## REPORT OF BOARD OF SELECTMEN

To the Citizens of Acushnet:

We submit herewith, our report for the year ending December 31, 1964.

At the initial meeting of the Board following the Town Meeting, re-organization took place. At this time, by majority vote, Elton A. Ashley was elected Chairman of the Board and Wilfred C. Fortin was reappointed clerk for 1964.

The Board, as in past years, met every Monday evening at 7:00 P.M. in their office in the Town Hall. Here they heard petitioners and carried out the various duties connected with their office. In addition, as in the past, it was quite frequently found necessary to meet on other evenings to take care of special considerations and requirements.

1964 saw the completion of the work of the School Building Committee which was assigned the task of gathering information and generally overseeing the building of an addition to the new Junior High School. A special town meeting during the year, voted to accept the final plans submitted by this committee, and further authorized the borrowing of necessary funds for this project. Although we are not anxious to increase our bonded indebtedness, the need without question is positive.

1964 financially was one that saw minor problems related to spending; however, the results of closing of the financial records for the year were disappointing in that they reflect only \$55,000.00 in free cash for use in holding the tax rate down for the fiscal year 1965. This would indicate that we should tighten our belts for this coming year as money will definitely be harder to come by.

The Board of Selectmen, this year as in the past several years, continued most special projects that are either reoccurring or are continuations of projects started and handled annually on a projected basis. Student Government Day which has been held each year since 1960, was again held this year, and we trust that those youngsters that were able to participate enjoyed it and learned something from it.

This year also saw the installation of curbings and sidewalks in the Ludlow Street area under the betterment act, and the resurfacing of the street itself. This we are sure you will agree, is a substantial improvement to what we had there previously. In conjunction with this project, it is planned to continue the installation of curbings on Darling Street, and also to regrade and resurface this street.

Contracts for the continued reconstruction of Middle Road have been let, and construction on the third portion of this road will begin just as soon as the weather breaks. Funds voted at the annual meeting last year for a survey of the Acushnet River and adjacent areas, are being utilized and a progress report of this study is included in this report.

Work is being done on sewerage and water projects, under two separate engineering firms and the fruits of our efforts in this regard are certain to become a reality very shortly, certainly during the year 1965. Robert Charles Associates are handling the Sewerage Project and Whitman and Howard the Water Project. Reports will be made to the citizenry as frequently as we can, that we may keep the public constantly advised on these very important problems.

Much other work and projects too numerous to mention here, could be noted. However, in view of the limitations of this report, the Board would like to acknowledge the cooperation and assistance of the various Town Offices and Boards. It is indeed continuingly encouraging to see that we are certainly achieving our mutual goal, "BETTER TOWN GOV-ERNMENT".

It is gratifying to report that 1964 marked the 19th consecutive year in which the books were cleared of all taxes by December 31st, and also to feel that the response of all the taxpayers to the efforts of this department is most co-operative. Such performance reflects a most healthy attitude toward the collection programming which, in turn, instills within the taxpayer a greater sense of participation in local government.

It is vitally important that this policy continue to keep pace with expanding essential municipal services. Collectively and harmoniously much can be accomplished. A healthy attitude and diligent application is mandatory.

#### SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT — 1964

The annual report submitted herewith is the thirty-third in a consecutive series released by the writer.

Beginning on January 13, 1964 and ending on December 21, 1964 the Acushnet School Committee conducted nineteen meetings in the Junior High School.

Benjamin Briggs, Jr. was welcomed to membership on March 7, 1964.

Robert E. Honohan was elected Chairman of the School Committee for the ensuing year.

A forward step was taken by the inhabitants of Acushnet when they voted on October 6, 1964 to finance a new addition at the Acushnet Junior High School and to make available the sum of \$258,991.00 for the purpose. The State Emergency Finance Board voted on November 4, 1964 to approve a borrowing by the Town of Acushnet in the sum of \$240,000.

In good time and on December 1, 1964 the bonds were issued for a period of twenty years. In competitive bidding the Shawmut National Bank of Boston was successful in sponsoring the issue at rate 3.25%.

G. W. Carpenter, Inc., of Fall River, successful general contractor for the construction work at \$215,856.00 is making good progress at the time of this writing. All things being equal, it is contemplated that this project will be completed by the end of June, 1965 and in ample time for its original occupancy at the start of school classes in September, 1965. The firm of I. T. Almy Associates, Architects of Fall River, is supervising the construction work and is doing admirably well.

The Massachusetts School Building Assistance Commission, 88 Broad Street, Boston will reimburse the town of Acushnet 46.24% of the final approved cost of this project during a period of twenty years. The initial payment will be due in December, 1965 and should be in the amount of \$5,964.96. The assigned project number in this instance is 1,312.

The local School Building Committee will invite bids on suitable equipment for this new school addition at such time as it appears that instruction spaces will be sufficiently completed to accept shipments.

#### Impact of New Distribution of Pupils in September, 1965

With the anticipated readiness of new instruction areas next September, there will be several pupil assignment changes in both the elementary schools and in the Junior High School. As the children of many parents will be involved here, the following pattern of new organization is stressed:

- 1. All sixth grade pupils will be assigned to the new Junior High School addition and share the unit with all seventh graders.
- 2. A new Special Class will be taught in the new wing.
- 3. The first floor at the Parting Ways School will accommodate grades one through four.
- 4. The second floor at the Parting Ways School will be used to teach all fifth graders.
- 5. The Burt School, the Howard School, the Long Plain School will continue to house single grades one through four.

6. All eighth and ninth grade students will occupy the original classrooms in the Junior High School.

Three additional instructors will be added to the teaching staff bringing the total from 33 to 36. Several sixth grade teachers at the Parting Ways School will be transferred to the new wing at the Junior High School. Two of the new teachers will instruct pupils in the lower grades to be set up in the Parting Ways School. The remaining new teacher will augment the departmental instruction staff at the Junior High School.

Several pupils residing in the Parting Ways School area and attending grades one through four at the Burt, Howard, and Long Plain Schools will be assigned to the Parting Ways School where they can easily walk to and from their classes.

Research will evolve the extent to which school busses can be re-assigned to the task of moving greater numbers to the Junior High School and fewer numbers to the four elementary schools.

#### Financial Statement — 1964

There have been far reaching and profound changes in reporting budget expenditures for a calendar year as well as for a Commonwealth year which begins on July 1st and ends on June 30th. Information required by the State Department of Education centers upon the function as well as the program area. Each series of expenditures is identified with a specific number which becomes part and parcel of an overall educational data processing system. It is for this reason that it becomes vital to provide a sum of money for school support and thus afford the School Committee its proper prerogatives under the law.

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Estimated receipts have a special significance because they have a net impact upon the tax levy in any given year. To the extent that the Commonwealth reimburses a segment of the cost of various educational pursuits, to that same extent the actual cost to taxpayers is reduced. Legislation in this area changes from time to time. The most recent action at state level produced Chapter 660 of the Acts of 1963 which will ultimately prove of some benefit in Acushnet during the calendar year 1966. Two key changes pointing to 1966 are set out here:

1. The equalized valuation in Acushnet will rise from \$3,751,180 to \$7,910,000.

2. The specific aid per pupil will rise in the formula from \$130 to \$169.

Look for benefits in the distribution of income taxes to increase from \$67,900 to \$84,800 during the year to end December 31, 1966.

I look for no great change in assistance at State Level until new taxes are devised, the collection of which will produce an additional \$50,000,000 to be distributed to the towns and cities of the Commonwealth.

Much inside painting was completed in all schools during 1964. A considerable effort was made to renew the paint surfaces on the outside trim at the Junior High School. Several window shades were renewed in the Long Plain and Parting Ways Schools. Among the larger repair projects, new gutters and drains were installed at the Marie S. Howard School. Blacktopping and seeding were completed at the Howard School with a noteworthy site improvement resulting at the south side of the school. A new dividing curtain was furnished and installed upon an overhead track in the gymnasium at the Junior High School.

The passing of Miss Susie J. Davis, former teaching principal at the Marie S. Howard School, on August 31, 1964 was noted with regret by the School Committee. In testimonial to Miss Davis' many years of exemplary service to the youth of this community, the School Committee voted to name the assembly hall in the Marie S. Howard School the Susie J. Davis Auditorium. A suitable plaque will be placed in the hall to the memory of Miss Davis.

The consistent efforts of teaching and non-teaching personnel are recognized here. There is no substitute for porductive competence in any given area of endeavor. The School Committee membership continues to carry an ever increasing responsibility in the field of educational administration.

Most of the enrollees at the Acushnet Junior High School are taking advantage of the lunch room facilities. During the school year ending in June, 1964 the number of meals served reached 43,958. Gross receipts were tallied at \$19,101.04. The opening cash balance in September, 1964 was \$2,110.69. Inventory at start of classes in September was valued at \$372.55.

## REPORT OF THE TRUSTEES OF RUSSELL MEMORIAL LIBRARY

To the Officers and Townspeople of Acushnet:

Another year of library service to the community has elapsed, and we, the Trustees and Library Staff, feel we have gone forward in better and more extensive services to the town. We had a change in personnel in late spring, but, fortunately, we found excellent replacements. Service, therefore, was not interrupted, and everyone adjusted smoothly to the change.

The Trustees are happy to report that the restoration of one of the very large Clement Swift paintings was completed during the year. The other was so extensively damaged by rusty water while in storage, that a major restoration job must be done. We hope to get it finished during 1965 — this is a time consuming and painstaking operation. We are fortunate in having an Acushnet resident capable of doing this, and willing to do it at a fraction of the normal cost as a service to the community.

Massachusetts Art Week was again successfully observed the last full week in May. Again we discovered new talent in town, and inspired others to begin the exciting hobby of painting and crafts. Due to contemplated repair work, no one-man shows were held during the year, but we continued exhibiting art work from the town schools, This was expanded to include some of the younger children's display of hobbies and handcraft. We are quite proud of the work displayed by our future citizens, and hope it will serve as a stepping stone to more and more uncovering of talents.

Please bear in mind that all are hereby extended an invitation to visit the Lower Hall of the library during Massachusetts Art Week, which in 1965 will be held from May 23 through May 30.

The ever-popular Story Hour was the highlight of the summer vacation period, and the staff augmented these with motion pictures — educational and comic. The program of book certificate awards for reading continues to be an integral part of library service.

Due to the efforts of the Librarian, we have finally arranged for the district bookmobile librarian to visit the Junior High School so that children unable to visit the main library may obtain books. This is very encouraging.

Of course, while we spend as much of our small budget for new books as deemed advisable, the amount is still far from what should be spent. This in part is minimized by the generosity of Acushnet residents who either donate or loan needed books and periodicals, and out of town residents who have also been kind to us. We manage to keep the number of volumes over 10,000 in spite of discarding. Could we afford replacements, many more would be set aside, but for the time being we try to hold the line of little increase in our yearly budget.

On the equipment side, we replaced very worn junior and senior wooden folding chairs with modern all steel folding chairs. We also continued our program on the modernization of the building. This phase will not be completed until the middle of 1965, but at least it is on the way. The worn out doors will be replaced by aluminum and glass entrances, and the main room and stack room of the library will receive a new paint job. The Trustees are most grateful for the Maintenance Trust Fund interest which has grown large enough to take care of most of this work. This means, of course, we were able to keep our demands on tax money for operational expenses for 1965 in line with that of 1964.

All in all, it has been a good year, and we all look forward to an even better 1965.

Please remember your library is there to serve you, but can only do so if you come and ask for this service. As usual library hours are: Tuesdays, Thursdays, and Saturdays from 2:00 to 5:00 P.M., and Thursday evenings from 6:00 to 8:00 P.M.

# REPORT OF THE SCHOOL PHYSICIAN AND NURSE

Acushnet, Massachusetts January 30, 1965

To the Members of the School Committee, The Superintendents, Teachers, and the Residents of the Town of Acushnet:

We (the School Physician and Nurse) respectfully submit for your consideration a factual report of data concerning our work during the year 1964.

School health examinations were conducted on all children who entered the first grade; physical examinations were also given to students in Grades 4, 6 and 9, and to all aspirants for the Baseball and Basketball teams. 149 children were examined with parents present; 446 children were examined separately. Of 595 children who completed physical examinations, the following conditions were revealed:

Dental defects	128

Notices were sent to 131 families concerning correctable defects, with the result that 101 of these referrals completed medical corrective care.

The Massachusetts Vision Examination was given during the months of November and December to 1225 pupils. 94 pupils failed the test and notices were sent to their parents of this, and medical care recommended.

The Massachusetts Pure-Tone Audiometer Test for Hearing was given to 1178 pupils during the months of February and March and April. 154 of these pupils found to be questionable were given individual repeat tests, and 44 pupils found to have persistent hearing defects were given parental notification with the result that 41 sought further medical care by their physicians.

Under the sponsorship of our Board of Health and the Bristol County Health Association, the Heaf Test for Tuberculosis was performed on 379 pupils who had not been tested previously. 2 new positive reactors were found; follow-up included X-rays of their families; all found to be negative; but one child placed on a preventative medical regime.

Pre-school registrations were conducted for children prior to entering school with excellent response and co-operation of the parents. We wish to state that we are very grateful to have the co-operation of these parents who are concerned for their children's progress.

At the Clinic which is held in Russell Memorial Library at 2 P.M. on the first Wednesday of each month, we—

- a. Gave 481 doses of Oral Vaccine for protection against Anterior Poliomyelitis (Infantile Paralysis). 51 Type I; 164 Type II; 196 Type III; 70 Trivalent.
- b. Inoculated 179 people with Influenza Vaccine.
- c. Gave 81 Smallpox Vaccinations.

- d. 97 inoculations against Diphtheria and Tetanus.
- e. 92 booster inoculations against Diphtheria, Pertussis and Tetanus.
- f. 42 children completed the series of 3 injections for immunization against Diphtheria, Pertussis and Tetanus.
- g. 2 adults completed the series of 3 injections for immunization against Diphtheria and Tetanus.

This, in brief is an outline of some essential data concerning our activities during the past year; activities which we have found to be pleasant and enjoyable. It gives us great satisfaction to feel that we have accomplished something worthwhile. We are pleased to have, and greatly appreciate the co-operation and help given by the individuals and various groups within our growing community. We appreciate and thank the Russell Memorial Library Association for the use of the Library, for the excellent maintenance of the building (painting, cleaning, new door, new chairs, etc.).

Our thanks to Mrs. Jeanne O'Leary, R.N.; Mrs. May Collins; and Mrs. Aurore Gonneville for their help at the Clinic; and to the local Girl Scout and Brownie Troops for their donations to a needy family, and for their help at the Clinic.

Our appreciation for the comradeship and co-operation of the Students, their Parents, the School Committee, the Superintendent and Teachers, our co-workers, and to our Board of Health whose financial aid has helped to make some of our programs possible.

# REPORT OF THE BOARD OF HEALTH FOR 1964

To the Officers and the Residents of the Town of Acushnet:

The Board of Health respectfully submits the following report for the year 1964:

Immediately following the election the newly elected member, Joseph H. Lepage, was sworn into office by the Town Clerk. At the first regular meeting the Board organized as follows:

Chairman: Mr. Sylvano Frates Secretary: Mr. Emile R. Houle Agent and Inspector of Licenses: Mr. Joseph H. LePage

During the past year we had one patient at the Norfolk County Hospital. This patient was discharged July 17, 1964 and is under home care at the present time. There were a total of ten premature births reported in 1964 and one of these was aided and there was one premature death.

A total of 49 deaths were reported in the Town of Acushnet for this period.

Dental Clinics were held during the School year with 18 clinics being held. A total charge of \$1,499.00 for these clinics with \$341.00 credited for payment by the children and the balance of \$1,158.00 being paid by the Board of Health.

There were 55 examinations; 157 treatments; 10 treatment fillings; 193 fillings; 3 porcelain fillings; 23 extractions; 2 X-rays and 58 prophylasis. 367 visits were made to the clinic and 74 children were completed and 60 new children seen.

The Bristol County Health Association and the Acushnet Board of Health sponsored a Heaf Testing Program for a control group. A total of 379 children were tested and only two new positive reactors were found. Children and family contacts on both of these reactors have been X-rayed and one child has been placed on medication.

The Board of Health has sponsored monthly Well Baby and immunization clinics. These are held the first Wednesday of each month 2-4 P.M. at the Russell Memorial Library. At this time we would like to thank the Trustees of the Russell Memorial Library for the use of the rooms for Clinic and tell them how much we appreciate the improvements that they have recently made to the building. At these clinics the following immunizations were completed:

Report to the Townspeople of Acushnet:

The Park Board held their first meeting of the year on March 23, 1964, and elected, unanimously, Edwin W. Church, Jr., as its chairman, and August R. Cote as its secretary. The Board welcomed in its new member, Herbert E. Dunham.

The past year was a banner year, as far as activities were concerned. The Colt League held their playoff games here, as well as their regular games. Midget football was introduced to night football games here for the first time. As everyone probably knows, the Acushnet Youth Athletic Association sponsored the Eastern Division playoffs for the Junior Pony League, and they were held under the lights here at Pope Park. It was quite a thrill to see so many people come to our town and witness baseball played under conditions that are almost of Major League standards. It certainly was an exciting weekend of activities, with the parade and all. The board takes its hat off to the persons who worked so hard to make this event such a success.

As usual, the ball diamonds were in big demand. But, what gave us an extra feeling of satisfaction, is the way everyone has made use of the kiddy-land situated near the front of the park. The persons using this playground far exceeded our expectations. In order to make it more comfortable for the mothers who are watching their children at play, we are going to install tables and benches for them, and these will be shaded from the sun. For those children who use our spray wading pool, there are dressing rooms next to the pool for their convenience. This pool is absolutely safe, as there is no accumulation of water. And also, the pool, as well as the entire playground, is fenced in for safety. The Board strongly recommends this type of cooling off for the smaller tots, since the water that is sprayed around the pool, enters a drain as soon as it falls into the pool. This safety factor should make the pool preferable over a beach.

The board would like to clarify its position on a matter that has caused some misunderstanding with some people. From time to time, some town organization requests use of, or part of, the Park, so that it may hold a time or some kind of activity associated with the outfit. They sometimes have an admission charge to these events. Since this not a public affair, sponsored by the town, it does not entitle a taxpayer to get in free, merely on the fact that the event is being held at the Park. Because of a lack of available space in the center of town where some of the events might be held, the Board feels that it is performing a civic duty by letting town organizations use the facilities of the park for a day or so. These people have been doing a fair job of cleaning up after they leave, and putting things back much like they found them. If anyone at all would have the need for the Park for a day, all they need do is contact a member of the Board, and set a date for meeting with the Board. It would be about the same procedure as if someone wanted to use the town hall. We will not let anyone use the Park if it would interfere with any normal scheduled activity or function of the Park.

Again this year, as in the past few years, it has cost the taxpayers hundreds of tax dollars to repair what vandals have done to property at the park.

In closing, we would like to mention that we have worked diligently to keep the annual budget at previous years' levels, in spite of the increased activities at the park. We would also like to extend an invitation to each and everyone of you to avail yourselves of the facilities at the Park, and we always appreciate any suggestions you might have to improve your park.

# REPORT OF ACUSHNET CONSERVATION COMMISSION

Acushnet, Massachusetts January 25, 1964

To the Officers and Residents of the Town of Acushnet:

The Conservation Commission respectfully submits the following report for the year 1964:

The Conservation Commission met monthly during the year and several special meetings were held with other Town agencies. An organizational meeting was held in May, and Mr. Peter Murphy was elected the Commission Chairman.

Following the annual Town Meeting, the Commission set up a Conservation Fund, in accordance with the Massachusetts Conservation Fund Act, Chapter 40, Section 5. This makes possible the accumulation from year to year of unspent money, giving the town the means to build up a fund for future needs, conservation-wise.

A fish ladder was installed at the Acushnet Saw Mill damsite to allow passage of herring from salt water to the fresh water spawning grounds in the headwaters of the Acushnet River. In conjunction with this activity the Commission was instrumental in having the State Division of Fisheries stock the headwaters with several loads of herring, thus assuring a renewal of the normal spawning cycle.

We are presently engaged in the indexing and study of all open areas within the town, and other areas we feel might serve the future needs of conservation.

The members would gladly meet with anyone interested in making land available for conservation use, and welcomes any suggestions from those interested in conserving the natural resources of our town for future generations.

### TOWN OF ACUSHNET

Incorporated 1860

Acushnet, on the inlet of Buzzards Bay, was settled about 1659, and incorporated as a town in 1860. The name was derived from the Indians, meaning "A Bathing Place."

The village of Acushnet was destroyed during the King Phillip's War. In September 1776, another historic battle occurred between the Minutemen and British Troops at the present bridge on Main Street.

The influence of many groups of immigrants living here in Acushnet is evident in the local cuisine. In addition to the fishcakes, hastt puddings, pumpkin pies of the Yankee influence, there are breads and salads of the French Canadiens, and thick cabbage soup of the Polish.

Two well know personages came from Acushnet, William Bradford, of the Marine painter, and Clement Nye Swift, painter of Briton subjects, wcre both natives of Acushnet. Here can also be found impressive structures such as the Methodist Episcopal Church on Main Street. It is of ivy-colored field stone with a slender, shingled spire, surrounded by a guilded dolphin.

Located three miles from New Bedford, Acushnet now has a population of 6,570

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
