REPORT OF THE BOARD OF SELECTMEN

The election in April saw the re-election of Frederick L. Duguay, Jr. for his second term. The Board reorganized and James S. Madruga, Jr. was elected Chairman for the year.

1980 was another year of stringent spending and we must stay within the 4% Tax Cap as mandated by the State, and also we must operate within our budgets appropriated at Town Meetings. As always, we strive to get the most done for the money we have to operate with.

Some of the highlights administered by this office are as follows:

Solid Waste—we continue to meet with New Bedford, Dartmouth and Fairhaven, to solve a potentially serious situation, however we still have a site under contract until 1983 or 1985 under extension.

Sewerage—we are still working with our engineering firm, Camp, Dresser and McKee, and by 1982 this project should be near completion. This is The Central Village Area, generally from the Town Hall south to Hope Street down to the river.

CETA — we still are taking advantage of the Federal Funds and this enables us to accomplish many things that would otherwise be difficult to attain. We also feel we are enabling these persons to learn a trade and also it is stimulating for them. This program has brought in several million dollars over the past 8 years. We also employ many youths during the summer, which is beneficial to the Town and to youths.

Street Lights— we continue to participate in the energy saving program while lighting our ways as much as our budget allows.

We continue to pursue State, Department of Public Works monies for road work and our Highway Superintendent administers this program to the satisfaction of the state resident engineer.

Our Fire Department was upgraded with the purchase of monitors and now that department is better equipped to protect our people.

The curbing machine bought by the Highway Department will be a valuable asset to preserve our streets.

New offices were constructed on the second floor of Town Hall for use by the Building, Gas, Wire, Plumbing Departments.

Our Long Plain Museum was upgraded with storm windows and a new furnace.

We continue to pursue Federal and State Funds for the reconstruction of Peckham Road and the remainder of Middle Road, and though this is a long range project we are hopeful, and will continue to seek funding for this most worthy project.

The AYAA conducted a most entertaining July 4th celebration and we are appreciative of this.

Our Memorial Day Committee also worked diligently to produce a commemorative ceremony for our Veterans.

The Apple-Peach Festival was a big hit and brought in many out-of-towners and also created a festive air in the community.

Cable TV is near a reality, as a franchise was granted in December and we have been assured that the majority of townspeople will be able to avail themselves of service by the fall of 1981.

We made application for a HUD Grant to aid our people in minimizing their cost for the proposed sewer program and for weatherization of properties for low-income residents, however we were not fortunate in being allowed to submit a final application. This award is based on a complicated formula and we just missed out, but we shall try again.

We appreciate those persons and departments that have extended themselves to make our Town a better place to live. We have lost our long-time Representative, William Q. MacLean, Jr., who proved valuable to our Town for many years, but we wish him well as a State Senator.

During the year ending 31 December 1980, you the taxpayers allowed us to purchase one (1) new fire truck and twenty-seven (27) Mini-Monitors (Pagers) for members of the department. Now every firefighter is equipt with this little wonder and is more readily available if within hearing distance.

This year some members of the Permanent force and the Call force have donated about 1400 hours (man hours) of free labor to the Town, this includes but is not limited to the following: Putting up and taking down the decorations at the Town Hall, responding to Mutual Aid Calls, responding to accidents, and general assistance about the Fire Department.

As per MGL Chapter 48, Section 42, here is a condition report of Fire Department equipment:

Station #1 –Town Hall:

2 each 1,000 gallon per minute combination Fire Trucks, (Combination means that the truck carries water, ladders and hose as well as rescue equipment.) One is a 1975 Ford with Bean Pump, the other is a 1980 Chevrolet with Bean Pump. Both in excellent condition.

1 each Rescue Boat with 25 HP Outboard motor on its own trailer. This also is in excellent condition.

1 each Ice Rescue Boat, carried on top of Engine #1. This also is in excellent condition.

1 each 1967 3/4 Ton Dodge Truck equipt for woods, grass and other fires as well as with some rescue equipment. This is the work horse of the department and its getting mighty tired. The body is beginning to rot and the water tank is getting scaley with rust. It should be replaced in the very near future and the cost will be about \$31,000.00, give or take a few dollars.

Station #2 – on Main Street in North End of Town – This is strictly a Call-Firefighter manned station.

1 each 1963 Ford truck with Farrah equipment Combination truck.

1 each 1968 Ford truck with Farrah equipment Combination truck.

1 each 1954 Ford truck (rebuilt by the Long Plain Firefighters into a 1200 gallon water carrying tanker). This is 26 years old and anything could happen at any given time. Its condition is fair.

Both stations are overcrowded and an addition to each should be considered. One visit by you will convince you that the needs are real and always with us.

We assist the Board of Health by monitoring their phone after hours on weekends and holidays. We call the duty nurse if an emergency arises during this time.

We are also the go between for the Water Department and the Town Hall Offices that require their services. Our radio also keeps the Town Offices in touch with the Highway Department at all times 25 hours a

day (we try harder).

This department is always ready to assist any other department in Town that might require our assistance. We are like the flash light battery EVER-READY.

The members of the Board of Health respectfully submit the following report for the year 1980.

After being duly elected as a member of the Board of Health at the Annual Town Election, for a three-year term, Rene Racine was sworn into office. At the following monthly meeting of the Board, the following officers were seated:

Health Care Programs and Activities:

The Health Care Services and Programs continue to meet State and Federal Standards. Under the leadership of Dr. William A. Jeffrey, our Board continues to actively support a preventive medicine program.

Nursing Services:

We are a certified member of the Massachusetts Association of Community Health and approved as a Provider of Home Health Services under the Medicare and Medicaid programs. These are Federally mandated programs.

Home Nursing Services:

These nursing services are available to all Acushnet residents who qualify under the Medicare and Medicaid programs. Our nurses are available 8:00 A.M. to 9:00 P.M., seven days a week. When in need of our services, please call: 995-0549. The use of these services has increased greatly in the last year, therefore, increasing our nursing revenues.

Homemaker-Home Health Aide Services:

The contract with St. Luke's Hospital for the Homemaker-Home Health Aide Services was renewed. This program has an increased cost as of December 1, 1980.

Easter Seal Program:

The contract with the Easter Seal Society, which provides Physical Therapy, Speech Therapy, Occupational Therapy and Medical Social Work in the Home Setting, was renewed.

Other:

During the year we hosted two (2) Southeastern Massachusetts University nursing students. These students work in the community in their last semester of their Senior year of college. They are gaining experience in the Home Health Field. We welcome them and enjoy the time they spend with us.

Clinics and Programs

Senior Citizens Health Counseling:

Clinics are held monthly on Tuesdays. Appointments can be made by calling the Council on Aging Office 995-8528. This year we have rotated our location for our Health Counseling between the Long Plain Baptist Church, the Community Room at the Presidential Terrace and the Council on Aging Room at the Parting Ways Building. This resulted in increasing the number of persons who took advantage of the Counseling Sessions.

There were nine (9) clinics with one hundred seventeen (117) persons attending.

Flu Clinics:

Three (3) Flu Clinics were held with three hundred fifty-two persons receiving inoculations.

Well-Baby Clinics:

Clinics are held the first Wednesday of each month except for July and August on the second floor of the Parting Ways Building, from 2:00-4:00 P.M. Ten (10) Clinics were held with the following immunization and tests given:

REPORT OF THE RUSSELL MEMORIAL LIBRARY

To the Townspeople:

Library personnel was very much gratified by 1980's activities. We continued participation in inter-library loans, serviced hard-of-sight patrons with special large print books from the Eastern Regional Library System, hosted a field trip for the four first grades of the Acushnet Elementary School, and continued to service books to shut-ins upon request.

Photo-copying for the public was initiated when a new photo-copying machine was purchased with special funds. Copying during library hours is at a minimum cost. The Lower Hall was used throughout the year by Brownie Troop 69, and the Library sponsored various craft classes as a meeting place. The ever popular craft classes in crewel, crochet, macrame, and quilting took place during the spring, summer, and fall. To conserve fuel no classes were conducted during the winter months.

The 3rd Annual Handicrafts Show was held in September, and the 21st observance of Massachusetts Art Week was held the latter part of May. Both were very well attended. The first book sale of discarded books was held in early May—very successful.

Den 4 of Pack 51 Cub Scouts of Acushnet as a community service project decorated the Library for the Christmas Holidays — including a tree in the entrance.

Something new this year — a Christmas Concert by the Albert F. Ford Junior High School Band was held on the front steps of the Library December 18, and was much enjoyed.

Due to a demand by a number of patrons, the Library hours were changed on Saturdays.

The members of the Council on Aging respectfully submit the following report for the year 1980.

Our meetings are held on the second and fourth Wednesday of each month throughout the year at the Drop-In Center in the Parting Ways Building. The Office is open Monday through Friday from 8:00 A.M. to 3:30 P.M. to render service and information relating to problems of the elderly town residents.

The Drop-In Center is open until 4:00 P.M. Monday through Friday. A hot lunch is served daily at 12:00 noon from the Nutritional Hot Lunch Program. Meals on Wheels are delivered daily to homes of persons who are physically unable to come to the site. Beano is played every Monday and Wednesday and Card Games are played on Tuesday, Thursday, and Friday. The Senior Citizens have been taken on trips to various places such as: Newport 12 mile drive with a picnic – Plymouth, Coffee and Donuts were enjoyed by all. LaSalette, and the J.F. Kennedy Library. Holiday parties are also sponsored on Christmas and New Years.

The Board of Health Staff provides a Counseling Clinic in the Council on Aging Office from 1:00 P.M. to 4:00 P.M., on the fourth Tuesday of each month. They also have them at Long Plain Church and Presidential Terrace. Now we are looking for available space in the Middle Road section, so this will take care of all sections in Town. They also provide Flu Shots in the fall of the year.

This year we were able to provide a Mini-Bus Service for shopping and attending meals. Provided through the Acushnet School Committee and the Board of Selectmen. The Council is preparing a Newsletter to be distributed at various locations. This year thanks to CETA for providing us with the services of Lydia Moutinho as Secretary. We find her invaluable, particularly in regard to the records that must be kept on our Mini-Bus Service.

The members of the Council wish to extend their thanks and appreciation to the volunteers who participated in the Elderly Nutritional Program and to the Board of Selectmen for their assistance throughout the year.

REPORT OF THE ACUSHNET HISTORICAL COMMISSION

The Acushnet Historical Commission had another very active year.

The remaining storm windows were installed at the Long Plain Museum and the new furnace put in and working before December. This has resulted in a more even heat and warmer floors and, hopefully, the use of less oil.

The Museum grounds were used this fall for the Apple and Peach Festival held on September 13 and 14. It proved to be an excellent location for this type of celebration and we are looking forward to making it a yearly event.

Permission was acquired from the State Department of Public Works in Middleboro to allow our Highway Department to move the watering trough in front of the Museum back from the road, since it was at that time on state-owned property. This was done in August and the hole beneath is filled in.

The flagpole was repaired and repainted by Ralph Macomber and raised again in August, in time for the Festival.

We accepted, with regret, the resignation of Harold Crapo in September. Mr. Crapo had been with the Commission since its inception in 1972 and contributed a great deal of time and effort to making it an effective organization.

REPORT OF THE ACUSHNET CETA DEPARTMENT

The Acushnet CETA Department, under the Title II-D Program, has had as many as twelve (12) full-time participants in various town departments. Services were utilized at: the CETA Office [one (1) Coordinator, three (3) clerks]; Highway Department [four (4) laborers]; Acushnet School Department [two (2) Itinerate Teachers]; Board of Health [one (1) clerk] and Council on Aging [one (1) Mini-Bus driver] for the convenience of the Senior Citizens. All these programs under the Title II-D slot met a payroll of approximately \$26,884.16 plus fringe benefits. There are five openings at the present time which will be filled in the near future.

We also participated in the Youth Program. The Youth Work Experience Program has had as many as twelve (12) youths working ten (10) hours weekly after school and increasing to approximately thirty-six (36) youths in the summer program working twenty-eight (28) hours weekly. The Y.E.T.P. Program has fourteen (14) participants working thirty-five (35) hours per week. Five (5) of these youths were under the Y.C.C.I.P. Program which started November 10, 1980 entitled the Acushnet Mainstream Prep. with one (1) supervisor to coordinate the five (5) youths daily assigned duties. The project was allotted \$44,203.59 for a fifty-two week period. This project will assist other labors of Acushnet in providing substantial improvements to the town's streets, parks, beaches, and other public and governmental buildings of said town. The total youth payroll for the year was approximately \$85,049.19 plus fringe benefits.

Under Title VI-B Project #28, the Acushnet School Department from January 8, 1980 to June 20, 1980 filled six (6) slots in the position of Teacher/Councillor. It was funded for approximately \$36,625.20. The purpose of this project was to provide individual instruction in the basic academic skills of reading, and mathematics to children between the ages of six and eighteen and to relate the acquired learning of those skills to future success in the world of work. This project will also provide training and career awareness for college educated young people who are presently unable to find employment.

During the year the Title VI-B laborer's project for the town, entitled Minute Man #9, assisted and performed a variety of work schedules for respected town agencies. Duties performed were: Highway Department assisted with rubbish removal, clearing overbrush from road sides, and sweeping streets; Acushnet Fire Department, assisted in painting of fire house and cleaning of fire trucks; Acushnet Cemetery where they assisted in burials and landscaping throughout the Cemetery; Acushnet Water Department, assisted with hydrant repairs,

flushing of hydrants, water shut-offs, meter reading, repairing ruptured water pipes, and painting inside of Water Department building. At the Acushnet Museum and the ACushnet Library, the labor force cut grass and removed storm windows when needed. At the Plymouth Bay Girls Scout Camp, they cleared brush to make nature trail, built fireplaces, stained shelters, and painted floors of shelters. This project employed as many as twenty-one (21) participants and met a payroll of approximately \$91,891.81.

Commencing February 25, 1980, the Town of Acushnet sponsored a new Title VI-B Program, Project #17, The Acushnet General Office Aides. Employing as many as twenty-four (24) participants, this program benefits consortium-wide governmental and non-profit agencies by placing additional clerks to assist with the corresponding work schedules of these job sites. It also benefits the participant by not only introducing them to the employment status, but by increasing each individual's clerical work knowledge and experience in such areas as typing, filing, record-keeping and receptionary duties. Acushnet agencies which have utilized the services of office aides are: the Accountant's Office, Council on Aging, Water Department, Cemetery Department, Board of Health, Kempton Memorial and the CETA Office. Total payroll for the project totalled \$100,160.23, plus fringe benefits for the year.

The goals and objectives set by the established programs are: they assist the town, allowing many work schedules either labor or clerical orientated to be finalized by additional manpower. Also, such programs assist the respective participant in acquiring the necessary work attitudes and experience and responsibilities.

The major emphasis for the coming year will be to train those residents of Acushnet, who find themselves without the skills needed for employment.

REPORT OF THE OFFICE OF VETERANS BENEFITS

To Officers Town of Acushnet, and Residents of Acushnet,
Massachusetts

This is the year end report for 1980.

The Veterans Agents office has on its rolls 22 cases which are being assisted for Ordinary Benefits, Fuel, Insurance, and Medical bills.

A total of 35 V.A. income cards were filled out for Veterans and Widows. Cases handled for the Social Security Administration and S.S.I. and the fuel allotment Program totaled 31 cases. The fuel allotment alone which were referred to the Onboard Program, saved the Town of Acushnet, a few thousand dollars, which kept the fuel bill for Veteran Services to \$782.00 for the six month period.

A 50% return of money expended for Veteran Benefits is refunded to the Town of Acushnet, from the V.A. Commissioner, Boston, Massachusetts.

ACUSHNET CONSERVATION COMMISSION

In 1980, fifty-four (54) lots were inspected by the Commission to determine whether any activity on these lots would fall under the jurisdiction of General Law, Chapter 131, Section 40, the Wetland Protection Law. Eight (8) lots had some restriction, four (4) had complete restriction and the rest had no restriction. The owners were informally advised as to the status of the individual lots. As a result of this program, setup by the Board of Selectmen, the Building Inspector, and the Commission, no legal action in the court was necessary in 1980. One cease and desist order was issued for illegal filling of a swamp.

Two "notice of intents" were filed for activities affecting wetlands in accordance with the Wetland Protection Law. One was for the location of a mobile home within 100 feet of a brook. This was approved by the Commission with an "order of conditions" issued to protect the stream. The second notice filed was to allow the storm drain system of a subdivision to be tied into an existing system that discharged into a brook. This activity was denied when the applicant could not produce engineering calculations proving the existing system could handle the additional water.

Three members were reappointed to the Commission by the Selectmen.
