REPORT OF THE BOARD OF SELECTMEN

To the Citizens of Acushnet:

We submit herewith, our report for the year ending December 31, 1965.

At the initial meeting of the board following the Annual Town Elections, re-organization took place. At this time, by unanimous assent, Gerard Charest was elected Chairman of the Board and Wilfred C. Fortin clerk for 1965.

The Board as in the past, met every Monday night at 7:00 P.M. in their offices at the Town Hall. Here they heard weekly reports of the Department heads and petitioners from throughout the Town. In addition to these weekly meetings, it was often necessary to meet on other evenings during the year to attend to special considerations and requirements.

The past several years in Acushnet, have been marked with much progress and many accomplishments. However, the year 1965 was particularly fruitful in these areas. These accomplishments are by no means attributal to the Board of Selectmen alone, but rather to an aroused citizenry, interested in the progress and general well-being of the Town.

We were fortunate to see the completion of the

Acushnet Junior High School and the beginning of its use. We were, however, grieved at the passing of School Superintendent, Albert F. Ford, a man that gave constantly of himself, that the Acushnet School system would measure up to the best in the state, insofar as Educational Institutions are concerned. The Board in unity, are in complete agreement with the proposal put forth, that will change the name of the Junior High School to The Albert F. Ford Junior High School. A more fitting and deserving tribute could not be had.

The St. Francis Xavier Church Parish and Parishioners were indeed cognizant too of the need for improvements and expansions in their school system. The result here, saw the construction of an entirely new Educational plant, that is indeed a credit to the Town and to the people that are responsible for its being. Our hats are off to Father Pepin and all the people that worked so hard in this project.

Financially, the Town faired quite well by comparison with last year and expects to certify with the Division of Accounts some \$83,000.00 in free cash. This means that certainly, the Town will be in a better condition when it comes to holding the Tax

Line.

Many projects and work are planned for the year 1966. However, we would indeed be remiss if we didn't take the time to point out just a sampling of the accomplishments of the year 1965, insofar as progress is concerned. Last year's report mentioned the several projects that had gotten off the ground. We will here, attempt to outline the progress that has been effected in these projects, and the work that we contemplate

doing in this year, 1966. Last year the following projects were listed, and below are the status of these projects to date:

- 1. Survey and Development of Marina at the Town Dump Location. The study in this project has been completed. The report that has been submitted by the Raleigh Associates is an excellent one, comprehensive in every respect. Applications will be made early in 1966, to the Public Access Board and to the Division of Waterways for completion of this project, as recommended by this report. An Article in this year's Annual Town Meeting Warrant, seeks funds for the necessary land takings, a prerequisite of this development project.
- Survey of and Preliminary Study Plans of an Accepted Sewerage Collection and Disposal Plant. Preliminary Plans for the above project are completed, and will be reported at the Annual Town Meeting this year. We were able through the application filed with the Home Housing Finance Agency, to acquire \$38,000.00 from the Federal Government for this study. Robert Charles Associates, a young and growing Engineering Consulting Firm, have handled this project since inception and have done a remarkable job in guiding the Town through the initial stages of this project. Articles in this year's Town Meeting Warrant will ask the Town to accept preliminary plans to authorize the Selectmen to apply to the Federal Government for Construction Funds and to proceed with final plans.

As you can readily see, much progress has been made, and it is our hope that we will be able to get approximately 90% Federal Funds on our Construction

of this Sewerage and Storm Drain system.

3. Survey of and Preliminary Study Plans for the Establishment of Our Independent Water Supply and Expansion of the Present System of Water Mains. Necessary applications have been made with the Home Housing Finance Agency. Funds for planning have been granted by the Federal Government to the tune of \$25,000.00. Progress on this project, now being handled by the Engineering Consulting Firm of Whitman and Howard, has not materialized as well as the sewerage study. However, we are hopeful that this project too will bear fruit during the year 1966.

This year has also seen the continued work along the lines of highway construction, particularly in the Middle Road project. In addition to this, the reconstruction and resurfacing of Darling Street has now been completed, as well as the continued surfacing of sidewalks in Main Street.

1965 as stated before has been a year of accomplishment and the bearing of fruit to many of the efforts of many people. At this time the Board of Selectmen would like to acknowledge the cooperation and assistance of the Various Town Offices and Boards. We would like too, to recognize the efforts of Rep. William Q. McLean, who has been active in many of our project developments. It is indeed encouraging to see that we are continuing to achieve our mutual goal, "BETTER TOWN GOVERNMENT".

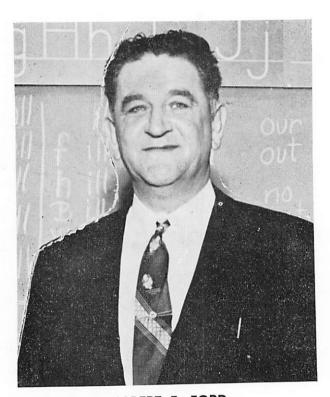

REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

The Acushnet School Committee, Mr. Benjamin T. Briggs, Jr., Chairman, Mr. Robert Honohan and Mr. Norman LaBelle, has met twenty-six times during the past year, beginning on January 4, 1965 and ending on December 27, 1965.

This school committee, a part-time, elected, non-compensated body, has given a great deal of time to the solution of problems, the making of policy and the setting up of a budget. Together and with the help of the professional staff, they worked diligently to provide a fine school system that takes into account the financial limitations of the community. The need for additional state revenue to help in the area of school finance, which consumes more than 50% of your tax dollar, is very realistic. Massachusetts currently ranks close to fiftieth in amounts of reimbursement to local communities for local public school support. Therefore, the professional staff and the school committee work constantly to provide the best education possible, while at the same time remains cognizant of the financial structure of the community.

The School Committee and the superintendent wish to express their sincere appreciation to the Acushnet School Building Committee for its contribution of nine additional, well-equipped classrooms at the Acushnet Junior High School. These new rooms currently house grades six and seven and also provide an area for the special education program of the Acushnet Schools. The Building Committee has done an excellent job of equipping these educational facilities with the

finest and newest materials available, in order to provide a sound and basic educational program for the students. The art room and the audio-visual equipment, together with the industrial arts programs have been greatly enhanced by this committee. Cost of the project was estimated at \$258,991.00 and of this total 46.2% will be reimbursed to the town by the School Building Assistance Commission. To date the committee has expended approximately \$216,568.00 for construction; \$13,708.00 for the architect; \$19,010.00 for equipment; and \$2,000 for site development and contingencies. This project should be completed in early spring and will be opened at this time for public inspection.

It is important to note that the school system now has four classrooms for expansion and that if the current rate of population growth continues, we will be faced with building additional educational facilities within the next five years.

Pupil Distribution for 1966

At this writing there seems no need for any drastic alterations in the grade and pupil distribution in the elementary or junior high school arrangement. To review the current distribution as follows:

- 1. All sixth, seventh, eighth, and ninth grades are housed in the Acushnet Junior High School, along with the special education facilities.
- 2. All fifth grades will be housed in the Parting Ways School on the second floor.
- Grades one through four will be housed in the Mason Burt, Marie S. Howard, Long Plain and the first floor of the Parting Ways Schools.
- 4. All high school students will continue to attend both public and private, academic and vocational schools, in the New Bedford area.

As the school population increases, so too does the need for additional staff members and classroom facilities. With this thought in mind, the School Committee has added four instructors and moved the sixth grade to the junior high school. The mobility of the population and the building of new homes at a rapid rate, may lead the committee to add an additional instructor this year out of necessity. It is interesting to note the pupil-teacher ratio in town is currently 31:1.

Curriculum Developments

The emphasis in the 1965 and again in the 1966 school budget will be on strengthening our basic curriculum. Purchases have been made, in the area of basic reference materials, for all schools in the form of dictionaries, encyclopedias, maps and globes. Along the same lines of updating the resources of the teacher, is the purchase of television sets, overhead projectors and some new science equipment. The emphasis in 1966 will be in coordinating the textbooks of the various elementary schools and keeping abreast, as in the past, with the new developments at the junior and senior high school levels.

Each child that we encounter, in our school and classroom situations, is an individual and must be treated as one. Therefore, generalities and the like cannot and should not be our guide. In order to understand, help and encourage these children to peak achievement, we must know them better. We will initiate a system of cumulative records and testing for all school children, as well as observe their progress and define their problems, if they exist. As mentioned previously in this report, the teacher-pupil ratio is 31:1. It is important that the approximate figure of 30:1 be maintained, so as to allow for the inclusion of individual differences in our young people. The schools of today have a holding power of about 95% compared

with the 40% of twenty years ago. Therefore, the classes are larger and the problems more diverse.

The committee has agreed to participate in the Federal Funded Programs on a matching basis. This grant by the Federal Government will aid us in purchasing of new, modern teaching aids to further our goals of more individual academic success. The basic areas covered by this grant are English, mathematics, history and science. The Funds received will cover 50% of the purchase made under this program.

Elementary Education:

The elementary program will be bolstered by the coordination of the basic textbooks selected after a careful study by committees of elementary instructors. After this work is completed, work will begin on development of curriculum guides and coordinated time schedules. Currently, students in grades one, two, three have been and are being introduced to modern mathematics and new improved reading phonics courses. The administration and staff are keeping abreast of current inovations in teaching and learning methods and will evaluate these for our adoption on the basis of our findings. The use of the newly purchased audio-visual aids further aids in the presentation of new, exciting learning materials.

Secondary Education:

The secondary program is closely tied to the New Bedford secondary school system. Our tenth, eleventh and twelfth grade students attend New Bedford High School. Ninth grade teachers, of the Acushnet Junior High School, attend departmental meetings of the New Bedford School System, so as to make the transition of our students more compatible. Currently the junior high school program offers courses in modern mathematics in grades 6, 7, 8 and 9. English is offered six

periods per week rather than the traditional five periods. This is done to help correct some weaknesses or to stimulate the better student to higher achievement. The French program has been strengthened so as to include a basic audio-lingual approach to the language. This subject area is now offered in grade 7 through 9. The addition of Art and Mechanical Drawing, as ninth grade electives, has helped to increase the basic area of knowledge necessary for these students to choose their future vocations wisely.

Two new science rooms have helped us to offer a more experimental approach to the junior high school students. The social studies curriculum has been strengthened with the purchase of new maps and globes and three tract textbooks.

Challenge of the Future

While attempting to solve some of our problems, other problems still exist and new problems will appear. One of the most pressing is in the area of school libraries. This is a very important part of the total school picture. The many experiences of books and research will continue to influence the learner, long after he leaves school. The basic text used in the classroom cannot possibly hold the knowledge needed for today's specialization. To try to correct this situation immediately, would be financially impossible. Therefore, to compensate, in part, for the lack of a library program, we have established classroom reference areas, purchased some paperback books for students use and the State Bookmobile visits every five weeks. This does not compensate, however, for the educational benefits that would be derived from the school library, as it should be. The School Committee has recognized this problem and will begin to pursue its solution on a yearly basis.

Another area of concern is the need for a remedial reading

and mathematics specialist to work with small groups of individual students who have problems in these basic areas of knowledge. These are not dull or unintelligent pupils but children who have developed problems in these key disciplines. It is hoped that in time these specialists will be provided.

The music program is not strong and efforts will be made, in the near ftuure, to bolster this program so that our children may benefit through the enjoyment of this great field of knowledge and continue to enjoy its fruits long after they have completed school.

Some guidance services are currently being offered and are proving most successful. There is a need here to increase these services so that we may provide each child with the proper direction in his educational, vocational and social fields.

In conclusion might I say, that we have diagnosed our problems and now we must attempt to solve them considering the worth of the success of our children and the ability of the taxpayer to shoulder the burden. The School Committee and administration will make every effort to strike an equitable solution.

Financial Report

Due to the many technicalities of the State system of accounting, it is necessary for the school department to ask for a sum of money from the Town in order to keep the total expenses to a minimum and to be able to report correctly to the State on our expenditures each June.

Expenditures for 1965 and Estimated Budget for 1966 will be found following this summary.

Rising enrollments, increased staff, heating, lighting, and maintenance of nine additional classrooms, up dating of educational materials and services, increases in staff salaries, have contributed to the increased financial requirements for 1966.

Maintenance and Repairs

With the knowledge that four of our schools are not new, the School Committee and administration have taken steps

during the past year to maintain and repair the school property. Among the most prominent maintenance and repair work of this past year has been the painting of rooms at the Long Plain School, the installation of new ceilings at the Parting Ways School, new curtains have been installed at various schools, the auditorium of the Marie S. Howard School has been painted, rooms in the existing wing of the junior high school, as well as the outside trim, have been painted. The boys' shower room has been re-tiled and the outside walls of the gymnasium have been sealed. This does not take into consideration the day to day repairs and up-keep of our school buildings. The custodial staff has done an excellent job in this area. Due to the addition of nine rooms at the junior high school, an additional custodian will be added to the staff.

School Lunch Program

The school lunch program has enjoyed another most successful year. From September of 1964 to June of 1965 they have served a total of 47,899 lunches and the receipts have totaled \$12,043.19. These figures indicate the success of the program but also express the fact that the students of the junior high school enjoy a hot meal prepared by the expert staff of the cafeteria. Last school year they served a daily average of 270 meals to an average enrollment of 290 students. The School Committee has added a new full time and one part-time worker to the staff to aid in the preparing of additional needs of the inclusion of the sixth grade and the increased numbers in the upper grades. The average participation this year is upwards of 380 per day, served within an hour and a half.

Conclusion

The superintendent wishes to recognize all staff members of the school department for their cooperation and efforts in this a most tragic and trying year. The teachers and principals have contributed greatly to the transition in administration. Mrs. Braley has been transferred as Principal to the Acushnet Junior High School and Mrs. Frances Duff has been appointed Principal at the Parting Ways School.

REPORT OF THE SCHOOL PHYSICIAN AND NURSE

Acushnet, Massachusetts

January 24, 1966

To the Members of the School Committee, The Superintendent, Teachers, and Residents of the Town of Acushnet:

We respectfully submit for your consideration our report of data concerning our activities during the year 1965, a momentous year in which we sustained the loss of our beloved Superintendent Albert F. Ford at a critical time in our rapidly changing and growing educational school system. We certainly miss his gracious soft-spoken companionship and understanding experienced leadership. We were fortunate in having Mr. Edward J. Tynan, whose close association with Mr. Ford and his problems led to such understanding that there has been little disruption of programs and service. We welcome our new Superintendent, and congratulate our School Committee and Selectmen on their choice.

During the year, School health examinations were given to all children entering the first grade, as well as students in Grades 4, 6 and 9, and to all aspirants for the Baseball and Basketball Teams. 355 grade students were examined, and 130 pre-school children were examined; physical condition and defects noted, and corrections recommended, parents being very co-operative and understanding. Abnormalities were noted as follows:

The Massachusetts Vision Examination given to 1266 pupils revealed 102 failures who were referred for treatment. 92 of these received corrective treatment; 10 are still under care for vision problems.

The Massachusetts Pure-Tone Audiometer Test for Hearing was given to 1284 pupils, 63 being found to have hearing defects. All have either been corrected or are still under treatment for their defective hearing.

Under sponsorship of the Bristol County Health Association, the Heaf Test for Tuberculosis was administered to 423 children in December. 5 positive reactions were found and these children, their families and close contacts are all scheduled to undergo follow-up chest X-rays.

Also under sponsorship of the Bristol County Health Association, the Mobile X-Ray Unit visited Acushnet in June, 1965 and conducted 490 chest X-rays.

At the Clinic held in the Russell Memorial Library at 2 P.M. on the first Wednesday of each month, we saw 270 infants and gave—

- a. 60 vaccinations against Small-Pox.
- b. 31 children immunized against Diphtheria, Pertussis and Tetanus.
- c. 134 older children inoculated against Diphtheria and Tetanus.
- d. 191 immunizations with Oral Polio Vaccine (against Infantile Paralysis).
- e. 88 people inoculated against Influenza.

In addition, booster Oral Polio Vaccine and booster injections of Diphtheria-Pertussis-Tetanus Vaccine were offered to all pupils in grades one and five of all schools. Under this program—

- a. 84 students received Diphtheria-Pertussis-Tetanus inoculations.
- b. 104 students received Diphtheria-Tetanus inoculations.
- c. 172 students took the Oral Polio Vaccine.

Under a new program instituted by the Acushnet Board of Health, we conducted Adult Health Immunization Clinic Sessions open to all adults and gave—

- a. 706 immunizations with Influenza Vaccine.
- 488 adults immunizations against Diphtheria and Tetanus.
- c. 143 adults booster inoculations against Diphtheria and Tetanus.

Thus, in brief, we have outlined a busy, eventful year, a year with some sadness as well as joy, but altogether, a year of satisfying progress. We are grateful for the gracious comradeship and co-operation of the Students, their Parents, the

School Committee, the Superintendent and Teachers, our Co-workers, and to our Board of Health whose financial aid has helped to make some of these programs possible.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF HEALTH FOR THE YEAR 1965

To the Officers and the Residents of the Town of Acushnet:

The Board of Health respectfully submits the following report for the year 1965:

Immediately following the election the newly elected member, Emile R. Houle, was sworn into office by the Town Clerk. At the first regular meeting the Board was organized as follows:

Chairman: Emile R. Houle Secretary: Sylvano Frates

Agent and Inspector of Licenses: Joseph H. LePage

During the past year we had one patient at the Norfolk County Hospital for the treatment of Tuberculosis. There were a total of seven premature births to residents of Acushnet. There was one premature death, and one case was aided by the Board of Health.

A total of 24 deaths, 11 male and 13 female, were reported during the year.

Board of Health Dental Clinics were held:during the year. 19 clinics with a total charge of \$1,206.00 for these clinics. The children paid \$237.00 and the balance \$979.00 was paid by the Board of Health. The following services were rendered:

53 Examinations

7 Extractions

128 Treatments

1 X-ray

11 Treatment Fillings 39 Prophylasis
151 Fillings 1 Decidous Filling

4 Porcelain Fillings

251 Visits were made to clinic and 35 Children were completed and 51 New Children were seen by the dentist.

This year we sponsored an Adult Tetanus Immunization Program in cooperation with State and Federal Public Health Agencies. This was a Nation Wide WellBee Tetanus Program. Evening clinics were held the first Tuesday of each month (October, November and December) and also each Wednesday afternoon of these same months. A total of 1,337 immunizations were given. The Board felt that the program was very successful.

We again sponsored, with the help of the Bristol County Health Association, the School Heaf Testing program. A total of 423 children were tested and there were 5 positive reactors. Contacts and positive reactors are being X-rayed and some reactors have been placed on medication. In June of this year the Mobile Chest X-ray unit was in Acushnet. We were pleased that 499 residents took advantage of this opportunity for a free chest X-ray.

Monthly Well Baby Clinics were held at the Russell Memorial Library on the first Wednesday of each month from 2-4 P.M. We would like to thank the Trustees for the use of the building. At clinic the following immunizations were completed:

REPORT OF TRUSTEES OF RUSSELL MEMORIAL LIBRARY

To the Officers and Townspeople of Acushnet:

Every year that passes in which we are able to do some major repairs, add some needed or up-to-date equipment, or bring some new service to our community, we feel has been a year of accomplishment. The year 1965 has been one of those. We are proud to announce the new aluminum and glass doors and windows have been installed at no cost to the taxpayers. Our interest from Trust Funds was more than ample to cover this large item.

The interiors of the main library room and the stack room have been redecorated, and the comments from those using the library are very gratifying. This has both brightened and up-dated the interior.

We continue, of course, to stress the addition of technical volumes to our shelves since modern day education requires more and more research in more and more fields. At the same time we do not neglect the other phases of library use.

The end of May again saw a most successful observation of Massachusetts Art Week. The quality of these yearly shows improves each year, and some of our artists are invited to participate in other shows on the strength of what is shown in May. It not only encourages those participating in the exhibit, but it is also good publicity for our town, and an inspiration for our young people. Work done by our children has also come in for its share of display during the year, and we have expanded these exhibits to include not only those of an art nature, but also science projects, rocks and minerals,

special hobbies, etc.

The story time — an ever popular feature of the library summer — also branched out. Films and exhibits were again featured. The highlight of the story time was a puppet show presented by the neighborhood children. All in all, the library personnel has tried to interest our children in the rewarding habit of reading and using our library. Today's children are the adult readers of tomorrow — to be a reader is to be informed about what takes place in our world.

We have added a children's card index catalog, and the librarian — Mrs. Gifford — is teaching them the use of it. It takes much patience and time but the results are proving it a worthwhile project. Again as in the past she has given instruction in the use of library facilities to Scouts, Brownies, various school groups, and anyone else who seemed interested. Book deposits have gone to schools as usual, and a large number of reading certificates have been awarded to those completing the necessary reading.

The allowance for repairs in 1966 will be used exteriorly. To keep the outside of the building in good repair is a continuing process, and a very necessary one.

The Board of Trustees and the library personnel take this opportunity to thank everyone — townspeople or outsider — who has helped with donations or participation in programs to make this a good year library-wise.

As in the past years, this year saw many activities at Pope Park. Kiddy-Land is growing more and more each year, and the increasing number of children in town are making use of the playground, which makes us feel good.

As usual the baseball diamonds were in heavy demand. Out of town teams who visit here are very generous with their comments and compliments about the condition of our infields.

One of the highlights of the season at the Park was the sponsorship of the Eastern Playoffs of the Junior Bronco League. Host of this event, the Acushnet Youth Athletic Association, won these playoffs, and this earned them the right to play in the World Series, which was held in New Bedford. The Acushnet boys made an excellent showing, and we can all be proud of them.

Another highlight of the summer was the July 4th Celebration. The Fire Department hosted many other fire departments in a muster, and the local firemen gave us a demonstration of their ability and efficiency. It's always a thrill to

The Conservation Commission respectfully submits the following report for the year 1965:

The Conservation Commission re-elected Mr. Peter Murphy as its chairman during its first meeting. Meetings were held monthly during the year, with a number of meetings held also with other town agencies.

The Commission approached the Board of Health concerning a pollution problem in the Acushnet River, The matter was taken under advisement.

The fish ladder was re-installed at the damsite at the Acushnet Saw Mills property, and the State Division of Fisheries released 3000 herring in the headwaters of the Acushnet River.

The Commission has taken steps to acquire for conservation use a number of tax-title properties, and have met with private individuals about the possible acquisition of other property for conservation use.

The Commission met with the Selectmen concerning the possible purchase from the City of New Bedford the Town Beach site on Lake Street. Following this meeting the Com-

mission met with the New Bedford Water Board, and the proposed purchase was taken under advisement.

The Conservation Commission is still feeling its way along slowly, and welcomes any suggestions from those interested in conserving Acushnet's natural resources.

BRISTOL COUNTY MOSQUITO CONTROL PROJECT ANNUAL REPORT FOR 1965

Acushnet, Mass.

On June 30, 1966 the Bristol County Mosquito Control Project will have completed its seventh year of serving Acushnet in a year round effort to reduce the mosquito annoyance to its residents and guests. The past year has presented a number of events that should be of interest to all cities and towns enrolled in this program.

- (1) A Pesticide Board recently formed makes it mandatory that all persons spraying or applying pesticides to the land of another shall be licensed. We have complied with this and at least one licensed person is present whenever insecticides are being applied by this Project.
- (2) The rules and regulations of this Board are adhered to and all recommendations as to the type and use of pesticides are followed in the public as well as wildlife interests.
- (3) In 1965 the need for a cooperative mosquito control program became more evident with the inception of the Essex County Mosquito Control Project located in Beverly, Mass. A total of eight projects are now engaged in the effort to make the areas of everyday living and the abundance of recreational areas in their respective Counties more enjoyable to its residents, and of greater importance, participating in the public health program against Encephalitis (sleeping sickness). The latter is being done through the medium of the Encephalitis Field Station now located at the Lakeville State Hospital. In cooperating with this station we are able to keep well informed

on the developments and influx of the mosquito known to transmit this disease.

(4) Until July 12, 1965, the Bristol County Mosquito Control Project was under the direction of Mr. Robert W. Spencer. He has been appointed Superintendent of the newly formed Essex County Project located in Beverly, Mass. At this writing I (Frank W. Dillingham) am acting Superintendent having been appointed by the Bristol County Mosquito Control Commission. I have been with the project since its organization in 1959 and since 1960 have held the position as foreman.

During the past year in Acushnet many steps were taken both in emergency and permanent measures to reduce the mosquito population.

The early fall found our crews engaged in our brook and ditch maintenance program and 3795 feet were cleared of debris and brush removed from the banks of these and others to prevent further blockage.

When the winter months presented the opportunity, ice covered breeding areas were dusted with insecticide and 95 acres were treated in this manner. To supplement this program areas found to be breeding upon inspection were treated with No. 2 fuel oil in the early spring.

The summer months as always presented our greatest problem and a residual spray of insecticide was applied to the foliage by our trucks in sections that were most troublesome, and whenever a request for service was received it was complied with as soon as possible.

All storm-sewer catch basins containing water were treated periodically to control a continual summer breeding source.

We ask any resident who has a particular problem concern-

ing mosquito control to contact the Mosquito Control Project and help make the coming year a successful one.
