to the delight of the youngsters. Our library staff deserves credit for taking on this added library-connected feature on their own outside of regular library hours.

Book certificates for reading were again awarded during the year. A new service was instituted — the placement of books in the classrooms of any teachers making such a request of the librarian.

We continue to supplement our own books by making use of the Bookmobile service as much as possible. During the past year over 6,500 books were borrowed from the Bookmobile for our townspeople's pleasure and education.

Again we wish to thank those who donated books and periodicals to our library. Since our book and periodical budget is not overly large, all such donations are welcome.

Many years ago when transportation was a problem, a small branch library was established at 1243 Main Street for the benefit of those residing in the north end of the town, with Mrs. Lydia Tripp in charge. For many years, the Trustees felt this service was not too essential as the original problem of transportation no longer existed. However, because Mrs. Tripp was nearing the retirement age of seventy, no action was contemplated during that time. Mrs. Tripp became seventy during 1962, and the Trustees felt that some action should be taken at this time. It was voted to close the branch at Long Plain as of December 31, 1962, and the few active borrowers notified and transferred to the main library. Much thought was given this action, and the Board feels that at some time in the future, another branch may become essential if the expanding growth of the town continues. When that time comes, the problem will be taken up, and a type of library service keyed to the prevailing demands will be instituted. We have expressed the townspeople's thanks to Mrs. Tripp for her many years of service.

During 1963, it is our hope to continue our program of repair and replacement. Our card index file is greatly outmoded — it is the one from the old Town Hall library — and we expect to replace it with a modern, efficient unit. We again will continue to gear our book purchases to the greatest good, and stress service to our townspeople — both adult and juvenile. It is your library — it is to your advantage to use its services.

Library hours are: Tuesdays, Thursdays, and Saturdays from 2:00 to 5:00 P.M., Thursday evenings from 6:00 to 8:00 P.M.

TOWN OF ACUSHNET

Incorporated 1860

Acushnet, on the inlet of Buzzards Bay, was settled about 1659, and incorporated as a town in 1860. The name was derived from the Indians, meaning "A Bathing Place."

The village of Acushnet was destroyed during the King Phillip's War. In September 1776, another historic battle occurred between the Minutemen and British Troops at the present bridge on Main Street.

The influence of many groups of immigrants living here in Acushnet is evident in the local cuisine. In addition to the fishcakes, hastt puddings, pumpkin pies of the Yankee influence, there are breads and salads of the French Canadiens, and thick cabbage soup of the Polish.

Two well know personages came from Acushnet, William Bradford, of the Marine painter, and Clement Nye Swift, painter of Briton subjects, were both natives of Acushnet. Here can also be found impressive structures such as the Methodist Episcopal Church on Main Street. It is of ivy-colored field stone with a slender, shingled spire, surrounded by a guilded dolphin.

Located three miles from New Bedford, Acushnet now has a population of 6,100

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
