# REPORT OF THE BOARD OF SELECTMEN

To the Citizens of Acushnet:

We submit herewith our report for the year ending December 31, 1969.

At the initial meeting of the board following the Annual Town Election reorganization took place. At this time, by unanimous assent, Clement St. Amand, Jr. was elected Chairman of the Board and Wilfred C. Fortin clerk for 1969.

The Board, as in the past, met every Monday night at 7:00 P.M. in their offices at the Town Hall. Here they heard weekly reports of the Department heads and petitioners from throughout the Town. In addition to these weekly meetings, it was often necessary to meet on other evenings during the year to attend to special consideration and requirements.

Various projects were undertaken during the year. Curbings were installed on Coury Drive and Oliviera Avenue and these two streets were repaved with bituminous concrete. Drainage was installed on Club Avenue, Bardsley Street, Coulombe Street. These streets should be resurfaced with an amount in the 1970 warrant.

Another section of Middle Road was reconstructed and the rest of Middle Road and Peckham Road were resurfaced.

The water main was extended on Middle Road from west of Morse's Lane to the vicinity of the Junior High School. Various engineering projects were undertaken throughout town for additional road projects. Most of the engineering was for drainage problems throughout town that have shown up in recent years.

As voted at a special town meeting the problem of drainage on Main Street is being taken care of by the State.

The board has spent considerable time meeting with the police union and labor union on salaries for the coming year.

The problems in this town are getting worse by the years and do show up in increasing expenditures every year. The board has tried to keep the expenditures in line but with soaring costs it is very hard.

The board would like to thank all of the department heads for doing a good job during the year 1969.

# TOWN OF ACUSHNET

Incorporated 1860

Acushnet, on the inlet of Buzzards Bay, was settled about 1659, and incorporated as a town in 1860. The name was derived from the Indians, meaning "A Bathing Place."

The village of Acushnet was destroyed during the King Phillip's War. In September 1776, another historic battle occurred between the Minutemen and British Troops at the present bridge on Main Street.

The influence of many groups of immigrants living here in Acushnet is evident in the local cuisine. In addition to the fishcakes, hastt puddings, pumpkin pies of the Yankee influence, there are breads and salads of the French Canadiens, and thick cabbage soup of the Polish.

Two well know personages came from Acushnet, William Bradford, of the Marine painter, and Clement Nye Swift, painter of Briton subjects, were both natives of Acushnet. Here can also be found impressive structures such as the Methodist Episcopal Church on Main Street. It is of ivy-colored field stone with a slender, shingled spire, surrounded by a guilded dolphin.

Located three miles from New Bedford, Acushnet now has a population of 8,120 as of January 1, 1969.

# REPORT OF THE ACUSHNET CONSERVATION COMMISSION

Acushnet, Mass. January 28, 1970

To the Officers and Residents of The Town of Acushnet:

The Conservation Commission respectfully submits the following report for the year 1969:

The Conservation Commission re-elected Mr. Peter Murphy as its chairman at the first regular meeting. Regular monthly meetings were held throughout the year.

For the past four years a temporary wooden fish-ladder served as the only means for herring to pass up the Acushnet River past the dam at the Acushnet Sawmills damsite. This past Fall a permanent concrete fish-way was installed in place of the wooden ladder, and should greatly facilitate the passage of the spawning herring.

The Commission has entered into a co-operative agreement with the Bristol Conservation District, a Federally funded agency located in Middleboro. The people at the Conservation District office furnish consultive technical assistance to Conservation Commissions in establishing conservation measures which utilize the natural resources of land controlled by these Commissions. To have the assistance of professionally trained people will be of great help to us, and should lead to an improved program.

The Commission has also had a preliminary survey made

of the land at Long Plain, and at Morton Lane, off of Hathway Road, to determine the boundaries.

The Commission has resigned its control of the Town Beach and feels that under the care of the Park Department a more satisfactory service will be offered the Town.

This year we have served 17 patients under the Medicare program It appears the need for this service will grow each year in proportion to the increases in our population and with the better benefits offered by the Board of Health Nursing Service. Several of these patients were under the improved services we obtained under the Easter Seal Program and the Home Health Aide Service. 110 home visits were made to new babies. Under the continuation of this program more children have been immunized.

There were a total of 7 premature births in the Town of Acushnet for the year of 1969. There were 2 infant deaths.

A total of 11 deaths, 7 Male and 4 Female were reported for this year.

Board of Health Dental Clinics were held during the year at the office of Dr. Paul W. Kuechler, D.M.D. at 2174 Acushnet Ave., New Bedford, Mass. on Tuesday morning 9:00 to 12:00 each week. The attendance is limited to the first four grades, with the children of the fourth grade taken to clinic first. We are happy to announce that the continuation of flouride treatments have resulted in good dental care reports, and fewer caries.

18 dental clinics with a total charge of \$1,785.00 for clinics. The children paid \$342.00 and a balance of \$1,443.00 was paid by the Board of Health. Dental Clinic is limited to the first four grades due to the limited amount of money that we have to use for Dental Clinic. The following services were rendered:

358 individual visits were made to the clinic and 15 children were completed and 62 new children were seen by the dentist.

A School Heaf Testing Program in conjunction with the Bristol County Health Association was held in December. A total of 511 school children were tested and there was 1 positive reactor. This reactor will be x-rayed and after further testing will be put on corrective medication if need be.

The Mobile X-ray Unit which visits us every 2 years was here December 2, 1969. The X-ray Unit serviced 528 Townspeople. Due to the use of this Mobile Unit as ascreening device, we were able to discover an active case of T.B. which is being treated at the present time.

Mumps Vaccine was available to all children in Grades 7-9 in both public and private schools in June 1969. 182 chil-

dren were given the vaccine. German Measles was released in September 1969 by the State Dept of Public Health for Kindergarten through grade 3 in both public and private schools. In November clinic at the schools 509 children were immunized against German Measles. This was a successful program, since the total enrollment for this group was 566. It is hoped that in the near future the vaccine will be made available to all school age children.

Monthly Well Baby Clinics were held during the year upstairs in the Town Hall on the first Wednesday of each month from 2-4 P.M. No clinic is held during July and August. A total of 10 clinics were held. This year we held Flu clinics in October and November.

The following immunizations were completed at the clinics:

28 measles

247 oral polio

60 smallpox vaccinations

94 triple vaccine

98 double vaccine

223 influenza virus vaccine

1 typhoid

57 mumps

11 mantoux

With the new vaccines available to the Board of Health, it is hoped that we will soon see our children free of the dangers of mumps and german measles. We have only had one reported case of measles since 1966.

This year, after much discussion with horse owners, the Board of Health started the issuance of Stable Permits. 53 permits were issued. Due to the increased work load, the Board of Health is asking for an increase in hours for the

clerk, giving the office 30 hour coverage weekly instead of the present 20 hours.

In July of 1969 a law was passed which stated that all dogs must have rabies immunization. The Board of Health hopes to sponsor a rabies clinic this spring.

The Board also realizes that there will have to be an increase in nursing help in the near future to keep up with the greater demand on our nursing services.

We wish to thank everyone for their cooperation during the year and present the following statistical report:

## REPORT OF TRUSTEES OF RUSSELL MEMORIAL LIBRARY

#### TO THE TOWNSPEOPLE:

Once again it is time for the annual town report. The library year was pretty much routine in 1969. We discarded used books, bought replacements and new subjects. Our librarian and assistant continued to help students—as well as adults—with research. Incidentally, research accounts for the biggest part of the librarian's time during library hours, and is, of course, always a major library service.

We continued with our policy of repairing, and when necessary, of replacing building items. Unfortunately, vandalism caused us to spend a large part of our repair money during 1969 to replace losses. We wish there was some way to impress on the young people that heedless disregard for town property costs their parents money in taxes. Year after year, we bring this matter to the attention of the taxpayers, but the young people continue to use the library grounds as a play area with the consequent damage to building, lawn, and trees.

The "Summer-Read-In" conducted by the librarian was very successful. The purpose of this program is to interest our young people to acquire a better reading ability—both for enjoyment and education. Certificates, as in the past were awarded to those having read twenty books.

Both trustees and library staff wish to thank all those who donated books and magazines during the year. These are always welcome.

Again we are grateful for the Acushnet Mothers Club's interest in the library, and its generous gift for books. Also for

joining in the summer story hour since this program became too large for our small library staff to manage alone. It is this kind of co-operation that makes successes of undertakings in our town.

The Tenth Anniversary Observance of Massachusetts Art Week by our town artists and craftsmen was the finest exhibit since our Centennial exhibition by Town and Greater New Bedford artists and craftsmen. Each year has seen a larger number of people dropping by the library Lower Hall to view what the town has to offer, and each year we discover new talent. Most gratifying is the finding of young adults with talent who join with the older generation, and in art there is no generation gap. Once again the Board of Trustees and the Massachusetts Art Week Committee extend a most cordial invitation to everyone to visit the Lower Hall during the week of May 24 through May 31.

We hope more and more people will avail themselves of our library facilities during 1970. Library hours are:

### REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

TO: The Acushnet School Committee

I have the honor of submitting my fifth annual report as Superintendent of the Acushnet Public Schools.

The Acushnet School Committee, Mr. Norman La Belle, Chairman; Mr. Robert Honohan and Mr. Benjamin T. Briggs, Jr. has met twenty-four times during the past year, beginning January 6, 1969 and ending on December 15, 1969.

The School Committee has studied, evaluated, planned and adopted new programs and ideas for the present and future educational welfare of your children and your schools. The Committee has given many hours to the formulation of policy, both educational and financial.

::

#### I. A REVIEW OF THE SCHOOL FACILITIES:

A. Elementary: The Parting Ways and Long Plain Schools should be abandoned as soon as acceptable facilities can be constructed. Kindergartens must be provided, under law, by September, 1973. A solution to this housing problem must be found in order to provide a modern educational program.

B. Secondary School: The junior high school has and is well maintained but faces enrollment pressure in grades 6-9. Any solution to the elementary school problem should include plans to ease the space needs for grades 7, 8 and 9.

New Bedford officials have again informed us that provisions are and will be made to continued acceptance of Acushnet High School students in grades 10, 11, and 12. These

provisions will exist in the present high school building and in the new New Bedford High School.

C. Vocational School: During the past year, New Bedford Vocational High School announced they were excluding out-of-town students from their school, as of September, 1970. Immediately, the Towns of Acushnet, Fairhaven, Lakeville, Freetown, Rochester and Dartmouth and Mattapoisett began informal meetings to see if a regional vocational school could meet our needs. Each town now has a Regional Planning Committee which will join with the other communities to enter formal negiotiations to form a regional school agreement.

The best answer for Acushnet remains regionalization of her schools with neighboring districts. To date, efforts to do this have met with rejection. Continued efforts will be made to secure acceptance by a neighbor or perhaps State action through financial incentive may be forthcoming.

#### II. THE SCHOOL PROGRAM:

This past year has produced many and varied efforts to continue and improve the school program.

A teacher's aide program was provided to the first grade teachers of the Parting Ways and Marie Howard Schools. With the help of federal monies, pupil-teacher ratios were reduced to improve the instruction to the first grade children.

A class was established for children with dyslexia, under the direction of Miss Dorothy Reynolds. This class is being offered at the Howard School for a maximum of eight children.

A summer kindergarten program was offered for five weeks to help potential first graders take their "first step" into school. An important contribution to the education of the children is being taken by the teaching staff. They have been and are enrolled in both formal and informal self-improvement course work. It is certainly to the advantage of the Acushnet school children to have a staff of teachers dedicated to improve their professional skills.

A new music program has been introduced that provides an active learner role. Indications are that many students will be reading music by the end of the school year. Plans call for a recorder band for the sixth grade and a fifth grade chorus in the near future.

Parting Ways School has begun to develop a small elementary school library program with the help of federal funds. It is hoped this program will continue.

Monies have been budgeted for two new positions, parttime speech therapist and a part-time school adjustment counselor. These staff positions will be shared with neighboring school districts. The School Adjustment Counselor will work with children needing special type programs in placement and coordination with area clinics.

Many of our staff members have been involved with Project COD staff, a regional curriculum project, to begin to explore new ways to teach and to structure material, for learners. It is hoped these materials, after being tested, will be of value to all of our grades.

Elementary science will change its approach somewhat in the spring and fall. Efforts are being made to introduce more experimentation into the science program. In-Service work with staff will help us to implement these programs. The adult evening program will be expanded to include a course in woodworking for men. This course will begin in the Fall.

An after-school shop course is being planned for the junior high school boys who are unable to attend New Bedford Vocational High School.

#### III. ANCILLARY SERVICES:

Maintenance of buildings has been minor due to the consideration of the construction of the new elementary school. However, every effort was made to keep the schools in safe condition. Diligent work by the custodians has kept the buildings clean and tidy. Major expenditures will have to be made shortly, if the school building program is not aimed to some solution.

The school lunch programs continues to serve 80-90% of the students at the junior high school a Type "a" hot lunch.

#### IV. CONCLUSION:

Many of the internal school problems will be solved when the external school housing problem is resolved. I wish to recognize the cooperation and fine effort of the school principals, teaching staff and civil service employees:

#### **REPORT OF THE SCHOOL PHYSICIAN & NURSES**

Acushnet, Massachusetts January 29, 1970

To the Members of the School Committee, The Superintendent, Teachers, and Residents of the Town of Acushnet:

It is again time to submit our annual report, and we therefor present to you for your perusal and consideration a report on data concerning our activities during the year of 1969.

Physical examinations were given to all children in Grades 1, 4, & 8 in the Public Schools, and to all children in the Preprimary (Kindergarten), 4th, and 8th Grades in the Private Schools. Also, to aspirants to the athletic teams at Ford Junior High School.

In a total of 355 physical examinations, the following conditions were reavealed:

Dental defects	4
Emotion problems	1
Nutritional abnormality	2
Eye conditions	12
Ear conditions	35
Nose & Throat conditions	0
Cardiac Abnormality	2
Postural Defects	8
Foot Conditions	1
Miscellaneous Defects	29

Parents were duly notified & corrective measures were accordingly instituted.

The Massachusetts Vision Test was administered to 1,551 children in the school system. 117 children failed the test repeatedly, and through the co-operative efforts of the parents, all these children are in the process of corrective treatment.

The Massachusetts Pure-Tone Audiometer Test for Hearing was give to 1,481 school children; of whom, there were 61 failures. These 61 children through the action of co-operative parents are all under corrective treatment.

The Vision & Hearing Tests (as mentioned above) were also offered to the children at pre-school registration. 130 pre-school children were so examined and there were 5 failures in the Vision Test and 8 failures in the Hearing Test. The parents were so notified and corrective measures advised.

The Heaf Test for Tuberculosis was administered to 511 school children, only one positive reactor being found. This person is now on corrective medication and treatment.

Dental Clinics (attended by students in the first 4 grades) were held regularly and the following action taken: 62 examinations, 101 treatments, 71 fillings, 4 extractions, 257 fluoride treatments, and 15 prophylactic treatments.

A special Mumps Vaccine Clinic session was held in June 1969 in which immunization inoculations were offered to all pupils in Grades 7, 8, & 9 at both Public and Private Schools—with the following results attained:

Notices were sent to the: 382 children in this group.

381 notices were returned

177 had already had Mumps.

182 agreed to receive inoculations, and this was carried out.

23 children's parents refused inoculations.

A special German Measles Clinic session was presented to students in Kindergarten, Pre-primary, 1st, 2nd, & 3rd Grades at both Private and Public Schools. There were 566 pupils in this group, and 509 pupils received immunization inoculations for German Measles.

At our monthly clinics held in the Town Hall on the 1st Wednesday of each month except July & August, plus several extra "Flu" Vaccine clinics, we were able to administer the following numbers of inoculations, vaccinations, etc:

98-Diptheria, Tetanus

94-Diptheria, Pertussis, & Tetanus

247—Oral Polio Vaccine (tri-valent)

60—Smallpox Vaccinations

28—Measles Vaccine

223 "Flu" Vaccine

57—Mumps Vaccine

1-Typhoid Vaccine

857—total number of immunizations.

This completes our enumeration of endeavors and accomplishments during the year of 1969 in our attempts to maintain high levels of Good Health and Well-Being in our Community. It has again been a great pleasure to enjoy the companionship and co-operation of all our citizens who have helped us to make a success of our programs and efforts. We especially thank and appreciate the co-operation and comradeship of

the students, their parents, the school committee, the superintendent and teachers, our co-workers, our board of health and selectmen.
