# Report of the Board of Selectmen

The election in April saw the reelection of John Sylvia, for his 2nd term. The Board then reorganized and Frederick L. Duguay, Jr., was elected as Chairman for the coming year.

The year 1979 was one of great accomplishment in various segments all over town. We realize there are many items to be done, but we are proceeding as cautiously as possible, keeping in mind our taxpayers.

The Greater New Bedford Solid Waste Committee is still moving along, with the vote of the June Town Meeting we are now officially in the district, though actual full participation will not develop until Town Meeting votes the necessary expenditure, but in the meantime we have the present site under contract until June 30, 1980, however we continue to keep abreast because this is a potentially serious situation.

Sewerage is coming closer to reality with the appropriations made in recent years and more to come. Our application is on file with the State/Federal Government and we are encouraged that funding is forthcoming. The area to be sewered is in the central part of town, generally bounded by Town Hall to Hope Street and westerly to the Acushnet River.

Revenue Sharing is still being received and this again was voted by Town Meeting to be utilized for wages of the Police Department. We have encouraged Congressman Studds to fight for reenactment because funding currently expires September 30, 1980. It would be a feather in the cap of Acushnet if our residents were to also contact Mr. Studds asking that he vote to renew Revenue Sharing. Since 1973 we have received over 1 million dollars. It has been a godsend.

Anti-Recession funding expired but we received in excess of \$100,000 over the past few years and the Town Meeting voted many things that were accomplished including purchase of equipment.

We are still involved in the CETA Program, having persons assigned to various departments. We have obtained many benefits and it has also been a help to the employees. Since 1972 this town has received millions of dollars and we are thankful. The Executive Secretary was the original administrator of this program and it is

now being operated under Louis Berard. We still participate in the YWE Summer Program and After School Program for youths 14-21 and we have received many benefits here also.

We embarked on a new energy saving street light program and this has been a conservation measure. Also, we have abided by our State/Federal government on energy conservation by reducing our thermostats to 65 in all buildings.

We received State Aid for road work and this was expended under the direction of our Highway Superintendent.

Our Fire Department was upgraded with purchase of the rescue power tool "Jaws of Life" and a new fire truck is due to arrive in March 1980. Our Police Department again received a new car, medium size, and it has proved to be more economical.

Our EMT Volunteer Program is due to get under way in February and the town will then have about 20 additional people available for ambulance duty.

With the cooperation of the School Department we have consolidated in buying fuel, which has resulted in a saving of our taxpayers.

We also wish to point out that whenever bids are sought for items over \$1,000.00 we actively pursue bidders and thus results in greater savings.

We have the taxpayers in mind and do our utmost to conserve and provide good government service at the least possible cost.

We appreciate the coopertaion of those persons and departments who are providing services to the townspeople. We also wish to thank our Representative William Q. MacLean, Jr., for the many hours spent in providing information in behalf of the town and his untiring efforts has also provided funds in great amouts in varied areas.

### **Report of the Police Department**

To the officers and residents of the Town of Acushnet, I hereby, submit my report for the year ending December 31, 1979. During the past year the members of the Police Department attended various training programs. Sergeant Michael R. Poitras was promoted to the position of Chief of Police on March 13, 1979.

Officer George L. Sylvia was appointed Safety Officer on March 19, 1979 and is presently working in that capacity.

Officers trained as Emergency Medical Technicians attended refresher courses at various locations in the surrounding area some of which were given by Olde Colony Chapter Massachusetts Association EMT Inc. re-certifying them as required by state law.

Several officers were newly trained as EMT's attending the course given by Janice Botelho of Fairhaven. The newly trained officers are Joseph Pontes, Edmund Gelinas, Eliot A. Spooner, III, and Francis L. Kasmire.

Basic Cardiac Life Support Instructors Sergeant Barry W. Monte and Officer Gil Marques, Jr. conducted two courses in CPR (cardio-pulmonary resuscitation). These courses were attended by Officers of the department as well as members of various town departments.

On November 20, 1979 several officers attended a class given by John Szretter of Law Enforcement Maintenance Co. certifying them as Breathalyzer operators. Officers attending the class were Sgt. Barry W. Monte, Officers Gil Marques, Jr., George L. Sylvia, and Kenneth J. Souza.

Four part-time officers resigned from the department for personal reasons. Those officers were Steven J. Carrier, Elaine J. Edwards, Maria Otocki and Gilbert J. Harrison. Peggy J. McLoughlin, a clerk typist, also resigned after some medical problems.

On May 12, 1979 all part-time officers were required to take a qualifying examination given by the Massachusetts Criminal Justice training council in Fall River. All of Acushnet's part-time officers attended and passed the examination.

A Radar Timer Operator's Training Course was conducted at Acushnet on April 11, 1979 by instructor Richard S. Griffith of the Registry of Motor Vehicles qualifying officers to set up, calibrate

and operate Police Radar Timers. Qualifying as operators are Sgt. Stephen J. Cassidy, Jr., Officers Francis L. Kasmire, Denis A. Tetreault, George L. Sylvia, Maryann Antonietta, Eliot A. Spooner, III, Gil Marques, Jr., Joseph Francis, Stephen McCann, William E. Jenkinson, William Mazur, and Donald J. Guenette.

Acushnet received an AAA National Pedestrian Safety Citation. The award is given as part of AAA's nationwide program to give recognition to local officials who are working toward greater pedestrian safety. Awards are given each year to cities and towns who have had no pedestrian fatalities for the past year. The award was accepted by Police Chief Michael R. Poitras and Safety Officer George L. Sylvia.

Chief Michael R. Poitras and Detective Normand H. Soucy attended a two day course on "Crime Scene Supervision" given by the Massachusetts Criminal Justice Training Council and received certificates of achievement for their work.

Clerk/Dispatcher Patricia E. Dube received a certificate of achievement in "Basic Dispatch Training" upon completion of a two day class sponsored by the Massachusetts Criminal Justice Training Council.

During the course of the year the department purchased two police cruisers a 1979 Ford LTD II and a 1979 Ford Fairmont.

Our Health Care Services and Programs continued to be a source contributing to the well being of the residents of Acushnet, covering all ages. Our sincerest thanks to Katherine H. ### **NURSING SERVICES**

We are a certified member of the Massachusetts Association of Community Health and approved as a Provider of Health Services.

### HOME NURSING SERVICES

The contract with St. Luke's Hospital, New Bedford, for the Homemaker-Health Aid Services was renewed. This program is under the efficient supervision of Mrs. Elaine Tripp, R.N., M.S. of St. Luke's Hospital.

### **EASTER SEAL PROGRAM**

The contract with the Easter Seal Society which provides Physical Therapy; Speech Therapy, Occupational Therapy and Medical Social Work was renewed.

### **OTHER**

Our meetings are held on the second and fourth Wednesday of each month throughout the year at the Drop-In Center in the Parting Ways Building. The office is open Monday through Friday from 9:30 A.M. to 1:00 P.M. to render service and information relating to problems of the elderly town residents.

The Drop-In Center is open until 4:00 P.M. Monday through Friday. A hot lunch is served daily at 12 Noon from the Nutritional Hot Lunch Program. Meals on Wheels are delivered daily to homes of persons who are physically unable to come to the site. Through the Coastline Elderly Services we have been able to provide information in regard to the Fuel Assistance Program. Beano is played every Monday and Wednesday, and Card Games are played on Tuesday, Thursday and Friday. The Senior Citizens have been taken on trips to various places, such as: Plymouth, Newport, LaSallette Shrine, Summer Theaters, Sea Land in Brewster, and Cape Cod, to name a few. Holiday parties are also sponsored on Easter, Thanksgiving, Christmas and New Years.

### **Report of the Acushnet Historical Commission**

The Acushnet Historical Commission had another busy year.

The furnace at the Museum has now been repaired and is in good working order. We are hoping that, along with the storm windows which were installed in February, will help keep the heating bill down this winter.

In April the management of this Museum was turned over to the Acushnet Historical Society, with the maintenance of the building and grounds still taken care of by the Commission. This has worked out extremely well for both groups.

Many improvements have been made in the setup of the Museum by the Society, with a model home of the 19th century in one of the upstairs rooms and a replica of a dress-shop of that same era in the other upstairs room. Several more manikins and dress forms have been acquired for the display of clothing, and there are collections of shoes, fans, lacework, etc. in the cases of that room.

The Museum was open last year from May through October afternoons from 1 to 5 on Wednesdays, Saturdays, Sundays, and holidays, with members of the Society volunteering as attendants.

Admission fees are, of course, still turned over to the Commission and the Society also contributes to other expenses that come up.

As always, we are looking for more manikins or dress forms to display the many items of clothing which have been donated.

The Society and the Commission worked together this summer to build a float which appeared in the Rochester Tricentennial Parade. It represented a porch with flowers on either end, furniture from the Museum, and four adults and two children dressed in clothing also from the Museum.

There are still many old houses in Acushnet which have not yet been researched and marked with plaques. We have started working on them the first of this year and expect to finish most of them before the year is over.

In the past year, 32 water meter services were installed for new homes.

The metering services installed with these services are remote readers, which enables more accuracy during reading and billing periods.

All replacements of any meter in Town will be this new style; remote readers.

Our project of installing fire hydrants in areas where fire protection is inadequate has continued and will continue until all areas are equally protected to the extent of our service mains.

A fire hydrant rebuilding program was begun with the use of CETA personnel, in order to supply the needed manpower. At the present time 25% of the Town's fire hydrants have been reconditioned to assure proper operation in emergency situations. This program which is still in progress will continue for the coming year, until all hydrants in the Town have been serviced.

In the coming year the up-dating of our metering System will be continued. Beginning this year we are beginning a program of removing small size water mains that are not capable of supplying the necessary amount of water to the homes attached to these pipes.

All areas in Town are being evaluated and the poorest areas will be given top priority in the coming year.

### **Bristol County Mosquito Control Project**

On June 30, 1980 the Bristol County Mosquito Control Project will complete twenty-one years of service to the cities and town of Bristol county.

During the 1979 spring season, mosquito populations were relatively high is most areas throughout the county. This situation existed throughout most of Central and Southeastern Massachusetts.

Our spray program got underway the second week of May but spray operations were hampered by periods of heavy rain and showers during the latter part of the month, as it rained a total of eight days between May 13th and May 31st.

Despite weather conditions, by mid-June we had appreciable control on the spring breed. This was due to an increase in our spray program in that we had five Loco ultra low volume sprayers and two mistblowers working six days a week. Each truck also carried Altosid Briquets which were placed in the catch basins to stop them from breeding mosquitos. This was done during the regular work day when it became either too hot or windy to spray. By mid-summer, most areas were rid of the large hoardes of mosquitos that had emerged in the spring. During 1979 there was not one confirmed case of Eastern equine encephalitis in any city or town in Bristol County.

On October 1st our spray equipment was put away for the season and all crews turned to ditch maintenance and water management projects. The project now has two tractor-trenchers working year round to clean existing ditches and streams of debris. These machines are also constructing new drainage ditches on the salt marshes along Bristol County's coastline as well as upland swamp water ditches. With the construction of new ditches into known breeding areas, we will further reduce the mosquito population. These machines are available to the cities and town for this type of work on request, should it be determined that this work will aid the control of mosquitos.

At the close of 1979, aside from our regular spray program, we answered 335 individual spray requests for parties, weddings and other various outdoor activities; treated 430 breeding catch basins with Altosid Briquets; treated 32% acres of swamp with larvicide, and cleaned 1,280 feet of existing streams and brooks of brush and debris.

In 1980, we will have a total of seven Loco ultra low volume sprayers. With an increase in our water management program, coupled with the latest spray equipment, the Bristol County Mosquito Control Project is looking forward to faster and better service in the coming year.

I would like to include in this report that on April 30, 1979 Superintendent Frank W. Dillingham retired from the Bristol County Mosquito Control Project. On April 25, 1979, I, Alan W. DeCastro, was appointed superintendent. I have worked for the project since it was organized in 1959. From 1960-1965 I was a crewleader. During the latter part of 1965 I was appointed assistant superintendent, a position I held until my appointment as superintendent.

We, at the Bristol County Mosquito Control Project, would like to extend our sincere thanks to the Town of Acushnet for their continued support and cooperation.

### **Report of the Acushnet CETA Department**

To the Officers and Residents of the Town of Acushnet:

The Acushnet CETA Department has had as many as twenty (20) full-time participants in various town departments under the Title II Program, which met a payroll of approximately \$122,610.96.

During the year the Board of Selectmen also took advantage of one Title VI-B Project for the town. Participants of this project renovated several town buildings, as well as spruced up the town's schools, beach, and parks. Cross walks were repainted, and dangerous intersections were cleared of overgrowth. This project employed as many as twenty-six (26) participants and met a payroll of approximately \$64,593.75.

We also participated in the CETA Youth Program. The Youth Work Experience Program has had as many as twenty-one(21) youths working ten (10) hours weekly after school, and increasing to approximately thirty-four (34) youths in the summer program working twenty-eight (28) hours weekly. The Y.E.T.P. Program had five (5) participants working thirty-five (35) hours per week. The youth payroll was approximately \$34,182.10 plus fringe benefits for the year.

The Acushnet School Department will utilize a new Title IV-B Project this year. This project will employ ten (10) people in the position of Teacher/Counselor. It will be funded for approximately \$56,544.00. The purpose of this project is to provide individual instruction in the basic academic skills of reading, and mathematics to children between the ages of six (6) and eighteen (18) and to relate the acquisition of these skills to future success in the world of work. This project will also provide training and career awareness for college educated young people who are presently unable to find employment.

There is another Title VI-B Project waiting for funding. This project will employ approximately 30, in the capacity of Office Aids. The purpose of this project is to act as an extension of the clerical training program that was instituted by the New Bedford Consortium. In this manner participants will be able to gain experience needed to find unsubsidized employment.

The above programs have twofold objectives: first, it assists the town, allowing many labor oriented jobs to be completed with the extra manpower. Secondly, it also helps participants to learn while working and create responsibilities and good sound work habits.

The major emphasis for the coming year will be on training those residents of Acushnet, who find themselves without the skills needed for employment.

### **Acushnet Conservation Commission**

In June, 1978, the Board of Selectmen, Building Inspector, and the Conservation Commission met to discuss a growing problem in regard to violations of G.L. c131 s40, the wetland protection law, that specifies a notice of intent must be filed before any construction or activity within 100' of a wetland. It was mutually agreed that in the majority of the cases, the individual was unaware that a violation was taking place. This caused action by the Commission that was amounting to several hundred dollars a year in legal fees to the Town in addition to the engineering and legal fees borne by the owner to correct the violation. An informal system of inspecting the lots before the issuance of a building permit was devised by the 3 Boards. Since the start of this program, 138 lots have been inspected and the owners advised as to whether construction would be in violation of the law without filing a notice of intent. In several instances the Commission advised the owners to move the activity a short distance, thereby putting it out of the jurisdiction of 131-40 saving the owner several hundred dollars in engineering fees involved when filing a notice of intent. This program was never intended to replace the full legal determination procedure outlined in the wetland protection law. It is strictly an informal advisory. Mr. Thomas Powers, General Counsel of the Department of Environmental Quality Engineering, described this program as legitimate, desirable and commendable, particularly when no legal action has been necessary since the start of this procedure. Unfortunately cooperation with this program has not been 100%, but with the complete backing of the Board of Selectmen and the Building Department, it continues with no problem.

The Conservation Commission inspected 3 subdivision layouts and since all involved wetlands, notices of intent were filed by 2 developers, public hearings were held and conditions were ordered by the Commission to protect those wetlands. The 3rd has not filed as yet, but he has been notified that it will be necessary before the portion of his project involved in discharging water into a brook is started.

The Commission requested opinions from Town Counsel regarding the discharge of storm drain water on an abbutters land and allowing a developer to tie into an existing municipal storm drain system. It was his opinion that discharging water without a drainage easement was illegal and the Planning Board has the authority to permit tying into a municipal system.

In the near future, the Conservation Commission intends to start procedures necessary to hopefully obtain land in the southwest portion of the Town for Conservation purposes. If this land is acquired, we hope to use Federal or State funds to beautify the land.

ARTICLE 2. Unanimously voted to authorize the Town Treasurer, with the approval of the Selectmen, to borrow money from time to time in accordance with the provisions of General Laws, Chap. 44, Sec. 4, in anticipation of the revenue of the financial year beginning July 1, 1979, and to issue a note or notes as may be given for a period of less than one year in accordance with General Laws, Chap. 44, Sec. 17, (2/3rd vote needed. Hands not counted as it was unanimous.)

ARTICLE 3. It was a unanimous vote to authorize the members of the Cemetery Board to perform work in the Cemeteries and to determine the compensation to be paid to said members, such compensation not to exceed from sundries and Interest payable within the year.

ARTICLE 4. Motion made and carried to table Article 4, because money is used on Police Dept. Salaries Acct. previously voted on in Article 1.

ARTICLE 5. Unanimously voted to appropriate the sum of \$15,000., for the purpose of contributing a Stabilization Fund in accordance with the provisions of Gen. Laws, Chap. 40, Sec. 5B. (2/3rd vote needed. It was unanimous.)

ARTICLE 6. Unanimously voted to adopt the following by-law: Chap. 140, Sec. 173A: "All dogs owned or kept within the boundaries of the Town of Acushnet shall be restrained from running at large beyond the boundaries of the property owned or under the control of their owner or keeper at all times during day or night, except that when any such dog is permitted beyond said boundaries it shall be restrained by leash or other similar restraint. Penalties for the violation of any provision of this by-law shall be assessed and collected in accordance with the provisions established under Mass. Gen. Laws, Chap. 140, Sec. 173A, (Non criminal Disposition of Complaint for Violation of Dog Control Laws). Provided, however, that the fine for each violation including the first offense shall be the sum of \$25.00.

ARTICLE 7. Motion made to table Art. 7, as it was already voted on in Art. 2 of the Spec. Town Meeting. 2/3rd vote needed. It was unanimous to table.

ARTICLE 8. Zoning submitted to bring present laws to conform with Chap. 808 of the Gen. Laws of 1975. 2/3rd vote needed. Unanimously voted to accept Art. 8. 85 Yes, 1 No.

Sec. 1 Strike out Section 1.1 and insert in place thereof: To

promote the health, safety, convenience and welfare of the inhabitants of the Town of Acushnet, under the authority of, and in conformity with the Mass. Zoning Act, Chap. 40A, as amended by Chap. 808, Acts of 1975 and other applicable Gen. Laws.

Strike out in Section 1.2 the word complimentary and insert in place thereof: complementary.

Section 3. Strike out Section 3.5 (a) and insert in place thereof: Any lawful use of a building or part thereof, or any lot or any accessory use thereof, existing at the time of the adoption of this by-law or any amendment thereof may be continued although such use does not conform to the provision hereof, and any existing building or lot devoted to such use may be structurally altered and the use thereof changed to any use not more detrimental, provided that any changes, addition, or alterations require and must conform to a special permit issued by the Board of Appeals in accordance with Section 5.2 (b) of this by-law, provided however that in any such change, addition to or alteration of any existing building or use there shall be retained between such change, addition, alteration or use. and the lot boundary, an open space area as required by Section 3.3 of this by-law, except that said open area need not be greater than the street set-back or the side-line setback, or the rear year set-back of the existing non-conforming building or use.

Section 3.5 (b) strike out the word three and insert the word "two".

Section 3.7 add the following new paragraph:

Construction or operation under a building permit or under a special permit shall conform to any subsequent amendments of the Zoning By-Law, unless such use of construction is commenced within 6 months after the issuance of such permit.

Section 4.1 strike out the following sentence: such dwelling shall contain not less than 700 square feet or living area.

Section 5. Section 5.1 Enforcement: strike out the first sentence and insert in place thereof:

"This by-law shall be enforced by the Building Inspector."

Section 5.2 (b) Special Permits: after the first sentence add the following two paragraphs:

"No special permit shall be issued except following a public hearing held by the Board of Appeals, designated hereby as the special permit granting authority, within 65 days after filing of the application with the Town Clerk." If substantial use or construction under a special permit has not commenced within 2 years after the issuance of such permit, including any time needed to await the determination of any court appeal, such special permit shall lapse and become void.

Section 5.2 (b) add the following paragraph:

(g) Uses accessory to activities permitted as a matter of right, which activities are necessary in connection with scientific research and development.

Strike out Section 5.2 (c) and insert in place thereof:

(c) Variances: To grant upon appeal, or upon petition with respect to particular land or structures a variance from the terms of the applicable zoning ordinance or by-law where the Board of Appeals specifically finds that owing to circumstances relating to the soil conditions, shape or topography of such land or structures and especially affecting such land or structures but not affecting generally the zoning district in which it is located, a literal enforcement of the provisions of the ordinance of by-law would involve substantial hardship, financial or otherwise, to the petitioner or appellant, and that desirable relief may be granted without substantial detriment to the Public good and without nullifying or substantially derogating from the intent or purpose of this by-law. No variance may authorize a use or activity not otherwise permitted in the district in which the land or structure is located: provided however, that such variances properly granted prior to January first, nineteen hundred and seventy-six (Jan. 1, 1976) but limited in time, may be extended on the same terms and conditions that were in effect for such variance upon said effective date.

ARTICLE 9. It was so voted to transfer the sum of \$10,000. from the E&D Account to be used in conjunction with and in addition to any funds allotted by the Commonwealth for the construction, reconstruction and improvements of town roads.

ARTICLE 10. Voted to accept and enter into contract, giving authorization to the Selectmen, for the expenditure of any funds allotted or to be allotted by the Commonwealth for the construction, reconstruction and improvement of town roads.

ARTICLE 11. Unanimously voted to transfer the sum of \$5,931. from the E&D Account for the purchase of one (1) new Police Cruiser Car.

ARTICLE 12. Unanimously voted to transfer the sum of \$1,500. from the E&D Account to install two (2) catch basins and 400 feet of 12" reinforced concrete pipe, more or less, from corner of LeBoeuf Street westerly on Nelson Avenue to James Street.

ARTICLE 13. Unanimously voted to table Art. 13, requesting a sum of money for additional street lighting. (2/3rd vote needed. Hands not counted, as it was unanimous.)

ARTICLE 14. Unanimously voted to transfer the sum of \$7,000. from the E&D Account for the purchase of one (1) Hurst Rescue Power Tool Model #32A complete with accessories for the Fire and Police Departments.

ARTICLE 15. It was voted to transfer from the E&D Account the sum of \$47,000. for the purchase of one (1) new Fire Department truck complete with equipment.

ARTICLE 16. Unanimously voted to reduce the quorum necessary to conduct business at the Town Meeting to 75 (seventy-five) by amending Section 2, Chapter 2 (2-2-2) of the Town Charter, adopted on March 2, 1971. (The outcome of this article to be placed on the 1980 Town Election Ballot.)

ARTICLE 17. It was voted to table Art. 17, requesting the acceptance of Middlewood Drive, from Middle Road westerly to present terminus 700 feet, more or less, as per plan on file in Town Clerk's office, plan of Arthur C. Thompson, Inc., Engineers and Surveyors, dated September 3, 1976. 2/3rd vote needed. Yes, 96. No, 8.

ARTICLE 18. See Art. 10, Spec. Town Meeting within this Annual Town Meeting for its acceptance.

ARTICLE 19. It was voted to rescind Art. IV Sections 13 and 13A of the by-laws as voted on April 4, 1975 and October 25, 1976 respectively in their entirety and insert in place thereof the following new section:

Article IV Section 13B. "No alcoholic beverages shall be consumed on any public way or any place to which the public has right of access as invitees, sidewalk, town property, such as parks, school ground, including town buildings, except by license or permission from the persons in authority". Violations of this by-law is an arrestable offense.

### Special Town Meeting within the Annual Town Meeting held on June 4, 1979

ARTICLE 1. It was voted to create a Soil Conservation Board comprising of 5 members, after amending the article, to comprise of Highway Dept. Superintendent or his designee, 1 Conservation Commission member, 1 Planning Board member, 1 Board of Health member and 1 member at large, to be appointed by the Board of Selectmen. The sum of \$50. was raised from Taxation for this Board. No person engaged in the business of removing soil, loam, sand, gravel, clay, or quarrying of stone from land in said Town of Acushnet shall serve on said Board.

(Original article had called for the Tree Warden to be a member which was amended to a member at large.).

ARTICLE 2. It was voted to appropriate the sum of \$4,000. from the E&D Acct. to provide for the training, staff coordination and public information of the Emergency Medical Technician Program (EMT). Said sum of 4,000. to be expended under the jurisdiction of the Board of Selectmen.

Prior to voting the acceptance of this article, motion had been made to table it, but motion failed to pass. 2/3rd vote needed was not enough to do so. Yes 8, No, 59.

ARTICLE 3. It was voted to raise from Taxation the sum of \$600. for Tort Liability Insurance to protect the town, employees/agents in the performance of their duties.

ARTICLE 4. It was voted to raise by borrowing for three (3) years, by a note, notes or otherwise the sum of \$70,000., for engineering fees for the reconstruction of Middle Road. 2/3rd vote needed. Hands not counted as it was unanimous.

ARTICLE 5. Unanimously voted to table Art. 5.

ARTICLE 6. Original motion to table Art. 6 failed to pass. 2/3rd vote needed. 69 Yes. 73 No.

Article was amended to read as follows:

"That the Town vote to adopt the following by-law: Town owned vehicles shall be used only for town purposes. During non-working hours, such vehicles shall be parked or garaged on off-street, town-owned property, with the exception of persons who is subject to calls, and school buses not be restricted to the article."

It was voted to accept Art. 6 with the amendement. 97 to 33.

ARTICLE 7. Unanimously voted to disband the Acushnet Elementary School Building Committee with a vote of thanks, returning any unencumbered balances to the Town.

ARTICLE 8. It was voted to transfer from the E&D Account the sum of \$5,500. to conduct a summer recreation program cooperatively run by the School Department and the Park Department.

ARTICLE 9. It was voted to raise by taxation the sum of \$1,500., with the owner also contributing, for the purpose of installing a surface water drain trench on the east side of Mendall Road, land owned by Natalio Gomes, for a distance of approximately twelve hundred feet, with the said Natalio Gomes giving the Town an easement for said drainage trench.

ARTICLE 10. Unanimously voted to authorize the Board of Selectmen to petition the General Court of the Commonwealth of Massachusetts for special legislation erecting and constituting and otherwise validating the creation of a Regional Refuse Disposal District for the Town of Acushnet, Dartmouth, Fairhaven and the City of New Bedford under the provisions of General Laws Chapter 40 notwithstanding any failure upon any of the member municipalities to comply with the provisions of Section 44A thru 44K of said Chapter.

ARTICLE 11. It was voted to transfer the sum of \$1,610.02 from the Board of Health's Account to the Building Department Salary Account, for the Plumbing Inspector's fees, which is now under the Building Department's jurisdiction effective July 1978.

ARTICLE 12. It was voted to raise by taxation the sum of \$24,612.72, for the purpose of converting the Town's street light program from incandescent to sodium vapor.

ARTICLE 13. It was voted to transfer from E&D Account the sum of \$64,000 and set aside for Free Cash, and that it not be utilized for the purpose of reducing the property tax levy in fiscal 1980. Prov. of Sec. 12A, Acts of 1979.

ARTICLE 14. It was voted to transfer the amt. of \$46,933.97 from the E&D Account to be used in reducing Property Tax Levy of Fiscal 1980.

Annual Town Meeting and Special Town Meeting adjourned at 10:25 P.M.

ARTICLE 1. It was voted to transfer from the E&D Account the amount of \$400. for expenses of the Cable TV Committee.

ARTICLE 2. It was unanimously voted to expend the amount of \$8,204.28, from the Anti-Recession Federal Public Works Emplyoment Act of 1976, Title II fiscal Assistance funds on hand/uncommitted to purchase 2 copier machines, Fire Dept. receivers, and balance to be utilized for Town Hall Painting.

ARTICLE 3. It was voted to accept the provisions of Chapter 40, Sec. 6J of the General Laws, which reads as follows:

"a City or Town which accepts this section may appropriate money for the purchase of stormy weather work clothes, including rubber boots, and other work clothes for its employees", but it was further rescinded after action on Art. 4 was taken.

ARTICLE 4. Motion failed to pass on Art. 4 which would have allowed money to purchase of stormy weather work clothes, including rubber boots, and other work clothes for employees of the Highway and Water Department.

ARTICLE 5. It was voted by a wide margin to transfer the sum of \$4,666.18 from the E&D Account to add one (1) person as a laborer-motor equipment operator on the Highway Department.

ARTICLE 6. It was voted to transfer from the set aside E&D Account voted at the Annual Town Meeting Art. 13 the sum of \$14,920.72 for the following wage remuneration increases approved through Wage Contracts, Department Heads, Laborers, etc. retroactive 7/1/79:

It was voted to accept the provision of Section 44A to 44K inclusive of Chapter 40 of the General Laws providing for the establishment of a Regional Refuse Disposal District, together with the towns of Acushnet, Dartmouth, Fairhaven and the City of New Bedford, and the construction, maintenance and operations of a Regional Refuse Disposal Facility for said District, in accordance with the provisions of a proposed agreement filed with the Selectmen.

ARTICLE 8. It was voted by a wide margin to provide a 7% cost of living increase, retroactive to July 1, 1979, to be taken out of the set aside E&D Acct. money of Art. 13 voted at the Annual town Meeting, for the Treasurer.

The meeting adjourned at 8:45 P.M.
